On Wednesday night, Stan and I played a practice session online with Ralph Katz and Nick Nickell.

On Board 6, Ralph demonstrated the great instincts for which he is known.

Ralph opened 1C. Stan overcalled 4H. Nick and I passed, and Ralph jumped to the club slam!!

Stan led the DA... intending to win the trick and wait for his other trick in the trump suit.

Ralph ruffed the diamond, played the ace/king of spades pitching a heart from dummy. He played a third round of spades and Stan was helpless.

Stan ruffed with the CJ and exited the CK. Ralph won in hand and claimed.
-1540 for us! 16.6 IMPs to East/West

No one else bid the slam. Most pairs played in 4H.

During the post mortem, we realized that had Stan led a heart, we could have defeated the contract. This is not at all obvious but on a heart lead, declarer wins the HA and cashes the SA and SK discarding a heart from dummy. Next he trumps a heart and trumps a diamond. He leads a spade and South must discard the DA!!!! If declarer tries to trump a diamond to his hand, South overruffs and plays a trump. Declarer finds himself left with a losing spade...

The double might have helped declarer, but who wouldn't double with two trump honors over the club bidder and a side ace in an unbid suit? And maybe the double was no help at all...


Interestingly, if Katz had simply bid and made 5C, he would won 12 IMPs!

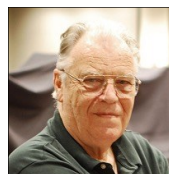
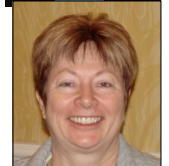
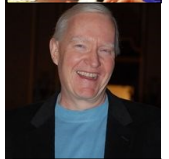
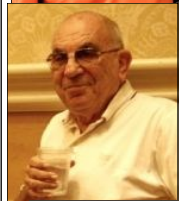
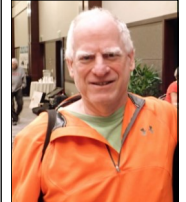

To kibitz, go to <https://kibitz.realbridge.online/>, enter your name and click on Log In. You will be taken to a screen where you select to kibitz the JLall4 event.

After you select Kibitz JLall Online Teams #4, you will be taken to a lobby where you will see a list of tables on the left and a chat box and list of people in the lobby on the right. The table listing shows the team & player names at each table. In the middle of the table, immediately under the table number, you will see the board # and trick # in play. There will be information about the number of kibitzers at a table and whether there is audio/video commentary (a picture of a TV means there is). Click on a table.

At the table, you will see a hand diagram, and the bidding and play as it happened. You do not get to hear or see the players yet (that's coming).

There is a chat window on the right of the screen. Anyone can type chat into the chat window.

To get more information:

If there is an asterisk next to a bid, that means it was Alerted or Explained. Click on the bid to see.

-- "Rewind" the play by moving the vertical handle on the slider underneath the table to the left.

-- Click on the "Scores" button to the left of the South player's name to get a scorecard for the match so far. You can use this to get lots of information:

----Click on a board number to see the hand record and results at all of the tables.

----Click on a number in a yellow box to get to the hand record from some screens.

----In the hand record screen, click on a result to see the bidding and play at a specific table.

----In the upper left corner:

----Click on the yellow box with 4 little boxes to get the match scores for all the matches (that will be IMPs and for the Round Robin will not include scores from previous rounds).

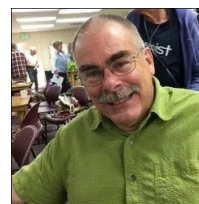
----Click on the yellow box with 3 bulleted lines to get Cross-IMPs for for this match).

The Scores information is also available in the lobby using the button at the upper right.

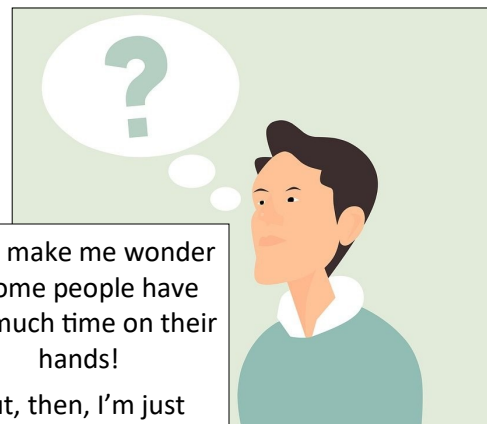
TIMING OF DEFERRAL

The Round Robin matches will be deferred until each round is complete.

