Eight Ever... The Quarterfinals Get Underway...



The play in two diamonds redoubled was actually easier than the play in four spades. Chambers led the diamond deuce which rode to declarer's eight. Krekorkian played a spade to the queen and another spade which

Schermer ruffed. Schermer led a small heart away from his ace to Chambers' queen. Chambers led a spade for Schermer to ruff. Schermer cashed his ace of hearts and led another to Krekorian's king. The six of clubs went to the queen and the ace of clubs was cashed. The ace of spades was led off dummy and Krekorian claimed his eight tricks for +560.

In four spades, Bramley had to play carefully. Jacobs led the spade ten, won with Dummy's jack. Bramley led a club to the jack and king. Jacobs won and exited another spade. Bramley took a diamond finesse for the king to have a pitch for a heart. He played a club to the ace and a trump off dummy, Beatty pitching a diamond. Bart cashed the ace of diamonds, pitching a low heart from dummy. He took his ace of spades, led a club, and endplayed George into leading a heart, guaranteeing ten tricks. 4 IMPs to Jacobs.

Schermer led the ace of spades and a spade to Chambers' king. Chambers made the obvious shift to a trump and waited for his side's two diamond tricks.


In the Closed Room, Beatty led the ace of diamonds, shifted to the ace of spades and a spade to Jacobs' king. Welland still has a diamond loser even if Jacobs does not switch to a trump because Beatty can overruff dummy's deuce of trump. Only one way exists to make the hand... Unfortunately for George, he found it. He apparently thought Beatty had the king of diamonds for his lead and got sloppy. He returned a LOW diamond. The jack would have buried the ten and the contract would still have failed. Knowing Beatty was unlikely to lead the diamond ace from the ace/jack, Roy ducked the diamond to the ten. When the smoke cleared, he collected 10 tricks and a 10 IMP gain! 2

have rolled. We've all been in worse slams than that many times. That is the bad news.

The good news is that bidding the suits they held put East on lead. Leading an ace from an AQ is never clear, even against a slam. Richter chose to lead a diamond. Garner scooped this up and played the ace and king of trump getting the bad news. He quickly played two more rounds of diamonds and when everyone followed, he played the last diamond from dummy and discarded his losing heart. The defense was helpless and he rolled up the slam.

In the other room, Simson and Johnson used science and avoided the slam... the good news. But science landed them in clubs from the short side... the bad news. It was easy for Rubin to lead a heart, and he did. Simson/Johnson made the game, but they'd have been a trick short in slam! 13 IMPs to Wolfson.

The message here is: Don't mess around with Meckwell!

Eric had no problem punishing two clubs. He passed Jeff's double like a shot and beat the hand three vulnerable tricks.

3NT was bid and made in the other room with no interference, but it wasn't vulnerable so Nickell gained another 9 IMPs.

Against 4♥, Katz led the ♦9, 3rd and 5th. Bathurst should have ducked this to his ten. There was no harm. If the 9 was top of nothing, he could do nothing about it, but if it happened to be 3rd best (as it was), he wins big. Kevin won the ace and led a spade toward his hand. Nick won the ace and gave Katz a spade ruff. Katz cashed his now good diamond and exited with a club, killing all entry to dummy to collect the good spades.

The defense collected one spade, one diamond, and two ruffs. The contract failed by one trick. Had Kevin ducked the diamond at trick one, the game would have made easily.

In the other room, Wooldridge led his singleton diamond against 4. Meckstroth won the king with the ace, ducked a club, won the club return, and ruffed a club in dummy. He played off two rounds of high hearts to shed two small diamonds and came to ten tricks perforce.

He was rewarded with 12 IMPs to Nickell for his efforts.





Hurd led the \bigstar J against the small slam. Rodwell won the king, played a heart to the ace, ruffed a spade, played a heart to the king and a diamond to the ace. He ruffed a diamond and went about his business, easily collecting 12 tricks.

