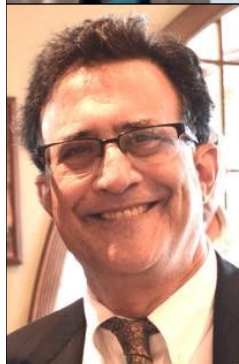
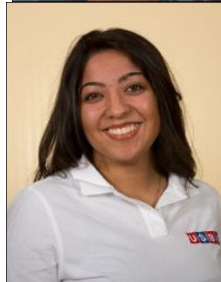

To kibitz, go to **kibitz.realbridge.online**. Select JLall Online Teams#7. You will be taken to a lobby where you will see a list of tables on the left and a chat box and list of people in the lobby on the right. The table listing shows the team & player names at each table. There will also be information about the number of kibitzers and whether there is audio/video commentary (a picture of a TV means there is). At the table, you will see a hand diagram with the bidding and play as it happens.

There is a chat window on the right. You can type into that window.

If there is an asterisk next to a bid, that means it was Alerted or Explained. Click on the bid to see the explanation if there was one.

-- "Rewind" play using the slider underneath the table with the hand diagram.

-- Click on the "Scores" button to the left of the South player's name to get a scorecard for the match.

----Click on a board number to see the hand record and results at all of the tables.

----Click on a number in a yellow box to get to the hand record from some screens.

----In the hand record screen, click on a result to see the bidding and play at a specific table.

--In the upper left corner:

----Click on the yellow box with 4 little boxes to get the match scores for all the matches (that will be IMPs and for the Round Robin will not include scores from previous rounds).

----Click on the yellow box with 3 bulleted lines to get Cross-IMPs for the pairs (that will be just for this match).

The Scores information is also available in the lobby using the button at the upper right, in case you want to check on scores before deciding which table to watch.

TIMING OF DEFERRAL

The Round Robin matches will be deferred until each round is completed.

The KO matches will be deferred for half an hour or until each board has been played at all tables, so there may sometimes be a period when nothing new is being shown because one or two tables are very slow to play the board.


Sheng won his singleton CA and played a diamond. Chorush won his singleton DA and continued clubs.

In Rogoff/Tebha, Jack Zhao opened a Precision 1D with the East hand in third seat. Zolotov was stuck for a bid and chose an imperfect but fairly descriptive 1NT with his singleton CA and 14 HCP. His bid showed 15-18!

Tebha disdained Stayman with her four spades and jumped to the no-trump game.

Stamatov had three 4-card suits from which to lead. The absence of Stayman made a major suit lead look attractive. Stamatov's hearts were a pip better than his spades (literally) so he chose the H9 (Rusinow).

Zhao was faced with a dilemma: Were his partner's hearts KT9x(x) or T9xx(x)?

If his partner held T9xx or T9xxx, he needed to win the HA and shift to a club so his partner could win the DA and clear the club suit before declarer knocked out the SA. Declarer could then come to no more than 8 tricks with the heart finesse.

If Stamatov held KT9x or KT9xx, Zhao needed to win the heart and continue the heart attack. At the table, he made the "discovery play" of inserting the HQ. Unlucky for him, this gave declarer the timing to drive out both the DA and SA to score nine tricks.

Some Suggestions For Dining at Home Between Sessions! Pandemic Pleasures...

Corn Casserole

Ingredients

- 4 ears white corn
- 4 ears yellow corn
- 3 Tbsp (43 g) unsalted butter
- 1 Tbsp (15 ml) bacon drippings, or vegetable oil
- 2 med yellow onion, finely diced
- 1 med green bell pepper, finely diced
- 1 med red bell pepper, finely diced
- 1 Tbsp (15 ml) water
- 2 med tomatoes, seeded and diced
- 1 Tbsp (10 g) crushed garlic
- ½ tsp (0.5 g) thyme leaves
- ½ tsp (2.5 g) celery salt
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Dash cayenne pepper, optional
- 1–2 Tbsp (15–30 g) cream, if needed



GARNISH

- 2 Tbsp (6 g) chives, cut into ½-in (13-mm) pieces
- 6 oz (170 g) tasso ham (Cajun-style ham), diced and cooked crisp
- Hot sauce

Directions

Shuck the corn, remove all silks and wash. Cut kernels from cob and transfer to a medium bowl. Use the back (dull side) of a knife to scrape off as much of remaining kernel pulp and juice as possible (this helps make the dish thick and creamy); add to kernels and set aside. In a large frying pan over medium low, melt butter and bacon drippings; add onions and peppers; cook, stirring often until tender. Add corn, water, tomatoes, garlic and seasonings, stirring to combine. Cook, stirring occasionally, 20–30 minutes or until corn is tender and the mixture is creamy. Add cayenne to taste and cream if needed to adjust consistency.

