“Trials” and Tribulations—Mixed USBC

Mask Requirements for F2F Play in Schaumburg:

Masks are required in all public areas of the hotel: the lobby, corridors, elevators, as well as the **Hospitality Suite** and the **Office/Break Room** where masks must be worn at all times. Therefore, there will be no eating or drinking in those rooms.

Our attorney has advised us that the Cook County Mask Mandate forces us to require masks in the playing rooms. Therefore:

Masks are required in playing rooms. If you are observed not wearing a mask in a playing room, there will be a 2 IMP penalty for the first offense, a 4 IMP penalty for the second offense, an 8 IMP penalty for the third offense, and a 16 IMP penalty for the fourth and subsequent offenses; If you and your opponent agree to something other than both wearing masks, any IMP penalties for not wearing a mask will apply to both of you equally and there will be no other penalties. You may remove your mask briefly to eat or drink. **However, if you call for a director (for any reason), and you are not wearing a mask when the director enters the room, the penalty will apply to your team for your next match in the event.** There is no eating or drinking in the playing room when the Director is present.

In addition, anyone who is penalized more than twice (over the course of the entire event) in situations where their opponent was wearing a mask while they weren't, or where the director was called, may be subject to additional conduct penalties.

You should bring masks to the tournament with you; We will not be supplying masks.

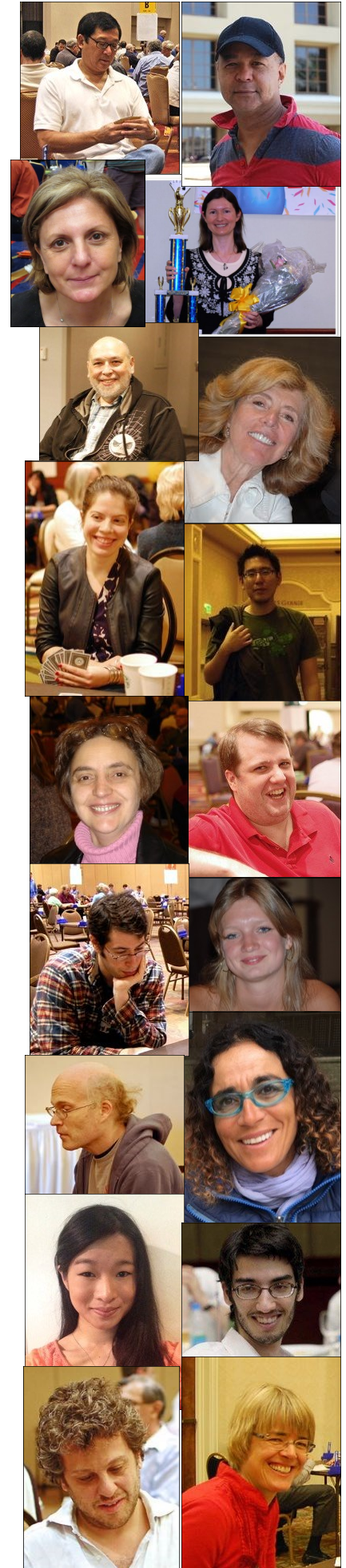
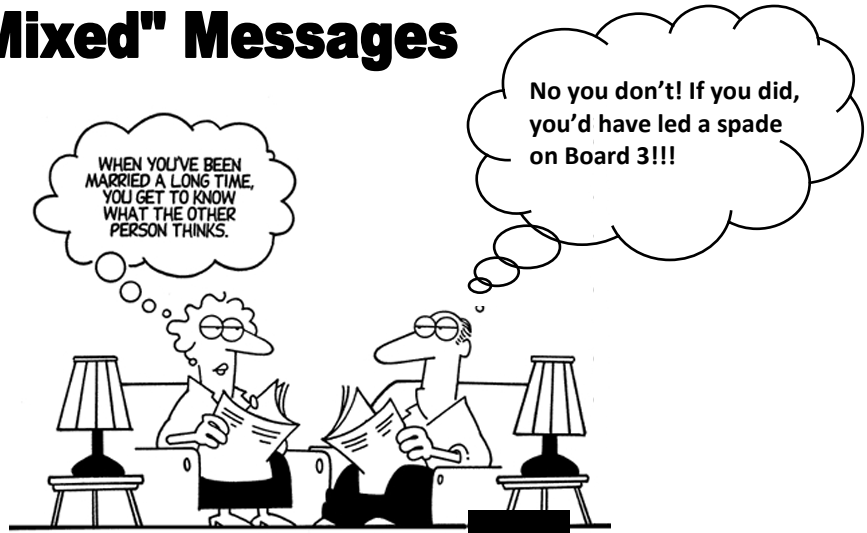

On Board 65 in the Hinze/Rosenthal match, both tables bid to 4H.