Katz led the same card against the grand. Bathurst took a similar line, hoping for a miracle (Axx of spades?) Unlucky for him, no miracles happened, and in the end, he was forced to concede a heart for down one.

16 IMPs to Nickell.



In the Jacobs/Welland match, both tables played in 3NT on unimpeded auctions.

Sometimes, spot cards are as important as high cards. This hand is an example. Both Schermer and Beatty led fourth best spades. Both Casen and Welland put up the queen, covered by the king and ducked. Another spade followed, ducked to North's jack. The spade suite was cleared and both declarers took a heart finesse... however, Welland led the nine of hearts to the queen and Casen led the jack of hearts, covered by the king to the ace.

Both declarers unsuccessfully finessed the king of clubs, and both Norths led their last low spade to South's nine.

♣ 632 Jacobs exited a heart to Beatty's ten and dummy's ace, while Chambers, unable to do that without setting up the ninth trick in hearts, exited the jack of diamonds to Casen's ace. Casen cashed the clubs and led the nine of hearts himself. Schermer covered with the ten and there were nine tricks for the taking.

Taking the double finesse in hearts gives declarer one extra opportunity to make the hand. If the club hook is on and clubs split, it is immaterial.

any system. Two spades by Chambers is aggressive but reasonable, however, when Schermer could only bid 2NT, driving to game seems like an all or nothing action. Schermer was lucky not to be doubled given East's heart holding! As it was, four hearts failed by three tricks for -300.

In the other room, Bramley, East, was allowed to play in three diamonds after Welland, West, made a takeout double of one heart. That contract failed by one trick and it was 8 IMPs

At the other table, Beatty, a traditionalist, made the "normal" raise to four hearts. Schermer bid the spade game, and with only one heart, one diamond, and one club to lose, he scored up +620. How come no one sacrificed?

1. Greg Daniels didn't win on Wild Side Slide. The man who won on Winner's Delight exactly doubled his starting money. Ryan started with \$25.


2. Mark was not the man who started with \$35 and ended the day with \$45. Mr. Turner, whose first name wasn't James, didn't win on Candy's Comet.

Jacobs chose to preempt aggressively on his 8 loser hand in first seat. You live by the sword, you die by the sword. Position matters in bridge. Chambers did not have a good hand but he had the right distribution... and he was at favorable vulnerability. Believe me, he did not expect for

the auction to come back to him at six hearts. However, six hearts is a more than reasonable spot... in fact, it's cold.

At the other table, Bramley passed in first seat. (Ed. Note: I would too!) Roy opened his best suit in 3rd seat. Wold made a takeout double of one diamond. Bart raised to four diamonds and Jacobus bid four spades. Having trouble evaluating partner's strengths in a strained auction, Wold thought the better part of valor was to pass and take the plus. Another 11 IMPs to Welland.

Four spades is a fine contract on only a club finesse. The finesse is off so it naturally fails by a trick.

Chambers was seeing his life pass before him when Beatty doubled two hearts vulnerable. Lucky for him, there were only five losers. Why Jacobs passed instead of bidding his six card spade suit will ever be a mystery. Had he bid spades, he might even have stayed low enough to get a plus score, knowing from the notrump overcall that every card was over Beatty's hand.

Bathurst beats Nickell like a tambourine. Has the world gone batty?


Welland seems poised to make the minor upset, but playing four handed is like trying to walk a furlong in a peat bog. Jacobs will overcome the 30 something.

Against Meckstroth, Grue led the five of spades. It went 4, 10, Q. Meck decided to put his opponents' feet to the fire. He played back a small spade. Smoothly and in tempo Grue played small. Meck thought forever and finally went up with the ace. Kit Woolsey (commentating on VuGraph) said Meck should have finessed because if spades were 3-2, North was likely to be caught in a red suit squeeze. There also are some double squeeze possibilities although the communication is clumsy. Had Meck finessed, as the cards lie, it would have been easy. As it was, Jeff missed the boat and even threw a club which removed any chance of the double squeeze.

