Baker bid an aggressive opening weak two in spades. Imagine Wolpert's surprise when it got to her in balancing seat. Levin led two high hearts and switched to a diamond through the king to partner's ace and queen. Wolpert continued with diamonds, Baker pitching a club from hand and winning in dummy. Baker cashed the club ace and played the king ruffed by Wolpert. In the end, Baker collected four tricks for down four.

There seems to be a lot of that going around... At the other table, Baker's teammates, Granovetter and Stansby found their way to 3NT after North

opened 1D. Westheimer led the DJ to declarer's queen. Stansby played a heart to the ace and a diamond to her ace. Another heart to the king followed. The HQ was cashed and a spade went to the jack and queen. Westheimer led a club and the hand imploded.

Down four at both tables created a 12 IMP swing for Westheimer.

Both Disa and Karen McCallum, sitting North, made minor suit takeout bids. Both of their partners, with 2-2 in the minors decided to pass. When Westheimer passed, Disa was stuck playing 2NT. Disa was lucky to find the diamond ace onside and the club ace/king on side. Stansby led the HK, won in dummy with the ace. Disa played a diamond to her king and a diamond to Granovetter's jack. Pam cashed the king and ace of clubs started on diamonds. When the smoke cleared, Disa was light one.


In the other room, Levin and Wolpert had a perfectly standard auction to arrive in 1NT. After two passes, McCallum doubled, obvious takeout for clubs and

diamonds. Baker had such good majors, she decided to convert the double to penalties. She led a diamond to McCallum's king. McCallum switched to her singleton heart through the king/queen to her partner's ace. Baker continued diamonds, won in dummy. Wolpert led a small spade off dummy, McCallum ducking and Baker winning the jack. A club to the ace followed, and a spade to McCallum's ace. Wolpert claimed five tricks and the contract failed by two for –500 and 12 IMPs back to Baker.

Stansby played in a normal 4H and made five for +650. At the other table, the auction was quite different. When Jenny Wolpert decided to bid only 2H, Baker became convinced that the hand belonged to her side. Wolpert sat back and watched the action. When it finally went pass/pass to her, she doubled. East/West had two hearts, two clubs and a diamond to lose before even counting their trump tricks. In the end, the contract was five light for +1400 E/W and 13 IMPs to Westheimer.







Against Lair, Ferguson led the deuce of clubs. Lair inserted the nine and it held, Onstott pitching the S8. Lair led a club to his ace, Onstott parting with the H6. Lair led another club toward dummy, Ferguson winning his king and Onstott pitching the D3. Ferguson thought his partner was showing the SK and he dutifully cashed the SA. This was a fatal play. Lair now had four club tricks, one spade, two hearts and two diamonds for nine. Contract making.

In the other room where there was major suit query, Simson led the H5. Becker won in hand, led a club to the nine, cashed the DA, and led a club to his ace, Aker pitching the five of diamonds and the four of spades. Becker led a club toward dummy and Simson rose with the king, Aker discarding the SQ. This was a key play because Simson knew that his partner did not hold the SK. Simson went back to hearts, Aker winning his queen. Aker exited another heart and declarer could come to only eight tricks: four clubs, two diamonds, and two hearts. Contract failing one trick.

It matters not which minor suit game you bid. As long as the defense gets spades going early, you get tapped too much to pull trump and knock out the two missing aces. It was a "minor victory" (no pun intended) to reach game from the West hand to even have a chance for success. (East would always lead his singleton club and there would be no stopping defeat.)

Both Norths found the lead of a spade.

Passell ruffed in dummy and immediately led a small club to his king and Schermer's ace. Schermer had no information about the distribution. With Passell playing clubs, he could not imagine he should be playing them too. He continued the attack on spades. Passell ruffed in dummy, played a heart to the queen and ruffed his other spade. He cashed the king of diamonds and a diamond to his hand, pulling off a successful dummy reversal and claiming up 11 tricks.

In the other room, Lev ruffed the spade in dummy, played a trump to his hand, and went about knocking out the heart ace. Having seven hearts and eight clubs, that might have appeared to be safer mathematically (sever communication to avoid a club ruff), however, it was a devastating decision as the cards lie. Wold won the heart ace and shifted to his singleton club. Bates won the club and gave Wold a ruff to defeat the game.

Sometimes the most scientific systems are just too complicated to handle an ordinary hand. Graves and Schwartz had an aggressive but accurate auction to arrive in 6S. They needed some luck to make it, but two of three finesses is not the worst we've ever seen. Wold led a heart; Schwartz put up the queen from dummy; Bates ducked. Schwartz led a spade off the board to his ten and Wold's jack. Wold led another heart. Schwartz won in hand and played ace of diamonds and a small diamond, ruffed with the nine. He finessed the spade king, pulled the remaining trump and took 12 tricks.

At the other table, something went awry. Passell and Hayden stopped in six clubs, their seven card fit. Chambers led the DJ. Hayden won and played ace of clubs and the jack of clubs to the king (Chambers ducking). Communication is tangled on the hand even if Chambers let the jack of clubs ride. Once he went up with the king, Chambers had two trump tricks and the contract was defeated one trick. 17 IMPs to Schwartz
