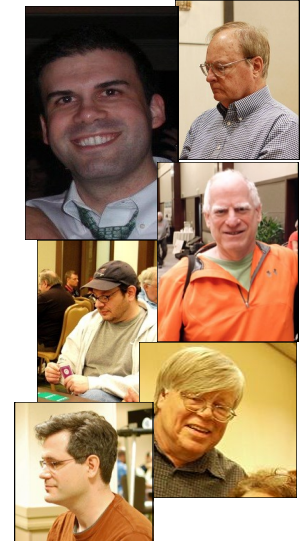

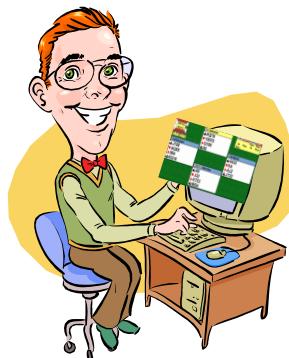

How a hand's bid and played!

To kibitz, go to [the RealBridge kibitzing website](#), enter your name and click on Log In. That will take you to a screen where you can select the event to kibitz.

After you select Kibitz JLall Online Teams #5, you will be taken to a lobby with a list of tables on the left and a chat box and list of people on the right. The table listing shows the team & player names at each table, as well as the board being played. There will be information about the number of kibitzers and whether there is audio/video commentary (a picture of a TV means there is). Click on a table to kibitz it.

At the table, you will see a hand diagram, and the bidding and play as it happened.

There is a chat window on the right of the screen. You can type chat into the chat window.

Some things you can do to get more information:

If there is an asterisk next to a bid, that means it was Alerted/Explained. Click on the bid to see the explanation.

-- "Rewind" using the slider underneath the "table." Move the handle to the left to go to earlier tricks.

-- Click on the "Scores" button to the left of the South player's name to get a scorecard for the match.

----Click on a board number to see the hand record and results at all of the tables.

----You can also click on a number in a yellow box to get to the hand record from some screens.

----In the hand record screen, click on a result to see the bidding and play at a specific table.

--In the upper left corner:

----Click on the yellow box with 4 little boxes to get the match scores for all the matches (that will be IMPs and for the Round Robin will not include scores from previous rounds).

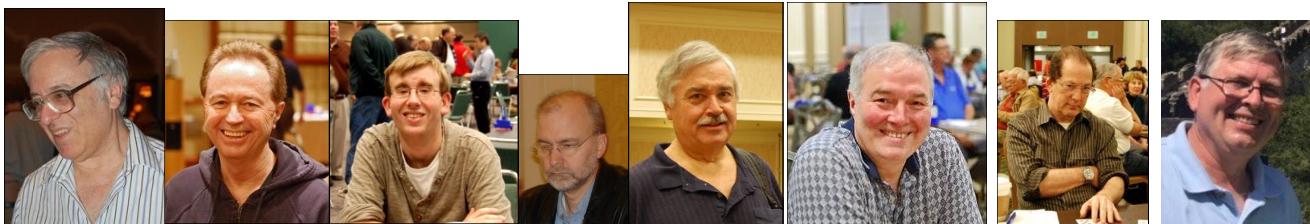
----Click on the yellow box with 3 bulleted lines to get Cross-IMPs for the pairs (that will be just for this match).

The Scores information is also available in the lobby using the button at the upper right should you want to check on scores before deciding which table to watch.

TIMING OF DEFERRAL

The Round Robin matches will be deferred until each round is completed.

The first half KO matches will be deferred for half an hour or until each board has been played at all tables, so there may sometimes be a period when nothing new is being shown because one or two tables are very slow to play the board. **For the second half of the KO matches, the delay will be until the quarter is scheduled to be completed, so players will not be able to get useful state of match information. That means that the 3rd quarter kibitzing will start at 6:25 EST.**

These days everyone says, "Stay safe!" meaning Avoid Covid! But on this hand from the first match of the Round Robin, "stay safe!" means to protect that king of spades!!

In the Rasmussen/Bishel match, Bi and Watson of the Rasmussen team were careful to heed that advice. Playing a more or less natural system of bidding, the auction went 1C by East; 1H by West; 2H by East; and West bid 3NT showing game going values and checking for 3 or 4 hearts in partner's hand. Bi passed.