At the other table, Wooldridge got the called for club lead. He immediately played the spade queen. When South followed with the ten, he played the deuce of spades and finessed the seven. Great play, Joel! This was worth 14 IMPs to Bathurst.

All About Kibitzing

WHEN CAN YOU KIBITZ IN THE PLAYING ROOMS?

You will be able to kibitz at any of the tables during this event.

Kibitzers may enter the room ONLY at the start of play for a segment. Once play has started, the room will be closed.

A kibitzer who leaves the room may not return until the start of the next segment.

Cell phones and other electronic devices are not allowed in the playing rooms, even if they are turned off. Any kibitzer who is found with a cell phone will be evicted and not allowed to kibitz during the remainder of the tournament.

When a match is being shown on BBO Vugraph, no kibitzer may sit on the same side of the table as the Vugraph operator.

SCREENS

All of the USBC is played with screens. If you've never kibitzed at a table with screens before, you need to know that it is quite different from kibitzing at a regular table. You need to be seated at an "open" corner of the table (not next to the screen) in order to see, and once there are 4 kibitzers at a table it will be very hard for additional kibitzers to see.

USBC KIBITZING RULES

The USBF **General Conditions of Contest** contain specific rules about kibitzers. They are designed to promote security at the tournament and are set forth in the conditions of contest section labeled "Security."

They are:

1. General Rules

a. During any use of duplicated boards across multiple matches, Kibitzers must select one table for kibitzing and may not move to any other table during a session or segment.

b. Kibitzers may not speak with players, must watch only one hand at a time, may not sit in such a position as to see more than one hand at a time, may not sit in such a position as to see a computer screen in use for Internet broadcast, must check communication devices with the Director, cannot call attention to irregularities other than a board being placed incorrectly on the table (arrow positioning), but may serve as witnesses to a possible irregularity.

2. In the Open Room:

a. If there is a live, or nearly live Internet broadcast of any match in the Open Room, kibitzers shall abide by the same rules as those applicable to the Closed Room.

b. If there is no live, or nearly live Internet broadcast of any match in the Open Room then kibitzers, media, and NPC's may enter and return until such time as any table from the closed room has finished the segment. Once any table in the Closed room has finished, no one may return to the Open room after leaving unless escorted while absent.

c. In either event, Open Room kibitzers are expected to abide by the same rules as the players regarding leaving the room and returning (e.g. be escorted to the restroom).

3. In the Closed Room:

a. Kibitzers must enter the Closed Room before play commences. Kibitzers in the closed room are required to remain until the segment of play is completed at the table they are watching or to leave the playing area entirely. Closed Room kibitzers are expected to abide by the same rules as the players regarding leaving the room (e.g. be escorted to the restroom).

b. Except as expressly provided in these conditions and appendices, NPC's shall be subject to the WBF General Conditions, Section 17.

c. No one other than the Internet broadcast personnel and Tournament Directors may watch any computer screen or any other mechanism for enabling the Internet broadcast at any time in either the Closed or the Open Room.

VuGraph Information

From the Quarterfinals on, we will cover all of the tables in play. To watch the Vugraph online, go to the **<u>BBO website</u>** where you can log on directly from your browser, go to "Vugraph" and choose which table to watch or download the BBO software to run BBO on your computer. If you choose the latter approach, after downloading, install the software on your computer, log on, follow the directions to become a BBO member and you'll be magically transported to the Lobby of the largest bridge club in the world. Click on the button labeled VUGRAPH and you'll be able to choose which of the USBC matches you want to watch. To watch on your smartphone or I-Pad, **go** to **http://www.bridgebase.com/mobile/** and select the match you want to watch (you can also use this link on your computer but will have fewer options than with the normal BBO on your browser or Windows). Ed. Note: AlwaysOnPC.com offers a suite that will give you full flash capabilities using Chrome or Firefox (also in the suite.) It runs \$20 for the I-Phone and \$25 for the I-Pad. It works great. We watched the finals of the Vanderbilt all the way home from Louisville. We could chat and everything. It is also offered for the Android.