GARNISH

Garnish with chives and ham, and serve with hot sauce.

- **Prep time: 20 minutes.**
- **Cook time: 45 minutes.**
- **Makes 8 servings.**

Pot Stickers

Ingredients

DUMPLING

- ½ lb (227 g) ground pork or turkey
- 2 green onions, minced
- 2 Tbsp (25 g) bamboo shoots, minced
- 1 tsp (5 g) ginger, minced
- 1 Tbsp (9 g) cornstarch
- 2 tsp (10 ml) soy sauce
- ⅛ tsp (0.33 g) white pepper
- flour for dusting surface

DIPPING SAUCE

- 6 Tbsp (89 ml) soy sauce
- ¼ C (59 ml) Chinese black vinegar, or balsamic vinegar
- 2 Tbsp (30 ml) sesame oil
- 2 Tbsp (31 g) chili garlic sauce

COOKING

- 22 round pot-sticker wrappers
- 2 Tbsp (30 g) vegetable oil
- ⅔ C (148 ml) water

Directions

DUMPLING

Combine all ingredients thoroughly; set aside. Lightly dust surface with flour to lay assembled dumplings. To assemble dumplings, put 1 T (14 g) filling in center of a wrapper. Press lightly against work surface to form a flat bottom. Brush wrapper edges with water; fold in half; press to seal.

DIPPING SAUCE

Mix all sauce ingredients together well.

COOKING

Heat 1 T (15 ml) oil in a nonstick frying pan on medium high; swirling to coat bottom. Add half of the pot stickers seam side up and cook until bottoms are golden brown, about 3 minutes. Add ⅓ C (74 ml) water, cover, reduce heat and cook until water is absorbed, about 3 minutes. Remove from pan and repeat with remaining pot stickers. Serve with dipping sauce.

- **Prep time: 5 minutes.**
- **Cook time: 12 minutes.**
- **Makes 4 servings.**



Shrimp and Crab Wontons

Ingredients

- ½ C (170 g) finely shredded cabbage, preferably Savoy
- Kosher salt to taste
- 6 oz (170 g) shrimp and lump crabmeat, chopped
- 1 C (50 g) spring onions, finely chopped
- 1 Tbsp (14 g) ginger purée, or finely grated ginger
- 1 tsp (5 g) soy sauce
- 1 tsp (4 g) sesame oil
- 1 Tbsp (15 g) cream cheese
- 1 14-oz (398-g) pkg wonton wrappers
- 2–3 C (473–682 g) vegetable or peanut oil



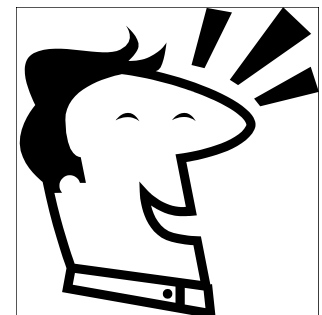
Directions

Combine cabbage, salt, shrimp and crab, onions, ginger, soy sauce, sesame oil and cream cheese in a bowl and mix well. Separate wonton wrappers and arrange on a dry surface. Place a scant tsp of filling in center of each wrapper; wet edges and seal by bringing opposite corners together, forming a triangle. Bring 2 remaining corners together toward center and seal with a pinch.

Preheat oil in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Working in batches, fry wontons until golden brown, about 6 minutes. Remove with a slotted spoon and transfer to paper towels. Serve hot with your favorite dipping sauce, such as hoisin; sweet and sour or Chinese mustard.

- **Prep time: 22 minutes.**
- **Cook time: 36 minutes.**
- **Makes 8 servings.**

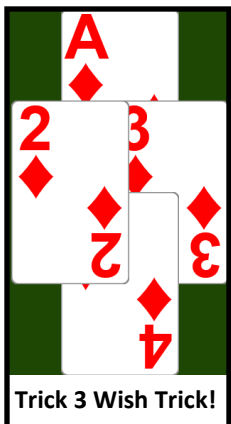

On Board 3 from Sunday's Round 1, North/South have an easy play in 5C or 3NT. Only one pair, Kerr/Reynolds, bid the doomed club slam and they were defeated when Mike Levine led a spade, cutting off dummy, stranding the DK for the necessary spade discard!

