

In the Closed Room, Nickell's 2H bid left his aggressive opponents room to explore for slam... and they did!

In the Open Room, Glubok's 3H call made it very difficult for Meckwell. Meck's hand did not have interest in more than game unless his partner could encourage. Encouraging at the five level was a little rich even for such a generally spirited pair.

At both tables a heart was led, Declarer winning the ace in hand. Rodwell cashed the spade queen and finessed the club jack. When that held, he played safely for five and scored +450.

Lev won trick one and immediately finessed the club jack. He pulled trump, ending in dummy, and crossed his fingers for the diamonds to work. A diamond to the ace and a diamond back toward the queen produced the magic layout and he claimed 12 tricks and 11 IMPs to Mahaffey.

For the purposes of the auction, Glubok downgraded his hand to open a 20-21 2NT on his 22 HCP. Perhaps Glubok downgraded his hand even more in the end position or perhaps he thought his pass of 4H was forcing... however, Mahaffey had so little, he was delighted to be out of the auction. Mahaffey passed and it played there. Rodwell went peacefully down two for -200.

In the Closed Room, Nickell opened the expected 2C. Lev overcalled 2H and Cohler raised to three. Nickell made an aggressive bid of 3NT with his QT2 under the original heart bidder, and when 4H came around to him, he doubled. Katz

had all winning options. He could pass and collect 500, or bid and collect 620. He chose to bid.

The opening lead was the heart five. Katz ruffed in hand, pulled a round of trump with the jack. He took the straightforward link of ruffing three hearts in hand and reversing the dummy. He easily scored up the game. 9 IMPs back to Nickell.

Meanwhile in the Milner/Fleisher match, in a segment with two one IMP swings and one four IMP swing and four pushes, this hand surfaced.

Willenken/Rosenberg played in 7D. It is surprising that Chris did not convert 7D to 7NT as Milner did in the other room. However, it worked out fine for him. The opening lead was the club queen won by the ace in dummy. Rosenberg was at the crossroads. He could guard against the 3-0 diamond holding either way. He chose correctly to lead the king from dummy and wrapped up 13 tricks.

Against a grand slam, a trump lead is most common. Perhaps Rosenberg inferred that the lack of that lead was likely to be a void... of course, one would not lead from Q98 either. Or perhaps, he reasoned that the lead of the club queen marked North with at most the king and no sequence, and what would prompt him to double 7C for a club lead? It could simply be to prohibit the lead of a trump!! Whatever the logic, it worked and Michael came home with 13 tricks.

Poor Reese. He made the technically correct decision to pull 7D to 7NT... What if the diamonds don't run? You get a second chance in the heart suit... and he received maximum punishment for his decision. The club queen was led. Lall won with the ace, and not having the inference declarer had in the other room, chose to lead a low diamond toward his AJT6432. When North followed, Lall won his ace and South showed out. Back to the drawing board! Lall played a small heart toward dummy. He could go up or finesse. He guessed wrong and finessed the ten of hearts. The hand imploded. Martel won his jack and the defense cashed five rounds of clubs to defeat the contract six vulnerable tricks.

Usually when you go down six, someone jokes, "Could it have been made on another line?" Usually there is no winning line.

On this hand, however, there were two. First, Lall could have gotten the diamond right. Second, he could have played for the drop of the heart jack. He could cash two diamonds, one club and five hearts to reach a five card end position where dummy held S: Qx H:x D:x C:x and his hand was S:Akxx H:Void D:3 C:Void. Righty would have S:Jxxx H:Void D:Q C:Void. On the play of the ultimate heart, Martel would be squeezed and 13 tricks would come home.

In the Open Room, Platnick, West, opened 2S and Diamond, East, jumped to 4H and played it there. In the Closed Room, Wolpert, West, opened 3S and Kranyak, East, bid 4H and also played it there.

Greco, South, led the heart ten against Kranyak. John pulled three rounds of trump, cashed the spade king, and led the ten of clubs to the king and ace. Hampson exited a club won by Greco's eight. Greco exited a club and declarer had no entry to the spade ace. Kranyak tried a diamond to the nine, losing to the ten and finished down one when a diamond came back.

At the other table, Dwyer, South, led the diamond ace. He shifted to the club queen, won by North (Bathurst) with the ace. Bathurst exited a trump to declarer's ace. Diamond cashed all seven of his trump.

Dwyer pitched four clubs and a diamond. Diamond cashed his pointed kings. He exited his hand with the club ten to Dwyer's club jack. Kevin held only the spade jack. He was endplayed into allowing Diamond to collect his spade ace and take ten tricks. 10 IMPs to Diamond.

When Hampson overcalled 2NT on his 19 count, Greco had room for science. He used Stayman to check for four hearts in partner's hand. Hampson showed no major and Greco logically signed off in 3NT.

Kranyak led the spade queen which Hampson ducked. Fortunately for him, Kranyak held only two spades, but unfortunately for him, Kranyak also held only one red ace. Hampson led the heart queen. Kranyak won and played a diamond to Wolpert's ace. Wolpert cashed his spades and the contract was defeated four vulnerable tricks.

At the other table, Bathurst made a good decision to double, with only one full spade stopper. Diamond bid 3S over the double and when it got back to Bathurst, he chose 3NT. Dwyer knew the spade stopper was likely to be doubtful. He also knew partner was likely to hold four hearts. Backing up this thinking, he bid 4H.

Partner did not have four hearts, but his extra values were good for the game. Platnick led a club. Dwyer won the jack and played a heart to the king and a diamond to the queen. He played a heart to the jack and led another diamond won by Platnick's ace. Platnick played a spade, won with dummy's ace. Dwyer cashed clubs discarding a spade, trumped a spade in hand and cashed the diamond king for ten tricks.

Moyse would be proud! 14 IMPs to Kranyak.

You win the heart lead in hand with the queen and run the club ten losing to the queen. The spade ten is returned. How do you play?

If West started with a singleton honor, any play will work. If West started with a small singleton or doubleton, you must cover and win the trick. Finally, if West started with Honor doubleton, you duck and the spade suit will be blocked.

Christal Henner ducked, playing for West to hold honor/small.




