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

Wold/Bates had a Precision auction. Robinson had a chance to keep anything bad from happening by doubling four diamonds. Boyd dutifully led a diamond. Wold won the ace in dummy and pitched a club. He tried the club finesse, but when it lost to the king, he was sunk. Boyd continued clubs; Wold pulled two rounds of trump ending on the board, ruffed a diamond, tested hearts and conceded down one.

At the other table, Kasle made an excellent tactical bid when he cued four diamonds instead of four clubs.


O'Rourke did the obvious and led a club. It was the unbid suit and partner was likely to hold the queen. Unlucky for her, it yielded Kasle his twelfth trick. 14 IMPs to Kasle



Here, both sides of the team show how it's done. Judy opened 2NT on her 19 count. Nothing would stop Moss from bidding the game.

At the other table, Wheeler gave her opponents a chance to get in and confuse things. She opened one club. Stansby, another excellent woman player, was right in there mixing it up with three diamonds on her jack-sixth suit and her side four card major!! This was most effective since Bernstein couldn't negative double (no majors!), couldn't bid no-trump without a diamond stopper. When Migry bid 3S, it completely stymied East/West. 3S failed by a trick ... 3NT made four.



Hamilton and Fisher got to a normal 3NT. Passell led a normal fourth from his longest and strongest, and Fisher wrapped up 13 tricks.

At the other table, Sutherlin and Hayden got a bit frisky. Hayden opened a flawed two diamonds... flawed because he held so many major suit cards. Keeping the opponents out of a successful major suit game was no less likely than keeping his own side from one with four hearts and three spades in his hand.

Holding 23 HCP, Sutherlin key-carded. Hoping for king of spades, king, queen of diamonds, Sutherlin shot out the slam. He chose six diamonds, protecting partner's spade king. Unfortunately for Lynch, the wheels came off the bus. Had Sutherlin bid six no-trump, he might have had a chance. Schwartz, on lead with nothing in spades or clubs, might have led a heart (the closest thing to a trick) or a club. We'll never know. Against 6D, however, Finkel had no trouble leading his spade honors. Six diamonds down one... 13 IMPs to Schwartz


Notice how it took more bids to get to 2S doubled than it did to get to 3NT!! Kasle made a superb lead against 3NT. He led the diamond jack. Jacobus made a good play and ducked. Kasle continued with the diamond ace and a diamond. Jacobus won his king and played a spade to the queen and the ten of clubs to the **king (a key play)** and ace. Next, Jacobus tried the king of spades and Kasle won the ace. Kasle exited with the heart deuce (a Grosvenor for sure). Had Kasle exited with the heart queen, he would have legitimately defeated the hand. Jacobus needed to play the ten to make the hand. Had he played the ten, he could have cashed a high heart, leaving a high heart in dummy, and come to two hearts, two spades, one diamond, and four clubs. As it was, Jacobus played the heart king and finessed the jack of clubs. Kasle won his jack, exited a club, and declarer found himself one entry short to make the hand... down one.

At the other table, things were more spirited. Bates chose to negative double over one heart. Wold responded 1NT; Schermer balanced with double; Bates ran to 2D; Schermer doubled that and Wold ran to 2S. Two spades was no picnic. Chambers led his spade queen, ducked, and another spade to the jack and ace. When the smoke cleared, Eddie was down two for -300 and 9 IMPs to Kasle.

At the other table, Hamilton and Fisher bid six spades. Weischel led the diamond queen which Hamilton ducked. Weichsel continued diamonds and Hamilton won dummy's ace. No matter how Fred played, he was a trick short.



Passell opened 1NT with small singleton club. His team was down in the match and he needed IMPs. Hayden bid Stayman and when Passell showed four hearts, he bid game. Morse led the spade king followed by his singleton diamond. Passell won the diamond ace, hooked the king of trump, ruffed out the ace of spades, played a trump to the ace, and led his seven of clubs. He claimed ten tricks and his +620.