Five pairs found game in their 6-2 heart fit. Four pairs declared from South where West led their singleton club. All four declarers won the opening lead and played the HK off dummy.

Lo opened a multi 2D and Chechelashvili became declarer from North and Bramley led the SK. West was faced with a critical decision... At two tables, West ducked the HA. Declarer continued hearts and had the SA still in hand as an entry to draw the last trump and claim 12 tricks.

At the two other tables, the defenders won the first heart and shifted to spades. Declarer won the spade. When they played a second trump to dummy's jack, they were stranded, losing two spades and a club ruff plus the earlier heart for down one!



In Sprung/Lo, 4H was declared from North after a multi 2D opening bid. Bramley led the SK. Declarer played a heart to the king, cashed the DA, cashed the CK and exited with the HJ. West won the HA, cashed the ST and continued spades to East's queen. Bramley, not certain of the club position, played another spade, ruffed by declarer with the H7 and overruffed by West with the H8 for down one.

10 IMPs to Sprung when Baseggio/Freeman played in 5C at the other table.

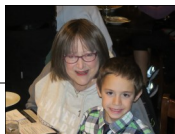

Board 9 was played everywhere from 2DX North/South to 7H East/West. The normal contract is 4H E/W, collecting 12 tricks with the club finesse working and trumps dividing 3-2.

In the Tebha/Lewis match, Nistor/Rotaru, known to be very aggressive, bid the grand slam. The auction was largely natural. The 3NT bid showed a serious spade cue. 4NT was keycard for hearts. 5S showed two with the queen. When Rotaru bid 5NT, Nistor responded 6C. On the Nistor/Rotaru convention card, this is explained as specific kings! At the table, Nistor self-alerted that 6C showed no kings outside! Sometimes our misunderstandings work well in spite of the situation and sometimes we fall from grace. In this case, 7H may have been too much even if partner held the CK! As it is, the CK is onside and partner holds the valuable spade singleton, yet declarer cannot come to more than 12 tricks. 17 IMPs to Tebha when Dwyer/Goodman stopped in the making 6H!

On another note: Some E/W pairs did not need to bid slam to get their 1400. Bramley/Hessel collected nine tricks defending 3DX. While it is modern-style to preempt 6-card suits at the 3 level, this can be a dangerous practice... even at favorable... when the opponents have opened the bidding in first seat. Note the two 800's, two 1100's, and Bramley's 1400!!

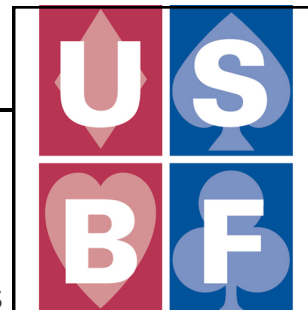

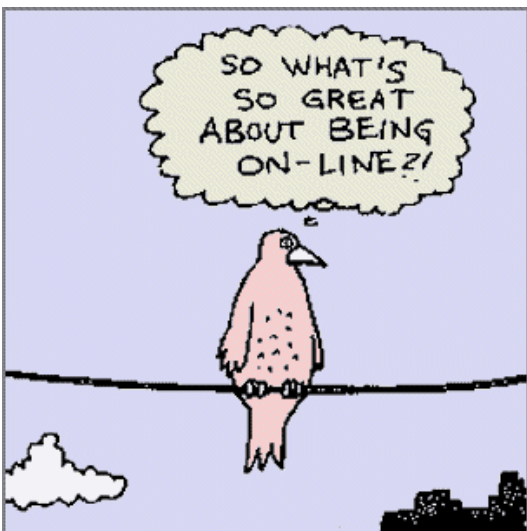

Our meetings are by conference call and at NABCS. Board members and the organization's officers are not compensated for meetings, travel, or hotel expenses.

Four people are trying to cross a sketchy rope bridge in the middle of the night. Only two can cross at a time. **Why Don't

Solution:

The key to solving this riddle is sending the 5-minute person (the janitor) and the 10-minute person (the professor) across together. This way you get the two slowest people across in 10 minutes instead of 15, and that 5 minutes saved is worth the hassle of not being able to send the 1-minute person (you) back with the flashlight every time. You don't want the 5- or 10-minute person going back across though, so you need to leave one of the faster people on the far side waiting.