Clerkin led a fourth best spade and Watson won his ten. He cashed the CJ, played the C2 to dummy's ace, played a diamond to the ace in case the queen was singleton. He cashed the CQ, played a club to dummy's king and took the diamond finesse against South. Once South showed out of clubs on the second round, the odds favored his holding the length in diamonds.

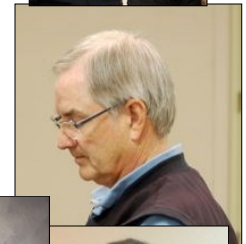
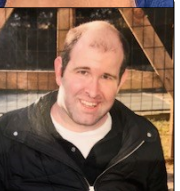
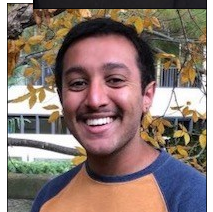
Watson collected ten tricks and scored +630.

At the other table, Tom Bishel, playing something akin to Polish Club, started with 1C showing 12-14 balanced or 16+ with clubs or any 18+. John Bishel responded with 1H showing 4+ hearts and 6+ points. Tom bid 1NT confirming the 12-14 balanced and John raised to game.

Rasmussen had little hope that his side would defeat 3NT looking at his paltry two-count. He led a second from top spade not wanting to over excite his partner and was rewarded

dummy's ten was won with Tsyarkin's queen. The defense quickly cashed five spades and conceded.

12 IMPs to Rasmussen who finished that match 42-0!



Meet the Players:



According to information at dennisdawsonbridge.com, **Dennis Dawson** is known for his logical explanations and “cards on the table” approach. He has taught thousands of people to enjoy the game more since 1975. He is a Grand Life Master of the American Contract Bridge League, a National Champion, and a World Championship Bronze Medalist. He has won more than 16,000 masterpoints and over 250 regional events. Hands he has played have appeared in nationally syndicated bridge columns, as well as the New York Times. He is in the Encyclopedia of Bridge. Dennis is the author of Santa Fe Precision.

Santa Fe Precision is quite different. It is a very simplified version, based on the system played by Rodwell and Meckstroth so successfully, but aimed at club players.

Dennis Dawson learned Meckwell Lite fifteen years ago when playing on teams with Rodwell and Meckstroth. He then used it while representing the US in the Senior World Team Championship, in which he won a bronze medal.

Dawson's students in Santa Fe wanted to learn the system, so he made some changes to make it easier for them to remember. That version is the basis of this book, which includes many examples from thirteen years of teaching the system.

Over the years, Dennis has worked with and produced some star-studded players. At the JLall5, Dennis is captain of the Dawson team which includes Charlie Wilkins, Mark Itabashi, Disa, Ifti Baqai and Mitch Dunitz.

24 of the 32 pairs in this event played Board 16 of the second segment in 4H. 23 pairs were successful, most making with one or two overtricks by establishing the club suit for pitches. One pair went down one playing the contract from South on a strong club auction. The CJ was led and declarer misguessed the HQ and later took the finesse for the CT losing to West and conceding a trick in each suit.

In Lewis/Vance, both tables played in 3NT from South. Both Wests led the D7.

When Wojewoda was declarer, he ducked the DT and Josh Donn continued with the DJ. Declarer won in hand, played a heart to the ace and took the heart finesse through East. When that worked, he cashed two rounds of spades ending in dummy and cashed the two remaining hearts. He played a club to the ace and had nine tricks.

In the other room, Linda Lewis won the opening diamond. She cashed the HK and took the heart finesse against West. Vance scooped up his HQ and East/West cashed out their diamonds. Contract failing by a trick.

