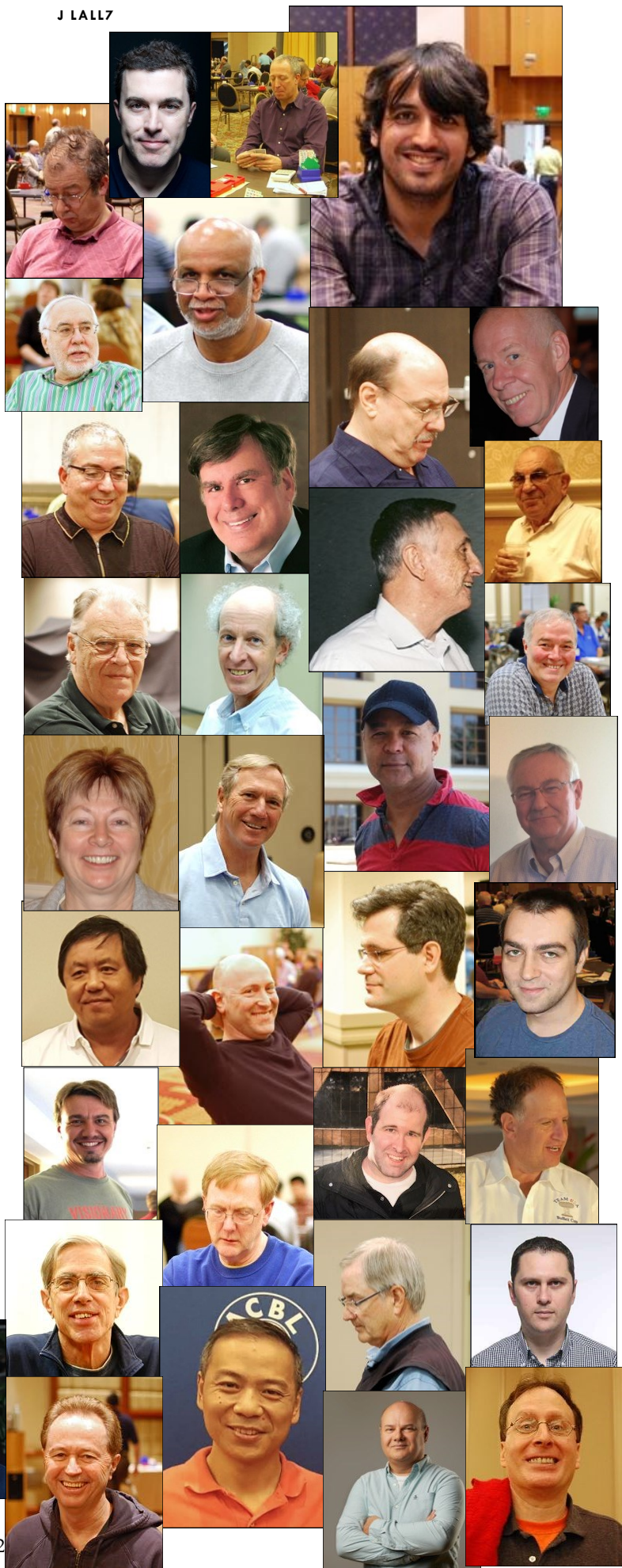

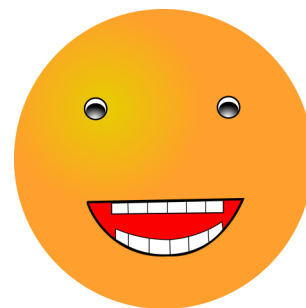

# Kibitzing on VuGraph...

To kibitz, go to [kibitz.realbridge.online](http://kibitz.realbridge.online). Select JLall Online Teams#7. You will be taken to a lobby where you will see a list of tables on the left and a chat box and list of people in the lobby on the right. The table listing shows the team & player names at each table. There will also be information about the number of kibitzers and whether there is audio/video commentary (a picture of a TV means there is).

At the table, you will see a hand diagram with the bidding and play as it happens.

There is a chat window on the right. You can type into that window.

If there is an asterisk next to a bid, that means it was Alerted or Explained. Click on the bid to see the explanation if there was one.

-- "Rewind" play using the slider underneath the table with the hand diagram.

-- Click on the "Scores" button to the left of the South player's name to get a scorecard for the match.

----Click on a board number to see the hand record and results at all of the tables.