So, you send the 1-minute person and the 2-minute person (the lab assistant) across first. 2 minutes have elapsed. Then send the 1-minute person back with the flashlight. 3 minutes have elapsed. Then send the 5-minute person and the 10-minute person across together. 13 minutes have elapsed. Then send the 2-minute person back with the flashlight. 15 minutes have elapsed. Finally, send the 1-minute and 2-minute person across together, and everyone is across in 17 minutes. Congratulations, you escaped the zombies and lived to tell.

Note: You can send the 2-minute person back across initially rather than the 1-minute person and still get everyone across in 17 minutes.

Eric Victor Rodwell (born May 1, 1957) is an American professional bridge player. He has won the Bermuda Bowl representing the United States five times and is one of ten players who have won the triple crown of bridge: the Bermuda Bowl, the World Open Pairs and the World Team Olympiad.

Rodwell was born in San Francisco, California and his family moved to West Lafayette, Indiana in 1965 where his father was a professor of biochemistry at Purdue University. He started playing bridge at the age of eleven by reading books and playing with his parents. Rodwell graduated from West Lafayette High School in 1974 and attended Purdue, graduating with a master's degree in finance in 1981. Rodwell is currently a full-time bridge professional and lives in Clearwater Beach, Florida with his wife Donna; each has two children from previous marriages, his being twins Jeffrey and Sara (b. 1984).

Bridge career

For decades Rodwell has been in a regular partnership with Jeff Meckstroth, and "Meckwell", for their surnames, is one of the most successful pairs of all time. They are well known for playing an aggressive and very detailed system called RM Precision (for Rodwell-Meckstroth), of which Rodwell is the principal theorist and author. Although he first learned basic Precision at the age of 14, he didn't get serious about developing his own version until 1982 after he and Meckstroth were already winning. Most of RM Precision was developed subsequently in the early '80s with adaptations following more slowly thereafter. As a bidding theorist, Rodwell has created several conventions and methods including the support double, conventional transfers in many situations, the pass-double inversion and the serious three notrump. Although the Unusual Major Jumps Over One Diamond Opening convention (UMJODO) is often credited to him, he denies inventing it.

Although he has not actively pursued masterpoints as a goal, he is one of the all-time top masterpoint holders in the American Contract Bridge League, and won the *Barry Crane Trophy* for winning the most masterpoints in a year in 2004. Possibly his most remarkable achievement was at the ACBL's 2008 fall championships, where with four major events available to be contested, he won three (Open Board-A-Match Teams, Blue Ribbon Pairs, Reisinger Teams) and finished second in the fourth (Life Master Open Pairs). The three wins were with Jeff Meckstroth, and the second place with John Diamond.

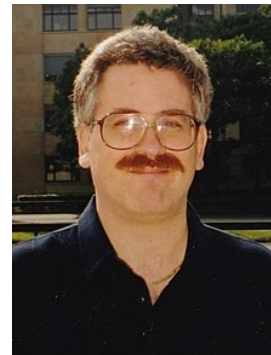

Rogoff led the H8 to the J,K,A. Baseggio cashed his three top hearts and led the ST to the ace in dummy. He cashed the SA and SK and with the ten having fallen, he played the SJ to Rogoff's queen, setting up two more spade tricks.

Rogoff played the DT to dummy's ace and Baseggio cashed the two high spades. The DK scored the 9th trick and the club position became moot.

Ferro/Holtz had a straightforward auction to 6C... not a great contract off the CA and CQ (roughly 30%). Had someone asked for keycards, it probably would have been avoided.

Once there, however, a favorable lie was required. As it was, it was hopeless. Bramley held both the club ace and queen over the king and the contract was doomed.

In Brod/Levine, Berkowitz/Meckstroth reached 6C. 2C is a natural 2/1 GF. It can be bid on a 2 or 3 card suit when responder has a GF without four card spade support and without a five-card heart or diamond suit. 3NT was a non-serious slam try. 4NT was keycard. 5C showed 0 or 3 keycards and 6S confirmed 3.

Although diamonds were the unbid suit at both tables, both Easts chose to lead from their C:QJT8, giving declarer the extra entry needed to set up the club suit!

Meckstroth won the CA and trumped a club. He led a spade to dummy and ruffed a second club. Another spade went to dummy and a third club was trumped. The clubs were good and Meckstroth drew the last trump to take his two discards.

In Lall/Lo, N/S had a similar auction. 5C was Exclusion Keycard and 5S showed two. With his 6-card spade suit, Krekorian gambled that spades would behave well enough for slam to succeed.

Krekorian trumped the first club and then followed Meckstroth's line to draw trumps and establish the club suit.

The Lall team and the Levine team both won 11 IMPs when 5S was bid and made at their teammates' tables.