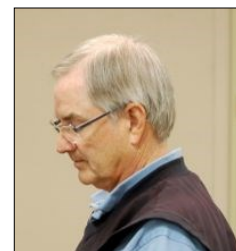
The first half KO matches will be deferred for half an hour or until each board has been played at all tables, so there may be a period when nothing new is being shown because one table is very slow to play the board. **For the second half of the KO matches, the delay will be until the quarter is complete. This prevents players from accessing useful state of match information. It also means that the 3rd quarter kibitzing will start at 7:10 EDT.**

Bridge News Around the Globe

Professor Martin Seligman is the keynote speaker at BAMSA's virtual conference in June. All aspects of bridge (the good, the bad, and the ground-breaking) will be discussed during the four-day event.

Organised by *Bridge: A MindSport for All* (BAMSA), the conference will showcase research and innovation. A key aim of the conference is to inspire the bridge community to promote bridge more widely in society. The conference opens on **Monday 28 June**.

The conference title is Bridging Academia, Policy and Practice. More than 60 presenters and panelists from 20 countries are contributing to the programme.

The conference is an international forum for academics, bridge players, organizers and policymakers. Local, national and international bridge organisations will all be represented.

The event will provide a relaxed online environment in which to share ideas, review good practice and focus on solutions.

Martin Seligman

Professor Martin Seligman will deliver the keynote address. He is the founder of positive psychology and author of more than 30 books on learning and motivation.

Professor Seligman is also a life-long bridge player. He has won more than 50 regional championships and is an ACBL Platinum Life Master. He says of himself: 'I'm a serious, but mediocre player, and I love the game.'

Online cheating

Sessions will consider the challenges facing the bridge sector: the collapse of face-to-face bridge in 2020 and the hybrid future of the game after covid-19. The bridge world is in a state of flux. However, the huge take-up of online bridge and pioneering approaches to teaching, recruitment and marketing give cause for optimism.

European champion bridge player, Boye Brogeland (pictured) is a panelist for the session on cheating in online bridge on Tuesday 29 June.

In 2015 Boye led a campaign to expose cheating at the top level of tournament bridge. Many in the bridge community refer to Boye as 'the sheriff' for his commitment to rooting out malpractice.

Academic lens

Theoretical sessions will illustrate academic thinking and conceptual frameworks used to understand and analyse bridge. Up for discussion are definitions of sport, mindsport and serious leisure.

For non-academics, the theoretical sessions will shed light on the way in which bridge is treated sociologically by academics. The programme also covers gender, ageing, and interaction between people of different generations in the context of bridge.

Video presentations

The majority of the conference presentations have been pre-recorded especially for the conference. By releasing the video presentations in May, the conference organizers have allowed participants plenty of time to watch them in advance.

Debates during the live sessions will assume participants are already familiar with the presentations. There is great range and diversity among the videos, and they all make excellent viewing.

Online programme

The conference has eight sessions, two per day, and each day has its own theme. Participants can book any number of sessions from just one to all eight.

The themes are: Day 1 Bridge as a Mindsport; Day 2 Digital Bridge: Opportunities and Challenges; Day 3 Healthy Ageing, Intergenerationality and Gender; Day 4 Education, Development and Marketing.

Each session has its own webpage with all the details of speakers and panelists, and links to pre-recorded presentations.

Some Suggestions For Dining at Home Between Sessions! Pandemic Pleasures...

Krumkaker

These crispy and light wafers are a Christmas favorite, typically made in a cylinder or a cone shape. They also work well as snacks for kibitzing bridge! For an extra rich treat, fill them with whipped cream. If you do not have a *krumkaker* iron, a pizzelle or other wafer iron can also be used.