----Click on a number in a yellow box to get to the hand record from some screens.

----In the hand record screen, click on a result to see the bidding and play at a specific table.

--In the upper left corner:

----Click on the yellow box with 4 little boxes to get the match scores for all the matches (that will be IMPs and for the Round Robin will not include scores from previous rounds).

----Click on the yellow box with 3 bulleted lines to get Cross-IMPs for the pairs (that will be just for this match).

The Scores information is also available in the lobby using the button at the upper right, in case you want to check on scores before deciding which table to watch.

## TIMING OF DEFERRAL

The Round Robin matches will be deferred until each round is completed.

The KO matches will be deferred for half an hour or until each board has been played at all tables, so there may sometimes be a period when nothing new is being shown because one or two tables are very slow to play the board.

### NOTES:

In accordance with the USBF General Conditions of Contest, each player must play at least one 8 board segment against each other team.

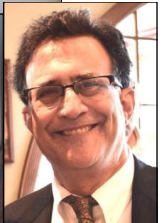
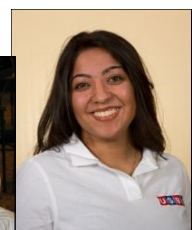
There are no seating rights - teams must submit their lineups before seeing their opponent's lineup.

Xin Ge S

On Board 8, four out of six declarers succeeded in 3NT. To defeat 3NT, the defense needs to get hearts going early. Two defenders led spades and continued the suit when they won the high diamond. This gives declarer an easy route to nine tricks, driving out the second diamond and playing a club toward dummy's queen!

If East/West attacks hearts early, they can establish two heart tricks, two diamond tricks and a club, but they must be careful to play their hearts in the right order.

Reese Milner led the H3 to Lall's ace. Lall returned the H9 to declarer's king while Milner followed with the six! Ge led a diamond to Milner's king and Reese led the HT. Ge ducked! If Milner visualized the position, he would have cashed his DA and then exited with the HJ. Instead, he continued hearts! Ge won and cashed four rounds of spades, discarding two clubs and a diamond from dummy. He led the D9. Milner won and tried the CK. Ge claimed, collecting three clubs, four spades and two hearts to make his contract.

To defeat the contract after a small heart lead, West needs to unblock the a high heart to avoid being endplayed. Ge played this hand very well... though it would have been best for him to win the HT and cash spades before playing a diamond, leaving Reese no out-card.

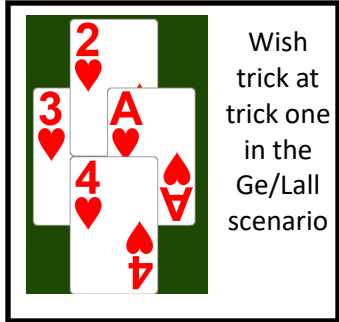

In Sprung/Lo, Bramley/Hessel had more information and took advantage of it. Hessel, knowing his partner had at least four hearts, led the HJ. It is easier to lead the HJ from JT63 knowing that your side holds at least eight cards in the suit.

Bramley won the heart and shifted to a low club. Hessel won the CK and continued with the C7. Declarer won the ace and played a diamond to Hessel's king. Ira cleared the club and declarer cashed his winning hearts and spades for down one!

Bramley did not need to find the devastating club shift at trick two. He could have defeated the contract by continuing hearts so long as the defense arranged for East to win the last heart trick, keeping West off of the endplay in clubs.

# Some Suggestions For Dining at Home Between Sessions! Pandemic Pleasures...

## Coq Au Vin

### Ingredients

#### COQ AU VIN

- 6–8 lb (2.7–3.6 kg) chicken, cut into 8 pieces
- 3 bay leaves
- ½ tsp (1.4 g) peppercorns
- 3 cloves garlic, crushed
- 2 Tbsp (29 g) unsalted butter
- 2 C (500 ml) Bordeaux or Burgundy wine
- Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste
- 2 med carrots, chopped
- 1 C (59 g) button mushrooms
- 1 med white onion, chopped
- 1 C (100 g) pearl onions, peeled
- 1 med leek, sliced
- ¼ C (31 g) flour
- 4 sprigs fresh thyme
- 4 sprigs fresh rosemary
- 2 Tbsp (2.5 g) flat leaf parsley, chopped

### Directions

#### COQ AU VIN

Place chicken in a large bowl. Add bay leaves, peppercorns, garlic and wine. Cover and refrigerate for 24 hours. The next day, preheat oven to 350°F (177°C). Remove chicken and reserve marinade; pat chicken dry; season with salt and pepper. In an oven-proof pot over medium-high heat, melt butter and brown chicken; remove and set aside. Add carrots, mushrooms, onion, pearl onions and leek to same pot; cook until golden, stirring often. Sprinkle flour over vegetables; return chicken to pot and add reserved marinade, stirring to combine. Add thyme and rosemary sprigs; cover and bake 1 hour. Discard herb sprigs and serve, garnished with parsley.

