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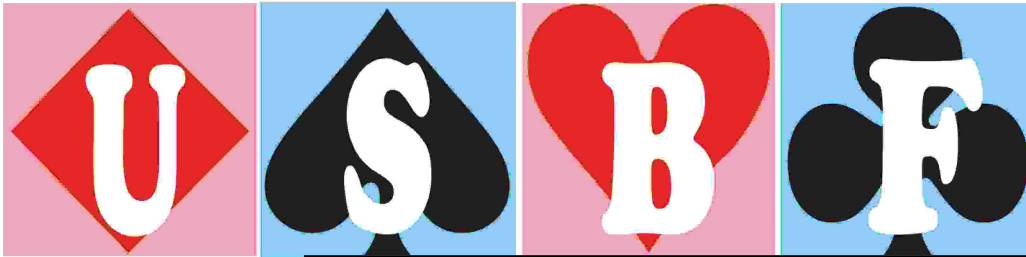

Milner and Granovetter had a nice defense on this hand to defeat 3NT. Milner led his fourth best diamond. Cohen, reasonably, played small from dummy. Granovetter won the queen and continued diamonds. Milner won his ace and

could not lead another diamond from his ten. He led his partner's hearts, and when the smoke cleared, he collected one heart, two diamonds, one club and one spade for down one.

At the other table, Woolsey bid 2D over 1NT showing one major. Lev found it easy to bid game holding stoppers in both majors. Undaunted, Woolsey led a low heart. Eisenberg won the queen in dummy and finessed the club queen. Woolsey won and continued with ace of hearts and a heart. Unfortunately for him, he was out of entries. Eisenberg ran his clubs and led a spade. North won the ace and returned a low diamond. Eisenberg was "forced" to play the king because if the ace was with South, he was down. He collected 2 spades, 2 hearts, 1 diamond and 4 clubs for a well earned 10 IMPs.

Granovetter was content to play one no-trump on the somewhat spirited auction with everyone in there bidding.

Woolsey, with only his side bidding, accepted the game invitation on his minimum because his diamonds were so good. Lev led a spade to the king and Eisenberg returned a spade to Lev's ace. Lev couldn't lead a spade from his ten into declarer's Q9 so he shifted to the queen of hearts. Woolsey made an unlucky decision. He played for blockage in the heart suit. He rose with the ace of hearts and led a club. Lev won his ace and returned a small heart to Eisenberg's KJ for a one trick set. Had Woolsey known the position, he would have ducked the queen of hearts and Lev would have been helpless.

The play was identical at the other table. 6 more IMPs to Milner and the match stands at 16-0 Milner after two boards.

Stewart decided not to go quietly over four hearts and doubled, hoping partner would have the hand to pass. Woolsey unfortunately held a six card club suit to the nine, giving him some reason to pull... especially since the opening diamond bid could as easily have been clubs as diamonds. Five diamonds went down five for minus 1100 when the cross ruffing started.

Four hearts was easy to defeat in the other room. Granovetter led his singleton diamond. Milner took his AKQ and cashed his spade ace to insure the set. Granovetter encouraged and the king of spades scored for down two.

The route to a push is not always painless. Both Easts were pleased to hear partner open 1NT while they were holding 22 HCP and a good five card suit. Both Easts bid Gerber, and finding themselves off no aces, bid the no-trump grand slam.

At Woolsey's table, Milner led the diamond seven, second from top. Woolsey could not get a credible count from this lead. Kit cashed three top spades to find South with four spades. At this point, he led a club to the ace and took an immediate club finesse, losing to queen third.

Would a more perfect count have helped him? Not necessarily...

Had he cashed three diamonds and three hearts first, he would have known ten of South's cards, and only nine of North's cards, making the queen of clubs slightly more likely to be with North, however, he would then have had to take a first round club finesse through North because his entries would be gone.

If North has a singleton club, he might have led either a heart or a diamond from a 5-5 holding so it is less necessary to guard against Qxxx in the South hand.

At the other table, Rosenberg led a fourth best heart. Mohan won in hand and cashed three rounds of spades, getting the count in that suit. He now cashed two top diamonds, led a heart his, and ran the nine of clubs to the queen, guarding against queen fourth in the North hand, but risking a loss to an unlikely singleton queen in the South hand.

