

Wheeler took ten tricks in 2H. With the trump J9 falling, there were eleven available but that is not so important in the part score. Deas was smart to pass the auction out at a low level. Her side has no game. She is not vulnerable, and, as it was, reopening with a double could only improve the opponent position.

At the other table, it was more interesting. Granovetter opened a 12-16 NT. Radin showed an unknown one suiter. With a lack of strength, but a possible source of seven club tricks plus the ace of diamonds, Stansby jumped to game.

Radin had to lead hearts from the top to defeat 3NT.

As usual, Judy was up to it. It was perfect for her. She led her ace, saw partner's nine, and continued with the king. If partner held singleton nine, there was nothing she could do about it anyway.

The contract could have been defeated six tricks, however, Sonsini pitched one of her spades and it went down only five! 2 IMPs to Sonsini

Passell and Lynch, for all their science (Precision), could not get past the level of game. Their counterparts in the other room, Kasle and Kozlove, despite aggressive interference by their opponents, used the most old-fashioned of methods (apropros in the Seniors) to get to the small slam. Both East/Wests took all 13 tricks on a red suit squeeze.

The opening lead at both tables was a spade. In 3NT, Passell won the spade and ran off six rounds of clubs, South suffering the discards of two hearts and one diamond. Now Mike took four rounds of diamonds. Done! +720

The play was somewhat different in six clubs (Declarer ruffed some hearts), but it could have been the same. Kasle, too, took all thirteen tricks. A blown opportunity for both teams ...

In the Street/Schwartz match, on this same hand, no one took 13 tricks! Everyone settled for twelve.

With no interference from Rubin and Granovetter, Schermer and Chambers got to the small slam from East, scoring +1370 after the lead of the HQ.

In the other room of that match, Chorush opened 2C, and again the opponents, Lev and Hamman, aggressively interferred. Lall bid 5C in the pass out position and Chorush, with a lot of controls, went quietly. Five clubs made six after the lead of a spade, Chorush, quite reasonably, not concerned about squeezes for seven while playing in game.

To lead aggressively or not to lead aggressively ... that is the question. Against Sally Wheeler's 4H, Beth Palmer chose to lead the spade jack. Wheeler won in hand, played the diamond jack toward dummy. When Palmer played small, Wheeler rose with the ace and finessed the ten to the queen in South. Palmer

continued her attack on spades. Wheeler won the king and played the trump ace followed by the diamond king, tossing the losing spade from dummy. The heart deuce went to the queen and king. The heart jack was cashed, and a club through the AQ produced the fourth trick for the defense... down one.

In the other room, Baker chose a very aggressive lead especially considering her obvious spade holding. She led her third best club from the king. Radin made swift work of the hand. She won the club with the queen and played ace of trump and a trump toward the queen, losing to the king. McCallum switched to the spade but it was too late. Radin was able to establish dummy's club jack for the pitch of her spade loser. Contact making ... 12 IMPs to Sonsini

Obviously the wheels came off the bus for Cohen/Sprung when Cohen cuebid her 2nd round club control. At both tables, East/West took their two minor suit aces ... 11 IMPs to Westheimer ... Sprung should have recognized that her

partner was showing second round control of clubs when she neglected to cue directly over the 3S bid. A 4C bid directly over 3S would have been clear 1st round control.


Five clubs is easy. There are only two

losers, the two black aces. At both the tables in 5C, the ace of spades went away when the declarer led toward the spade king and North ducked.

Against 3NT both Souths led a diamond. The transportation on the hand is miserable. If one sets up the clubs, it is useless because you cannot get there to use them. Declarer can only come to one club, two diamonds, four hearts (ducking one first), and one spade for eight tricks.

With clubs 3-3, twelve tricks are easy. In the Street/Schwartz match, the board was a push. In the Lynch/Kasle match, however, 13 IMPs went to Kasle when Passell/Lynch avoided the cold slam.