Ingredients

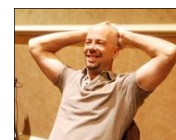
- 4 lg eggs
- $\frac{3}{4}$ C + 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ T (160 g) sugar
- $\frac{3}{4}$ C + 2 T (200 g) butter, melted and cooled
- 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ C + 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ T (200 g) flour
- 1 tsp (2 g) ground cardamom

Directions

Cream together eggs and sugar. Add butter, flour and cardamom; mix well. Let batter rest 1 hour; drop a large spoonful into the center of a *krumkaker* iron. Cook for 1 minute, then quickly roll wafer around a stick (about as thick as a finger) or wooden cone form to hold curled shape; remove from stick and set aside to cool.

- **Prep time: 1 hour & 10 minutes**
- **Cook time: 1 minutes**
- **Rest time: 1 hour**
- **Makes about 3 dozen**

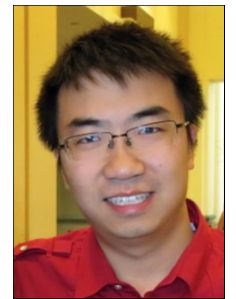
Sand Cookies

Sand cookies, very common in Norway, are frequently served during holiday parties. They are made in *sandkaker* tins, but you can substitute a small tartlet pan. They are tasty plain, or for a treat, top them with whipped cream and berries.



Ingredients

- 1 C + 1 T (250 g) butter*
- 1 C (190 g) sugar
- 1 lg egg
- 1 C + 3 T (100 g) blanched, ground almonds**
- 3 C (375 g) flour



Directions

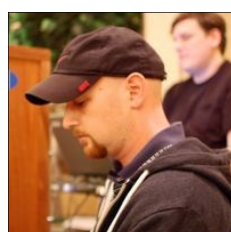
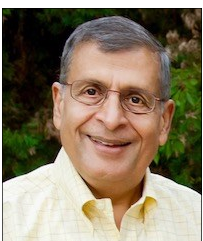
Cream together butter and sugar; beat in egg. Add almonds and flour; mix well. Let rest overnight. Press into small tart molds. Place on a baking sheet; bake at 350°F (176°C), about 12-15 minutes, or until slightly brown at the edges. Cool about 7-10 minutes before removing from tart pans; cool on a wire rack.

* *Do not substitute margarine, as the flavor relies on good quality butter.*

** *Ideally, blanch and grind the almonds the day before.*

- **Prep time: 45 minutes.**
- **Cook time: 15 minutes.**
- **Rest time: overnight.**
- **Makes 36 sandkaker, depending on mold size.**

Chicken Trinidad with Orange Rum Sauce

The fresh, tropical flavors of Caribbean regional cuisine are a lively delight, and this delicious recipe is no exception. A splash of rum is often found in traditional Caribbean recipes, and this sweet, creamy orange rum sauce is the perfect complement to the lightly spiced, coconut-dipped rounds of chicken breast mixed with almonds and apple.

Ingredients

CHICKEN:

- 4 6-oz (170-g) chicken breasts, boneless
- 2 T (30 ml) Angostura bitters
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1 lg apple, peeled and finely diced
- ¾ C (129 g) almonds, chopped
- Canola or vegetable oil for frying
- 1 C (125 g) flour
- 3 lg eggs, beaten
- 1 C (75 g) grated unsweetened coconut

SAUCE:

- 2 C (473 ml) orange juice
- 2 oz (57 ml) rum
- ¾ C (173 g) cold unsalted butter, cut into small pieces
- 4 T (59 ml) heavy cream

GARNISH:

- Crushed red pepper flakes, to taste
- Chopped parsley, to taste

Directions

Preheat oven to 350°F (177°C).

Place the breasts between sheets of plastic wrap and pound with a mallet until very flat; remove plastic wrap. Using a pastry brush, brush breasts with bitters and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Spread apple and almonds over the breasts and roll up, securing ends with toothpicks.

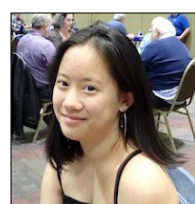
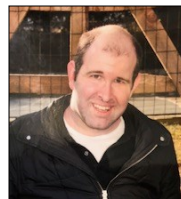
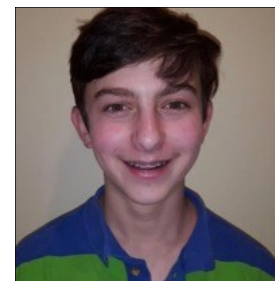
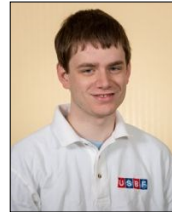
Heat 3 inches of oil in a large deep saucepan. Place saucepan over medium heat until oil reaches 350°F (177°C).