At the other table, the auction was more involved. Hamilton opened a normal one diamond. Weichsel made a takeout double; Fisher responded 1H and Lair bid 1S. Hamilton bid 2H (he may have considered 3 but with everyone bidding it didn't feel right). This would have passed out... however, Lair lives on the edge. He balanced with 2S, giving his vulnerable opponents a second chance to bid game. Hamilton competed with 3H and Weichsel, believing Lair had enough, bid 3S. Lucky for Lynch, the opponents blinked first and passed.

Lair lost one trick in each suit making three for another 13 IMP pick up.


3NT went down one in the Closed Room after the lead of a heart from North. Wolff won the heart ace; cashed the diamond ace; ran the club queen; and played the diamond ten to the queen. Passell continued the heart attack, Hayden winning his king and playing a third heart. Wolff won his queen, cashed the club ace, led a spade to the ace in dummy, played the diamond king and jack, and led the five of diamonds to Passell's eight. Passell exited a spade, and Wolff could come to only 8 tricks... down one.

At the other table, things were far different. Knowing they were down in the set and every board mattered, Lair and Weichsel tried the club slam. Fisher doubled, pretty sure he was beating this in his own hand... and certain he wanted a diamond lead... Lair redoubled with the second round diamond control. The bad splits and unlucky lie of the cards were-too much to handle. Six clubs doubled and redoubled went light two for –1000 and 14 IMPs to Schwartz.

With only three boards to go, it looks grim for Lynch's hopes at USA1... but, on the bright side, in this never ending tournament, win or lose, both teams still have a shot at representing the USA in the Netherlands.

Success depends on you play at trick one!!

Both Wests led a club: Bates led the six; Kozlove led the eight. Looking at the hand, it is apparent that the nine is the winning play, but what would you do at the table?

Lou Ann covered the eight with the jack and could only come to eight tricks when Kasle covered the jack with the king. Perhaps the lead of the eight makes the nine a more attractive play. It is unlikely the eight would be led from Q876.

The interesting aspect here is that while leading second form top of weak suits is a popular method, when the top card is the ten, the play may reveal more to declarer than to partner.

Chambers covered the six with the nine and was rewarded with four spades, three clubs, and two diamonds for nine! 12 IMPs to Kasle

With hearts 2-2 and the king onsides, Robinson had no trouble making the game. He won the opening king of diamonds lead with his ace, led a heart to the jack and a club to the ace. He led a heart to the ace and claimed 10 tricks when the king came up.

It is interesting to note that opening a weak two, it was easier to bid the game than opening a one bid!

It would seem like Stansby should cue five clubs after the four diamond bid by partner. That might have enticed Migry to bid the slam from her side.

Too little too late... but still 13 IMPs to Sprung.



This hand presents an interesting defensive problem. Bernstein, in two spades, did not have to think too hard. She played carefully and made three.

At the other table, Molson transferred and Rosenberg declared four spades. Miner led the jack of diamonds. Rosenberg won the ace in dummy and led a spade to her jack and Miner's queen. Miner led another diamond to Rosenberg's king.

Debbie played ace and a heart, ruffing in dummy, and trumped a diamond with the king of spades. She played her last spade from hand to Miner's ace, Balderson discarding a diamond. Miner played the eight of diamonds, ruffed in dummy while Balderson pitched a heart.

Molson drew the last trump and Balderson had a choice of discards. She chose the heart ten. Rosenberg led a club toward her hand, ducked, trumped a heart, and led a second club. Balderson ducked again, but since all the red cards had been played, Rosenberg could not go wrong.

A much more challenging defense would be for Balderson to discard a club rather than a heart at trick nine. When she next ducks the club lead, declarer must decide whether to lead a heart to hand and lead another club. This is necessary if Balderson started with four clubs... or in the alternative, declarer could play for the existing layout and lead a small club from dummy.

If she chooses the first option, she will be defeated since Balderson will have a winning heart to cash when she wins her ace of clubs.

Howie Doing...