In three of the auctions, East, holding 17 HCP and a good five card suit, took the initiative and bid the slam. Carolyn invited. Mike was looking at a minimum.



Bernstein/Wheeler won this board in the auction. Wheeler's takeout double made it easy for Bernstein to take the save against four spades. Five hearts would probably have gone down two on a diamond lead. The defense would collect one diamond, one ruff, one spade, and one trump. (Declarer could pick up the QJ2 of trump in the slot but it is unlikely she will take that play after a diamond ruff by North.)

At the other table, Radin disdained the takeout double and simply passed her flat twelve count. Joanna Stansby's 2H call was artificial and showed a spade

raise. Sonsini did her best by doubling to she hearts, but with only three, Radin had nothing she could do.

Against both contracts, East chose the HT lead to partner's king. Sonsini continued with the HA. Granovetter lost two clubs and one heart for ten tricks.

Bernstein won her HK and shifted to a club. Wheeler won the queen and cashed the ace, hoping partner was short. In the end declarer came to 10 tricks again... down one... 12 IMPs to Baker

Cohen led the heart queen, Wolpert winning in hand. Jenny played a spade to dummy's nine, losing to Sprung's queen. Sprung switched to a diamond, won with the king, and the jack of spades was played and ducked. Wolpert switched to the diamond queen which Sprung won with her ace. Sprung exited a club which Wolpert won with her ace. Another spade went to the ten and ace, Sprung exiting with the spade seven to the king in dummy. Wolpert cashed her good diamonds and played a club to the king. She could come to only eight tricks and the contract was defeated.

At the other table, Disa led the heart king. Breed won and played her king of diamonds, ducked. She led the spade five to the ten and queen. Westheimer exited with the club seven, won by declarer with the ace. The jack of spades went to the ace and another club was led, declarer, realizing that she needed the queen onside and putting in the jack. When the jack held, Breed was in a good position.

She could safely collect two spades, three diamonds, three clubs, and a heart... contract makingl

It is hard to understand why both declarers went up with the club ace on the first round of that suit. Once the spade hook loses to the queen, declarer has one logical play to take nine tricks. She needs the queen of clubs onside. West had the opportunity to make the great deceptive play of winning the ace of spades instead of the queen. Declarer will think she has three spade tricks and she must retain the club king as a dummy entry. Assume East wins the ace of spades and returns a diamond, declarer wins and drives out the diamond ace. East ducks twice and returns a club. Declarer likely will rise ace, cash the fourth diamond and lead a small spade toward dummy, guarding against West holding queen doubleton... the plan being to capture the Qx, return to the SJ, and lead a club to dummy to cash the last spade.

continued to Passell's ace. Passell gave declarer a ruff and sluff and declarer played ace of diamonds and then led the queen over to the king. Passell ruffed this and the hand fell apart... down three.

In the other room, Fisher led his singleton spade against five clubs. If Hamilton wins it and gives Fisher a ruff, Fisher can still collect his heart ace for down one... however, Hamilton won the spade and switched to his singleton diamond, hoping Fisher held the DA. Street suffered the same fate as Stewart in the other match... Schwartz led ace of hearts, king of hearts, tapping dummy. Street played a trump to his king, a high club from hand, and led the spade queen. Graves won and continued hearts. East/West was able to tap out declarer's hand to defeat the contract three vulnerable tricks.

In the other room, Rubin led the heart ace and switched to the spade four. Declarer rose in dummy with the nine and Granovetter allowed that to hold. A diamond was led to the ace and the heart ten was ruffed small. A club to the king followed and the queen of spades was ducked around... East pitching his heart seven.

The king of spades was played and ducked, and the queen of diamonds followed, Granovetter pitching a heart! Schermer tried the deuce of clubs to the ace and Granovetter ruffed with the spade eight.

He waited so long to gain entry, all he could collect at this point was his trump ace. Schermer came to ten tricks and scored +620... a well earned 14 IMPs for Schwartz
