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

Beatty and Cohen were saved from playing in 4H light one with both red kings offside. Once Beatty opted to pass rather than bid 2NT directly over the preempt, they were shut out of the auction. 2S went down one.

At the other table, Mohan opened a multi 2D. Hayden overcalled 2NT; Meltzer made an aggressive 3C call; Bates bid 3D (presumably a transfer looking at his hand); Hayden bid 3S; Bates bid 3NT, and there they rested.

Meltzer got off to the lead of a fourth best club. Hayden won his CQ and played ace of hearts, a heart to dummy's jack and another heart, forcing out the king.

Meltzer cashed her CA and continued with a club to the king in dummy. Hayden cashed dummy's good hearts and exited with the jack of spades. Mohan rose and Hayden claimed ten tricks for +430 and 9 IMPs to Meltzer.

The play in 6C was swift and accurate. Passell led the HA and Beatty claimed 12 tricks. +1540 for North/South. Obviously the slam would have failed on the lead of a spade, but how was Passell to guess that?

In the other room, the play went almost as quickly in 5H. Bates led the diamond king followed by the diamond queen, overtaken by Hayden.

Hayden attempted to cash his CA. Meltzer ruffed this and claimed 11 tricks.

Meltzer was down quite a bit at this point. This was exactly the kind of board she needed.




Playing a strong club system worked very well on this hand for Hayden and Bates. Hayden made the strong, artificial opening bid, and Meltzer doubled to show the majors. That told Hayden he was facing a bad spade split. His opponents bid to 2H and he never took another call. When his partner bid 3C, he felt confident passing. His partner showed long clubs and the auction revealed that he couldn't hold many HCP.

Meltzer led the king of hearts and a heart to the ace. A diamond came back to the ace, and the jack of clubs was led to the queen and king. Mohan continued diamonds which Meltzer ruffed with her ace of trump. She exited with the HQ, ruffed in dummy. Hayden played a high club from dummy, drawing the outstanding trump and claimed nine tricks.

If Meltzer leads her singleton diamond, it matters not. Hayden can use his ace/king of spades to pitch a heart from dummy and Meltzer's diamond ruff is no more than a trick trade.

Beatty, playing a standard style system, opened 1S on the 17 HCP and five card suit. Passell overcalled 2H and Jacobus raised him to three. Beatty should have passed, realizing that his partner could not hold much in strength. Instead, he boldly bid 4D. With J9xxx, it was easy for Jacobus to double.

The defense took two high hearts and two high clubs off the top. Then they sat back and waited for their trump tricks. Beatty went down three for -800 and 14 IMPs to Lynch.



Wold and Jacobus had a good auction to stop in 2H. Feldman led a spade to Wold's ace. Wold cashed his spade jack, played a small diamond to the jack and king, ruffed the diamond return, and played ace of hearts, queen of hearts. Pollack won his king and played a third diamond, ruffed with the nine from Wold and overruffed with the ten from Feldman. All roads lead to seven tricks... contract down one.

In the other room, things were different. Cohen thought his hand good enough to jump shift. Beatty was sorry he ever responded and passed the jump shift. Three

clubs was a miserable spot. Passell led the DA and another diamond to the queen, ruffed by Cohen, shortening his already anemic trump holding. The heart ace and queen followed. Lynch won her king, Cohen pitching a diamond from the dummy. Carolyn exited her hand with a low diamond, ruffed with Passell's trump deuce. Passell played a heart which was ruffed with the five in dummy and overruffed with the seven by Lynch. Cohen claimed five tricks, conceding down four. -400 and 7 IMPs to Lynch... Clearly Steve should have passed in the first place if he was going to pass the jump shift. Segment 2 qualifies as one of the lowest scoring segments on record. Going into board 60, the score is Lynch 11, Meltzer 7! Meltzer, down nearly 70, needs some volatility to stay alive in the match.

What a hand ... slam off 2 aces and a diamond ruff... But wait! Passell didn't imagine his partner held the ace of spades. He wanted to defeat the contract so made an inspired lead: the H8!! Beatty must have been amazed when the singleton jack in dummy held the trick. But he wasn't out of danger yet... He still had to hope that Passell held the spade ace and couldn't give himself the ruff.

He played the ST off dummy. Jacobus flew with the ace... He was poised to beat the hand, however, he just could not believe his partner had a diamond ruff coming. Looking at all the clubs in dummy, he was certain the ruff was in clubs. Dutifully, he led back a club.

Passell followed suit and Beatty pulled trump and claimed... Making 980.

At the other table, Bates asked for aces. Pollack interferred with 5H, Hayden doubled showing none and they calmly settled in five spades, thinking it was a likely push. 11 IMPs to Meltzer

Meltzer had been down a lot coming into the final segment. At this point she had regained 35 of the deficit and was rolling along quite well... and then board 82 reared its ugly head.

he was pulling trump and taking the heart finesse through Pollack.

The other table was far more exciting. First, Cohen/Beatty arrived in 7H, not 7C. Both grands are cold so long as you take the percentage plays. Passell led the SK. Beatty won in hand, and drawing the inference, that the non-trump lead indicated an honor, he ran the H9 to Jacobus' queen. Down one! 16 IMPs to Lynch. Had Beatty made the hand, it would have been 13 IMPs to Meltzer. The good news is that they still would have fallen short of winning. Steve's play really is mathematically inferior. He could handle the 4-1 AND the singleton queen the other way (a heart to the king and the finesse). That's percentage and it would have worked.