Meanwhile, place flour on a plate, eggs in a shallow bowl and coconut on a plate. Dip each breast in flour, shaking to remove excess. Dip in egg, then roll in coconut. Using tongs, lower chicken into oil and fry, 2 pieces at a time, until golden brown, about 4 minutes. Transfer to a baking sheet and place in the oven to finishing cooking, about 17 minutes. Remove from heat and cover to keep warm.

To make the sauce, place orange juice in a deep saucepan and bring to a simmer over medium heat, adjusting so that orange juice doesn't boil over. Let cook until reduced by half, about 10 minutes. Add rum and cook for 5 minutes. Remove from heat and whisk in the butter a little at a time. Stir in heavy cream.

To serve, pour a little sauce on plates. Slice the breasts diagonally and place on top of sauce. Garnish with red pepper flakes or parsley and serve immediately.

- **Makes 4 large or 8 small servings.**



Joel Powhatan Wooldridge (born July 19, 1979 in Buffalo, NY) is a multi national champion and world junior champion in contract bridge as well as an expert foosball player. In 1990, Wooldridge broke Sam Hirschman's previous record for the youngest to achieve Life Master status with the American Contract Bridge League surpassing the mark of 11 years, 9 months and 5 days with a new record of 11 years, 4 months and 13 days. Sam's brother Dan broke Joel's record four years later. Wooldridge lives in New York City.



Board 7 in the Hall vs Wolfson match of the District 9 Online Grand National Teams was maximum punishment for the innocent Wolfson squad.

Wolfson/Berkowitz landed in the makeable contract of 6C off only the cashing ace of hearts with 12 winners. When their opponents failed to lead a heart, 13 tricks came home, the losing hearts pitched on the long spades and the DK.

It looked to them like a probable push!

At the other table, Kim Hall, North, and her partner, Sue Elias, South, apparently had a keycard misunderstanding and contracted for all 13 tricks!

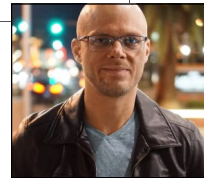

South opened 1NT; North bid 2S showing clubs; 2NT was a super acceptance; 4C was 1430 KC and in the blink of an eye, North/South was in the grand slam.

Had the hand with the HA been on lead, it would have been no more than a failed grand slam off a cashing ace, however, on lead with the East hand, a heart lead is not even one of the first several choices.

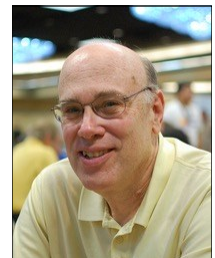
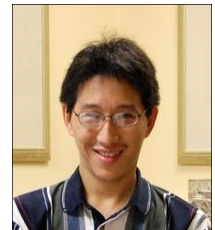

The highest-ranking Supporting Member in the fantasy brackets for each of these two events will win the prize of your choice - either an online match against the USBC winners or dinner with them at the next NABC.
2. Receive daily emails during the USBF Championships. These will summarize the previous day's results and provide vugraph information and links to daily bulletins containing pictures and commentary on individual hands.
3. Upon advanced request, make arrangements for you to kibitz a USBF member of your choice for a session once each year – either at an NABC or the USBF Championships.
4. Upon advanced request, we will arrange for you to be one of the vugraph commentators for one session of the team trials.

A Supporting Membership is \$25 for one year (\$75 for 3 years) and the ACBL now offers you the chance to become an USBF Supporting Member when you renew your ACBL membership. If you don't want to wait that long, you can join by choosing the red Donate Now button on the USBF website. Your donation will be used to cover inevitable expenses: attorney fees, accounting fees, website support services, tournament directors, insurance, WBF dues, and vugraph operators. The USBF is an all-volunteer organization. Our meetings are by conference call and at NABCS. Board members and the organization's officers are not compensated for meetings, travel, or hotel expenses.