10 IMPs to Vance.

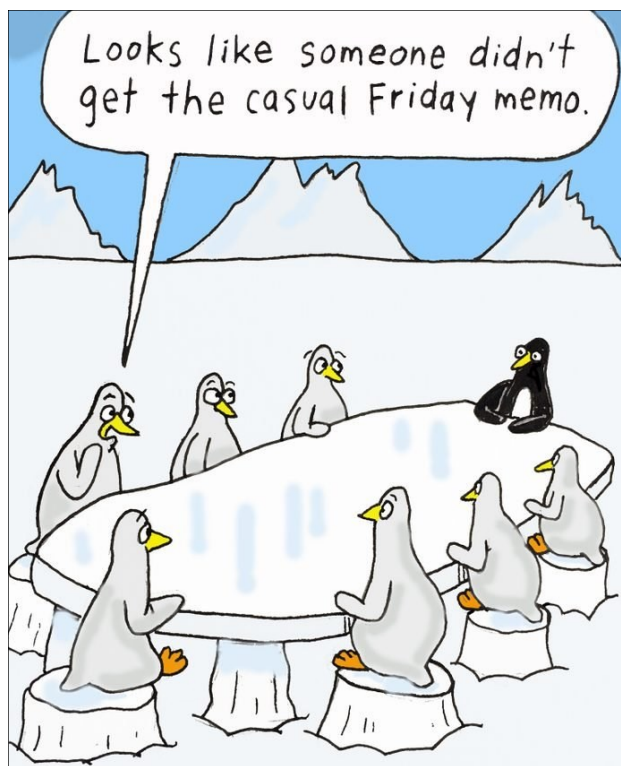
Vance went on to carry the set 40-11, losing IMPs on only one board where Lai/Vance failed to bid a vulnerable game that was bid and made at the other table.

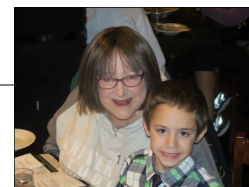
COQ AU VIN

- 6–8 lb (2.7–3.6 kg) chicken, cut into 8 pieces
- 3 bay leaves
- ½ tsp (1.4 g) peppercorns
- 3 cloves garlic, crushed
- 2 Tbsp (29 g) unsalted butter
- 2 C (500 ml) Bordeaux or Burgundy wine
- Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste
- 2 med carrots, chopped
- 1 C (59 g) button mushrooms
- 1 med white onion, chopped
- 1 C (100 g) pearl onions, peeled
- 1 med leek, sliced
- ¼ C (31 g) flour
- 4 sprigs fresh thyme
- 4 sprigs fresh rosemary
- 2 Tbsp (2.5 g) flat leaf parsley, chopped

COQ AU VIN

Place chicken in a large bowl. Add bay leaves, peppercorns, garlic and wine. Cover and refrigerate for 24 hours. The next day, preheat oven to 350°F (177°C). Remove chicken and reserve marinade; pat chicken dry; season with salt and pepper. In an oven-proof pot over medium-high heat, melt butter and brown chicken; remove and set aside. Add carrots, mushrooms, onion, pearl onions and leek to same pot; cook until golden, stirring often. Sprinkle flour over vegetables; return chicken to pot and add reserved marinade, stirring to combine. Add thyme and rosemary sprigs; cover and bake 1 hour. Discard herb sprigs and serve, garnished with parsley.

SERVING SUGGESTION

Traditionally served over buttered egg noodles or roasted new potatoes, coq au vin also goes well with polenta or on its own with a crusty loaf of sourdough bread.

Ingredients

FILLING

- 1 med onion, finely chopped
- 2 Tbsp (30 g) olive oil
- 1 lb (454 g) ground pork
- 1 lb (454 g) ground beef
- 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1 tsp (5 g) salt
- 2 tsp (8 g) pepper
- 1 Tbsp (7 g) paprika
- 1 C (161 g) cooked rice

WRAP

- 2 heads green cabbage
- Large pot of boiling water

SAUCE & ASSEMBLY

- 1 Tbsp (7 g) paprika
- 1 tsp (5 g) salt
- 2 tsp (8 g) pepper
- 1 (14.5 oz) (444 g) can tomato soup
- 1 (14.5 oz) (444 g) can sauerkraut
- 1 (28 oz) (858 g) can diced tomatoes
- Sour cream

Directions

FILLING

Sauté onion in oil until soft; add meat, garlic, salt, pepper and paprika; cook until browned. Drain off any excess fat and transfer filling to a bowl; stir in rice.