#### SERVING SUGGESTION

Traditionally served over buttered egg noodles or roasted new potatoes, coq au vin also goes well with polenta or on its own with a crusty loaf of sourdough bread.

- **Prep time: 12 minutes.**
- **Cook time: 1 hour.**
- **Makes 4 servings.**

#### STOCK

- 2 lb (907 g) med shrimp in shells
- 2 doz oysters in the shell, reserve liquid
- 1 lb (454 g) lump crabmeat
- 6 stalks celery, diced
- 3 med green bell peppers, diced
- 3 med yellow onions
- 1 bunch parsley, chopped
- 2 tsp (3 g) dried thyme, divided
- 4 bay leaves
- 2 Tbsp (20 g) garlic, chopped, divided
- 6 C (1420 ml) water
- 2 C (473 ml) dry white wine

#### ROUX

- 1 C (237 ml) vegetable oil
- 1 C (125 g) flour

#### GUMBO

- ½ lb (227 g) andouille sausage, sliced
- 2 tsp (5 g) Creole seasoning
- 3 lg tomatoes, seeded and diced
- 1 lb (454 g) fresh okra, sliced ¾ in (10 mm) thick
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Hot sauce to taste
- 2 C (322 g) cooked white rice, optional

#### GARNISH

- 2 bunches green onions, tops only, sliced
- Hot sauce to taste, Crystal or similar brand preferred
- Filé to taste

#### Directions

##### STOCK

Peel and devein shrimp, reserving shells for stock. Shuck oysters, draining and reserving liquid for seasoning. Pick over crabmeat, discarding any bits of shell. Dice celery and green peppers, reserving tops and bottoms for stock. Cut 1 onion into quarters; dice remaining onions and set aside. Chop parsley leaves, reserving stems for stock. Place shrimp shells, celery trimmings, bell pepper tops, quartered onion, parsley bottoms, 1 tsp (1.5 g) thyme, bay leaves, 1 T (10 g) garlic, water and wine in a heavy-bottomed pot. Bring to a boil over medium high heat; reduce heat and simmer for 1 hour. Strain through cheesecloth and reserve (refrigerate if made ahead). Alternately, you can substitute good-quality seafood bouillon.

##### ROUX

Pour oil into a large heavy pot over medium heat. Slowly whisk in flour. Reduce to low, stirring continuously for 45–60 minutes or until roux becomes the color of chocolate and has a nutty aroma. Do not allow to burn; if you get black specs, the roux has burned and should be discarded, as it will ruin the taste of the dish. Remove from heat, cool and set aside; or if made ahead, refrigerate.

##### GUMBO

Place sausage in a large heavy-bottomed pot over medium heat and cook, stirring occasionally, until fat has rendered out, about 8 minutes. Add remaining onion, bell pepper and celery. Stir over medium heat until translucent, approximately 10 minutes. Add Creole seasoning and remaining thyme and garlic. Add reserved stock, tomatoes and okra; bring to a boil and slowly whisk in roux until desired thickness is achieved. Lower heat; simmer 30–45 minutes. About 10 minutes before serving, add seafood and simmer until cooked through. Remove from heat and add reserved oyster liquid. Season with salt, pepper and hot sauce. Serve over rice. Garnish with remaining parsley leaves, green onions, hot sauce and filé.

**Prep time: 1 hour.**

**Cook time: 3 hours.**

**Makes 12–14 servings.**

# Firecracker Chicken

(beware... it's HOT!)

