There was nothing to the play in 6D. Chambers led a small heart to Greco's jack. Greco pulled trump and claimed 12 tricks.

There should have been little to the play in 6H also... but apparently Beatty had a blind spot. He could collect five diamonds, five hearts and the ace of clubs off the top. All he needed to succeed was one club ruff in the dummy.

Gitelman led the jack of clubs. Beatty won the stiff ace in dummy. He pulled two rounds of trump with the ace and the jack, and came to his hand with a diamond. At this point, he had the hand made by ruffing a club, returning to hand with another diamond pulling the last two trump. For some reason, he led a spade toward the board instead. When Moss won the ace, he was able to lead a third heart and Beatty was out of luck. He could no longer ruff a club in dummy.

Beatty's best play would have been to lead a spade before pulling two rounds of trump. This would have afforded him a safer return to hand without risk of a diamond ruff, and he could have made the cold six hearts.

This was a true double game swing... not to be confused with a "doubled" game swing.

Against 3NT, Hurd led the nine of spades. Hamman won in hand, played a diamond to the dummy and took the club finesse. When that won, Hamman could help but collect nine tricks, and in reality, at the table, he took ten.

At the other table, Meckwell, at its finest, took the save in 4H. Spector led the ace of diamonds, Meckstroth discarding a club. Apparently Spector thought that Jeff was preparing for a crossruff and switched to a trump. At this point, Meckstroth could set up spades without being tapped out of trumps.

Repeated diamond leads would have defeated the hand.

It was the best sort of sacrifice... the kind that makes!!

Clearly no amount of IMPs is enough to feel safe against these guys!

In the Closed Room, Jacobus decided that his 4-3-3-3 distribution would be best served in a nine trick rather than a ten trick game. He backed up his thinking by passing 3NT.

Bathurst led a fourth best club. Jacobus won in hand with the king. With his only entry to dummy being the club ace, he could not afford the spade finesse. Even if it won, it lost unless it was doubleton in the slot.

Since the queen of spades had to be doubleton for the finesse to be of benefit, Jacobus figured he might as well lay down the ace and king and see what happened. He was well rewarded when the offside queen fell in two rounds and he could collect five spades, three hearts, and two clubs.

In the Open Room, Wolpert chose to play in the eight card major suit fit. Mahaffey led three rounds of diamonds. With no reason not to take the percentage finesse in the trump suit, Wolpert won the heart switch in hand, cashed one high spade, led a club to dummy and ran the jack of spades. When this lost to South's queen, he was one trick short.



Fleisher clearly needed some favorable swings. They were down in the match in the penultimate segment. Time was running short.

Perhaps that accounts for Steve Weinstein's 5H bid. There was no way to ask for aces at the five level and this board looked like exactly the sort of shot the team needed.

Levin bid the small slam. Unfortunately for Fleisher, Garner held both minor suit aces. Howie Weinstein opening led a club. Garner won and tried his diamond ace. When that cashed, the slam failed.

In the other room, Lee judged wisely not to bid on the anemic South cards. When the auction returned to Demirev at the five level, he had no trouble doubling with both major suit ace/kings. Down three resulted in +500 and 12 IMPs to Lee.

Another 10 IMPs to Lee when Passell passed three clubs and Jacobus made four while Kranyak and Wolpert bid their vulnerable spade game. The same three losers exist in both contracts: two hearts and one club. While Passell and Jacobus stopped in the safer contract, the nine card fit as opposed to the eight card fit ... clubs could have been 3-1 and a club ruff would have defeated 4S... the game bonus is still too great at IMPs not to try for it.

In the Closed Room, Meckwell bid to five hearts and made five. Grue led the queen of spades. Rodwell trumped in dummy and finessed to the jack of hearts. A second spade was played and trumped in dummy. Rodwell led a heart to the queen and cashed the ace of hearts drawing the opponents' trump.

Four rounds of clubs were played, allowing him to discard his last spade. He conceded a diamond trick to make five.

In the Open Room, Wooldridge played the 5-3 diamond fit rather than the 4-4 heart fit. This is a much touchier contract.

Declarer should realize that he will potentially need to trump three times in his hand. If so, he will need the jack of diamonds in dummy to draw the last trump. In addition, the king of clubs will be needed as a late entry to the jack of diamonds.

Therefore, declarer should lead a heart to the queen and lead a small diamond off dummy preserving the jack. When the diamond loses, he will be able to trump the spade return, lead a heart to the ace, and trump dummy's last spade. Now he cashes the ace of diamonds, leads a club to the dummy, cashes the jack of diamonds, drawing the last trump... eventually conceding a heart and making five diamonds.