WRAP

Core cabbages; place whole cabbage in a boiling water just until outer leaves. Remove, and peel off outer wilted leaves. Return cabbage to water; repeating process until all leaves have been peeled from cabbage.

SAUCE & ASSEMBLY

Combine all sauce ingredients in a pot and simmer. Place 1-2 T (14-28 g) of filling in each cabbage leaf; fold sides in and roll up. If desired, use a toothpick to secure. Carefully place rolls into sauce and simmer 60–90 minutes or until tender. Serve rolls garnished with a dollop of sour cream.

Pulled Pork Sandwich

Ingredients

BBQ SAUCE

- 1½ C (338 g) ketchup
- ½ C (126 g) yellow mustard
- ½ C (120 g) dark brown sugar, packed
- 3 med cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 3 Tbsp (45 ml) apple cider vinegar
- 3 Tbsp (45 ml) Worcestershire
- 2 Tbsp (21.5 g) Cajun seasoning
- ½ C (120 ml) water

PULLED PORK

- 1 yellow onion, thinly sliced
- 4 med cloves garlic, crushed
- 2 C (473 ml) chicken stock or low sodium chicken broth
- 3 Tbsp (32 g) Cajun seasoning
- 1 Tbsp (15 g) dark brown sugar, packed
- 4½–5 lb (2–2¼ kg) boneless or bone-in pork shoulder (also known as pork butt), twine or netting removed

COLESLAW

- ½ head red cabbage, finely shredded
- ½ head green cabbage, finely shredded
- 2 lg carrots, finely shredded
- ½ red onion, finely sliced
- ¾ C (172 g) mayonnaise
- 3 Tbsp (45 ml) apple cider vinegar
- 2 Tbsp (24 g) sugar
- Salt and pepper to taste

PLATING

- 15 soft hamburger buns

Directions

BBQ SAUCE

Combine all ingredients in a small saucepan over medium. Bring to a boil, stirring until ingredients are completely incorporated; reduce heat to low and simmer gently until sauce has thickened enough to coat the back of a spoon, 30 to 40 minutes. Remove from heat and let cool to room temperature. If not using right away, cover and refrigerate for up to two weeks.

PULLED PORK

Preheat oven to 275°F (135°C). Spread out onions and garlic in an even layer in a roasting pan; pour in chicken stock. Combine Cajun seasoning and brown sugar in a small bowl. Pat pork shoulder dry with paper towels, then rub all over with spice mixture. Set pork on top of onions and garlic and cover roasting pan with foil; transfer to oven and cook until pork is fork tender, 6 to 8 hours. Transfer pork to a cutting board to cool; strain cooking liquid through a fine-mesh sieve and reserve. If pork has a bone, remove and discard it. With two forks, shred meat into bite-size pieces, discarding any large pieces of fat; return shredded meat to roasting pan. Add 2 C BBQ Sauce and a bit of reserved cooking liquid if too dry.

COLESLAW

Combine red and green cabbage, carrot, and red onion in a large bowl. Whisk mayonnaise, vinegar, sugar, and salt and pepper together in a medium bowl, then add to cabbage mixture; mix well to combine. Taste for seasoning; adjust with more salt, pepper or sugar as needed.

PLATING

Serve pulled pork on buns topped with coleslaw.

At the other table, Grue and Moss bid to 3NT.

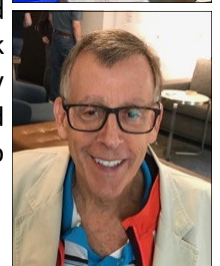

Stark opened 1S. Grue doubled. Baseggio bid 2S showing 4-7 points and a spade raise. Stark upped the ante with his 5/5 in the majors by bidding 3S. Joe would not be deterred. He had a spade stopper and this was his last chance to show it. He bid 3NT and everyone passed.



On virtually any lead but a diamond, declarer has no chance. A spade lead makes the contract easy to defeat. A heart or club lead will also defeat the game by giving nothing away.



Unfortunately for Baseggio, his best and longest suit, diamonds was headed by the QT98. Any honor in partner's hand would vindicate the lead and work out fine.



Stark gets the holding penalty! His singleton six was not what Baseggio needed.

Grue won his DJ and played the CK to Stark's ace. Stark cashed the SA but it was too late. Grue had three diamonds, one spade, two hearts and three clubs.