## Ingredients

### MARINADE

- 1 lb (454 g) boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- 2 tsp (10 g) soy sauce
- 1 tsp (5 g) dark soy sauce
- 1 tsp (3 g) cornstarch

### SAUCE

- ¼ C (75 g) ketchup
- ¼ C (59 ml) chicken broth
- 1 Tbsp (15 g) chili garlic sauce
- 1 tsp (4 g) sugar
- 1 Tbsp (15 ml) vegetable oil
- 1 fresh jalapeño, seeded and cut into thin strips
- 8 sm dried red chilies
- 1 med red bell pepper, julienned
- ½ med onion, thinly sliced



## Directions

### MARINADE

Rinse chicken, pat dry and cut crosswise into ½-in (13-mm) wide strips. Place in a bowl with remaining marinade ingredients, stirring to coat. Let stand 10 minutes. Make sauce by combining all sauce ingredients in a small bowl and mixing well. Place a stir-fry pan over high heat until hot. Add oil, swirling to coat sides. Add fresh and dried chilies and cook, stirring constantly, until dried chilies begin to brown, about 15 seconds. Add chicken, bell pepper and onion and cook, stirring constantly, until chicken is no longer pink in center, 2–3 minutes. Remove dried chilies if desired. Add sauce, stirring to coat. Bring to a boil, remove from heat and serve hot with rice or Chinese noodles.

- **Prep time: 10 minutes.**
- **Cook time: 4 minutes.**
- **Makes 4 servings.**

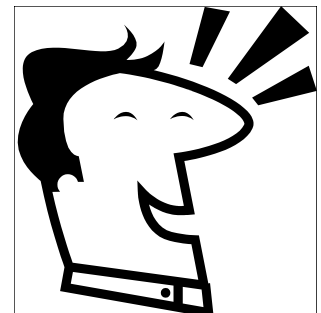

## As posted on BridgeWinners by Roger Lee...

Sylvia Moss passed away September 13, after a long battle with cancer. She was 79 years old.

From humble middle class upbringings, Sylvia had a brilliant career in business and retired as a partner at Blackstone Inc, one of the largest investment management companies in the world.

I was fortunate to get to know Sylvia very well in the last years of her life, and she made me feel like family. She was passionate about many things in life: business, family, travel, and charity. But anyone who knew her at all knew that that she loved one thing above all others: bridge.

Over the years Sylvia amassed an enviable playing record. She was an ACBL Grand Life Master with 10 NABC+ titles, multiple world medals, and a second place finish in the 2021 Reisinger.

Being her bridge partner for the last few years was really a great privilege. She refused to go to any tournament unprepared, and would often call me in the afternoons to practice, discuss auctions, or go over mistakes she

found in our notes.

As an opponent she was always cordial, but once the cards were on the table she exhibited intense concentration and mental toughness. Sylvia loved to win, but was always gracious in defeat, telling us that she had “blown it”, when in truth, it was always the rest of us who should have done better.

It was important to Sylvia that everyone was always comfortable and felt welcome around her. She usually wore a sweater and jeans, and she was happier eating pastrami on rye than anything upscale. A lifelong New Yorker, she retired to Boca Raton for the weather but always missed the city she considered home.

I feel very lucky to have known her. She taught me the importance of being humble, kind, and curious, but also that one of the most important things in life is to trust yourself when you know you’re right. Even though it feels like she was taken too soon from us, I’m comforted in knowing that everything she did, she did on her own terms, and that she felt her own life was lucky and fulfilling. I will miss her very much, as will so many others whose lives she touched.

## And I would add to Roger’s great tribute...

Sylvia was a wonderful volunteer who worked hard to promote Women’s bridge. She served tirelessly on the ACBL Women’s Committee for several years in and around 2015, attending long meetings in the middle of the night following play at NABCs.

From 2009-2014, Sylvia served on the USBF Board of Directors. She had great ideas on how to promote bridge and her friendly persona made her a wonderful ambassador of the game.

Rest in Peace, my friend.

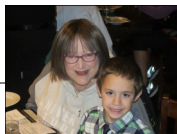

On Board 26, Nistor/Rotaru bid an aggressive 6C. If you are going to bid aggressively, you better play well... and Rotaru did!

Ornstein led the D5. Rogoff won the ace and continued diamonds. Rotaru ruffed with the C8 and led a club to the king and the queen, Ornstein discarding a diamond. The C6 to the jack followed, Ornstein tossing another diamond. On the CA, Ornstein was starting to feel uncomfortable. He discarded another diamond.

A heart to the ace was followed with a heart to the king. When the H7 was led to the jack, Ornstein parted with a small spade.

The HQ followed and Ornstein was helpless. He couldn't toss a spade or the QJ would come down. He couldn't toss a diamond or the queen would turn good.

The squeeze was perfectly executed and Rotaru claimed his slam!