This is a hand from Monday's Round Robin ... Jacobs vs. Milner.

Sam Lev demonstrated his fine declarer technique and card reading ability on this hand... And one day soon, he will be a life master.

Following his partner's request, Miller led a diamond against 6S. Obviously Lev could no longer afford to simply guess the hearts since the defense would win the ace of hearts and cash a diamond. Instead, he played two rounds of clubs and seven rounds of spades, noting the fall of the club ten from South. After ten tricks had been played, the position was:

Boyd had no hearts to lead... and he inferred from the auction that a spade lead would not be likely to defeat the contract. Clearly that left one suit that would make sense: diamonds. Assuming the opponents had 24-26 HCP for their game bid, his partner was unlikely to have an entry. Therefore, the ace of diamonds seems best. As we can see from the diagram, the diamond ace would have been brilliant. Unfortunately Boyd could not see all the hands. He led the diamond queen and declarer scored 11 tricks.

At the other table, Casen and Ferguson were allowed to play 4D N/S when Schermer opened 1S and Chambers responded 1NT; Ferguson overcalled 2D; Schermer competed with 2S and Casen bid 4D. This made easily after Schermer cashed the first three tricks in the black suits and continued spades. When East couldn't overruff the nine, South dropped the singleton king offside. Perhaps West could have foreseen this position and continued with a club rather than a spade. 13 IMPs to O'Rourke.

In April of 2000, The Detroit News produced a commemorative section on the Detroit Tigers' first game at their new home, Comerica Park. A quote from the headlining story read as follows:

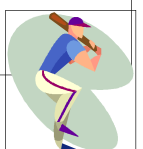
"Comerica Park is expected to make the Detroit Tigers part of baseball's nouveau riche..."

Those who have visited the ballpark agree with the expectations. A carousel. A ferris wheel. A mammoth water feature in center field that can be choreographed to any music. a decade-by-decade pedestrian museum enveloping the main concourse. But wait, there is also a field with a game being played as well. These are but a few examples of what Comerica Park introduced to fans visiting downtown Detroit in the summer of 2000.

Groundbreaking for the \$300 million project took place on October 29, 1997. More than 60 percent of the financing is private, with the rest contributed from public sources. In the time since groundbreaking, the design has continued to evolve. The resulting goal realized is a combination of a classic design for the seating area with amusement and entertainment features that are unique to Comerica Park.

Tigers owner Mike Ilitch played a direct role in designing the facility and brought years of family entertainment experience to the process.

"If the fans feel the pride that this is their park, and a pride of ownership, then we've accomplished what we set out to do," said Ilitch.

## Vugraph

The 2011 USSBC will be covered on BBO Vugraph starting with the Quarter-finals. We hope to cover 4-8 tables in play in the Quarter-finals, all 4 tables in play in the Semi-finals and both tables in the USA1 Finals and USA2 Finals. We may be able to cover some of the matches in the earlier rounds of the USA2 Bracket as well.

The 2011 USWBC will be covered on BBO Vugraph starting with the Semi-finals. We hope to cover all 4 tables in play in the Semi-finals and both tables in the Finals and Playoffs.

To watch the Vugraph online, go to the **BBO website** where you can either log on directly from your browser, go to "Vugraph" and choose which table to watch, or download the BBO software to run BBO on your computer. If you choose the latter approach, after downloading, install the software on your computer, log on, follow the directions to become a BBO member and you'll be magically transported to the Lobby of the largest bridge club in the world. Click on the button labeled VUGRAPH and you'll be able to choose which of the USWBC matches you want to watch.

Each day's schedule is the same (these are Detroit times; to see the times for your time-zone, go to the **BBO Vugraph schedule site**)

11:00-1:15; 1:30-3:50; 6:00-8:15; 8:30-10:50

In the Quarterfinals, each match will play a different set of boards. In the Semi-Finals and Final, all of the teams will play the same boards, but for security reasons, if one match is sufficiently behind that we have to start it later than the other one, we will not start the Vugraph broadcast until both matches have started play.

After a session, you can review the Vugraph action on our Web Vugraphs, which show each hand played with a link to bidding and play records. Take a look at the older events currently available (under Archived Results) to see what we'll have for the 2011 USSBC. Web Vugraphs are posted within about half an hour of completion of the Vugraph show.