For Howie and Limey, this is the norm. Limey predicts the Irish will storm.

Storming the Kasle was not in the cards. And picking the winner is left to us bards.

Howie picked Kasle and Howie was right. You better trust Howie one more time tonight.

USA2 is by no means a cinch.

She cashed ace of clubs, ace of spades, and overtook the jack of spades with the king. When spades behaved, Wheeler had three diamonds, five spades, three hearts and a club.

Note how carefully Wheeler played this hand. She cashed the club ace early in case an honor appeared and she didn't need to rely on a favorable lie of the spades for twelve tricks.

At the other table, Molson and Rosenberg bid to six spades. If you are bidding slam on this hand, six spades appears to be the best of the strains.

Balderson led the jack of hearts. Molson won in dummy and cashed the ace and jack of spades. She then led the club jack from dummy, losing to the queen. Another heart was returned and Molson overtook her queen with her king, relying 100% on a favorable lie in clubs.

She cashed the king of spades and the queen of spades and played a small club, finessing the ten, and losing to Miner's king.

At this point, Janice claimed the rest for down one!

In an effort to protect against 5-1 trumps, Molson tangled up her communication. 5-1 trumps are a very low percentage. Even if trumps are 5-1, the hand will still make when West holds queen third of diamonds.

The far better line of play is to win the ace of hearts, play the ace of spades, the queen of hearts, and the jack of spades overtaking with the king. Play two more spades and a heart, pitching two clubs and a diamond from dummy. Now lead a club. If West plays an honor, win it and drive out the other honor. Otherwise play low and East is endplayed whenever she started with three or less hearts. If she started with four hearts, she'll return that and you will have to guess the position.

Ruling at the table: South would not make her X with the correct information . West should have said "we have no agreement."

If there had been no X over 3S, bidding was likely to continue P-4C-P-4H-all pass.

Committee:

The committee determined it was unclear how the defense would proceed. If a club or a heart were led, four hearts would make. If South led the diamond ace and received a discouraging card from North, she would likely have switched to a spade and North would then be able to maneuver a ruff to beat four hearts.

It was the committee's determination that it was equally likely that four hearts would make or go down. The benefit of the doubt was given to the non-offending side.

The committee ruled that the contract was 4H down one.

Vugraph

The 2011 USSBC will be covered on BBO Vugraph starting with the Quarter-finals. We hope to cover 4-8 tables in play in the Quarter-finals, all 4 tables in play in the Semi-finals and both tables in the USA1 Finals and USA2 Finals. We may be able to cover some of the matches in the earlier rounds of the USA2 Bracket as well.

The 2011 USWBC will be covered on BBO Vugraph starting with the Semi-finals. We hope to cover all 4 tables in play in the Semi-finals and both tables in the Finals and Playoffs.

To watch the Vugraph online, go to the **BBO website** where you can either log on directly from your browser, go to "Vugraph" and choose which table to watch, or download the BBO software to run BBO on your computer. If you choose the latter approach, after downloading, install the software on your computer, log on, follow the directions to become a BBO member and you'll be magically transported to the Lobby of the largest bridge club in the world. Click on the button labeled VUGRAPH and you'll be able to choose which of the USWBC matches you want to watch.

Each day's schedule is the same (these are Detroit times; to see the times for your time-zone, go to the **BBO Vugraph schedule** site)

11:00-1:15; 1:30-3:50; 6:00-8:15; 8:30-10:50

In the Quarterfinals, each match will play a different set of boards. In the Semi-Finals and Final, all of the teams will play the same boards, but for security reasons, if one match is sufficiently behind that we have to start it later than the other one, we will not start the Vugraph broadcast until both matches have started play.

After a session, you can review the Vugraph action on our Web Vugraphs, which show each hand played with a link to bidding and play records. Take a look at the older events currently available (under Archived Results) to see what we'll have for the 2011 USSBC. Web Vugraphs are posted within about half an hour of completion of the Vugraph show.