Yiji Starr played the hand the same way. However, since she was only in five, the overtrick was meaningless... and she risked her contract by doing so! If trumps were 5-0, ruffing the second diamond could have resulted in failure.

Like Yiji, Stamatov and Zhao played 5C. Zhao demonstrated his world class play. A diamond was led to the ace and a diamond, returned. Zhao guarded against the 5-0 trump split by discarding a spade on the second diamond. He took 11 tricks and made his game without risking the contract for the sake of an overtrick.

Zhao and Rotaru get the MVP award for the day!!

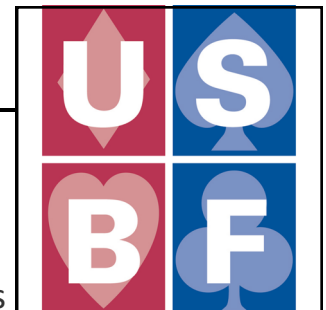

# Logic Riddle...

It's the near future, and everyone is about to have the opportunity to fly their own jetpack. But before that can happen, a test pilot must write the safety guide for what to do in an emergency—like when the fuel gauge on the jetpack approaches zero.

In his test, the pilot hovers 100 feet above a pool of water, draining the jetpack's fuel until there's only enough left for one final moment of upwards thrust. As the pilot begins to fall, he is left with one very important question:

**At what point during the pilot's fall should he activate that last bit of fuel to best minimize his upcoming splashdown velocity?**

→ The Hint

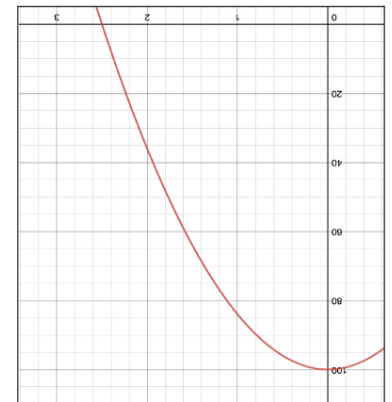
While your intuition for what to do in this situation could carry you a long way, the mechanics of a sustained jetpack thrust also get complicated quickly. To make this easier, let's treat it like a double jump in a video game and say that the jetpack translates to an immediate change in vertical thrust that lasts for the blink of an eye.

Now, if the pilot uses that thrust too soon, it will propel him above 100 feet and cause him to spend even more time in the air, generating even more acceleration and splashing down above 80 feet per second. So a good approach to the problem might be to use the thrust at exactly halfway through the flight, or 1.25 seconds, and see what happens. Before we start the calculations, we should decide what velocity we're going to get out of this jetpack! As long as we choose a constant amount, our results should work out just fine. I'm going to say that the magical, instantaneous thrust translates to an upwards velocity of 30 feet per second, or approximately 20 miles per hour. That's around the average human sprinting speed.

$$v = -32 * t$$

$$v = -32 * 2.5 = -80 \text{ feet per second}$$

# Solution:



We can look at this graph two different ways to see that things get more dramatic as the fall continues. You can see that the pilot only falls about 16 feet in the first second, but 48 feet in the next second. That velocity at any point is also represented by the steepness of that graph itself. Early on, it's not very steep at all, but the graph gets steeper and steeper as time passes. The second equation can tell us the downwards velocity at the moment the pilot splashes down in the pool.

That's little time to make a decision, so let's quickly move to a graph! The x-axis represents time while the y-axis represents height above the pool.

$$t = \sqrt{100/16} = 2.5 \text{ seconds}$$

First, we can solve to see how long this fall takes without using the jetpack by setting  $h(t) = 0$ .

$$h(t) = -16t^2 + 0 + 100$$

Since the pilot was hovering at 100 feet, we can set that initial velocity equal to zero and refine our equation.

$$h(t) = -\frac{1}{2} 32t^2 + v_i t + h_i$$

How long does it take for something to fall? For most of human history, that was a very difficult question to answer. From any common height, things just fall too quickly to really see what's happening. We know that falling objects accelerate toward the center of the Earth, but it's difficult to see changes in velocity when all we have is our eyes, a timer, and a measuring tape. The whole thing is actually much easier with calculus, but let's keep this on a simpler level.

In order to solve this problem, we're going to need two elementary equations that govern falling and gravity. The first, a function of height based on elapsed time, uses the acceleration of gravity at sea level on Earth (roughly 32 feet per second per second), as well as an initial velocity ( $v_i$ ) and an initial height ( $h_i$ ).