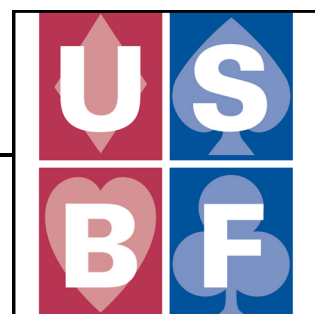

Only one pair reached the aggressive 6D contract on Board 30 of the third match. Not surprisingly, one of the youngest players in the event was involved.

Eric Xiao, a member of the USBF Under-16 Junior team, opened a weak 2D (6-10 HCP) bid in first seat. Eric's father, Victor, bid 2H asking about the suit and overall quality of Eric's hand. Eric's 2NT response showed a good hand and a weak suit.

Victor Xiao was faced with a quandary. He knew slam was a possibility if Eric held the right hand. Unfortunately for Victor, his son's 2NT bid showing a good hand and a weak suit did not improve his position.

If Eric held a bad hand and a weak suit, he could sign-off and give up on slam.

If Eric held a good suit and a good hand, slam would probably be a reasonable proposition.

As is frequently the case in Ogust auctions, partner's response while informative, still leaves one guessing. In this case Victor guessed well and Eric brought home the slam.

Victor liked his prime values and jumped to 6D.

Slam required a bit of luck. North must hold either Kx, KT or Kxx in the diamond suit to avoid a trump loser and declarer needs to limit himself to one loser in either clubs or spades.

Dana Berkowitz led the C3. Xiao ducked this to North's queen. Ginossar returned a heart. Xiao won the HA and led the DQ. North ducked, and Eric continued with the DJ.

When trumps worked, Xiao claimed twelve tricks, using the fourth club to discard his spade loser and score +920. At the other table Migry/Willenken stopped in a mundane 3NT and took twelve tricks for +490. (Ed. Note: If I am to believe Facebook, Migry was probably quite tired at the time this hand was played. According to her posts, she appears to be in Israel where there is a significant time difference!)

10 IMPs to Xiao

The play of this hand is really quite interesting. If the opening lead is a heart, declarer needs to play carefully to combine their black suit chances. To do this, declarer should win the heart in dummy and draw trumps. They can play a heart to the ace and run the SJ. As the cards lie, North is endplayed!!

If North exits with a club, declarer needs to guess whether to play the CJ or duck to dummy's C9. If they guess wrong, they can cash a second high club to see if the other honor drops. If the honor doesn't drop, declarer can cross to hand in trumps and take a spade finesse to discard their losing club.

On Board 47 of the fifth round, Doug Simson opened 1D (Precision showing 2+ diamonds and fewer than 17 HCP). Michael Rosenberg overcalled a natural 2D.

At this vulnerability, one would expect Michael to have a good hand and a good suit. With 18 HCP and a semi-solid six card suit, Michael certainly had his bid. Jeff Aker made a negative (take-out) double.

Zach Grossack, known for taking no prisoners, jumped to 3S, a highly aggressive fit-showing jump in support of diamonds. His diamond support is three cards long and his spade suit is pretty anemic.

Simson doubled and Rosenberg bid 3NT expecting to succeed. Zach ran to 4D, likely hoping to avoid a double!

Simson, undeterred, doubled 4D and Aker led the HJ. Simson won the HA and played a small diamond. Rosenberg won the D8 in dummy and led a club to the king. Aker won the CA and exited with a heart to Rosenberg.

Michael played a club to the jack. Simson won the queen and played the DA and a second diamond.

Rosenberg conceded a club loser and escaped for -500. Unlucky for North/South, East/West has no makeable game and par was +90 North/South for playing in 2D.

At the other table, Frank Merblum and Walter Lee stopped in 3D undoubled and were defeated one trick.

Note that North/South can always collect seven tricks in NT. The only N/S pair to play in NT was in 1NT. That was Kerr and Reynolds. The HT was led and ducked to the king. Kerr knocked out the DA in three rounds and West cashed their HA and played a heart. Kerr made two for +120. Rosenberg/Grossack might have been better off to rest in 3NT.