In the Rosenthal/Rosenberg auction, Andrew opened a strong, forcing 2C. Debbie showed a negative response with 2H. Rosenthal bid 2NT and a puppet Stayman auction ensued where Andrew showed one or more major and Debbie showed four hearts. Because they play that 2H is negative, even with the clever puppet convention, they were not able to “classically right-side the contract” so the strong hand was on play.

However, it is not necessary to put the strong hand on play so long as the weak hand is held by a strong declarer!

Enfield led the CT. Debbie ducked in dummy and Hinze won the king. Another club followed, Rosenberg winning her queen. Rosenberg played the H9; Enfield covered with the ten; Rosenberg played dummy’s queen and it held. She cashed the SA and SK and ruffed a spade in hand. She led the HJ and when Enfield ducked, Rosenberg let it sail. She pulled Enfield’s last trump (the king) and claimed 11 tricks.

At the other table, Howard played 4H from the strong hand. Ginossar led a small spade to the jack and ace. Howard played her DK, Ginossar winning his ace. Eldad continued spades with the ten, Howard winning her king. She played a diamond to the jack and the H5 to the 6, Q, 3. She cashed the HA and the DQ. The S6 was ruffed in dummy and the C4 was led, producing this awesome looking trick:



Ginossar won the C6 and he was endplayed! A diamond lead would produce a ruff and sluff so he exited the C8. If Howard rose with the CQ in dummy, she would make her contract. Instead, she chose to play for exactly Kx on her right and inserted the C9. South covered with the ten. Allison won the ace and had to concede both rounded kings for down one!

Simply playing for North to hold the CK and any length is probably a better mathematical play.

General Face-to-Face Tournament Information to Players

The USBF Board of Directors met earlier this week and confirmed:

1. Face-to-face play in Schaumburg will be with 2 players per room.
2. Players will not be required to get Covid tests, but will be provided with information about where they can be tested (in Woodfield Mall) if they want to be. Staff will be tested approximately once a week.
3. We will comply with the Illinois mask requirements, which currently require masks in public areas indoors. Our default will be for both players in the playing rooms to wear masks, but if the 2 players in a room agree on a different rule we will allow whatever they agree on, assuming that is in compliance with the Illinois requirements.
4. We will ask each player to sign a Covid-related waiver of liability form before they start play. Jan will be sending the text of the waiver to all of you in the next day or so, and will have printed forms in her office (room 1321) at the Hyatt for participants to sign.
5. Hospitality will be limited - "grab & go" breakfast and lunch will be distributed in our usual hospitality suite (room 2321), but everyone will have to go someplace else to eat. We will allow only 6 players in the suite at any one time. The suite will not be open for socializing at other times. We will have water, soft drinks, coffee and snacks in the Players' Break Room (1321), and there also, we will limit the number of people in the room at any one time. Eating in the Break Room is not allowed. Masks will be required in the hospitality suite and in the Players' Break Room.
6. There will be air purifiers in each playing room and in 1321 and 2321.

ROUND ROBIN KIBITZING ON REALBRIDGE KIBITZ SITE

To kibitz, go to **the RealBridge kibitzing website**, enter your name and click on Log In. That will take you to a screen where you can select the event to kibitz.

After you select Kibitz 2021 Mixed USBC, you will be taken to a lobby with a list of tables on the left and a chat box and list of people in the lobby on the right. The table listing reflects the team & players at the table + the board number and trick at that point. There is also information about the # of kibitzers and whether audio/video commentary is active (a picture of a TV means there is). Click table to kibitz.

You will see a hand diagram with the bidding and play as it happened.

There is a chat window on the right of the screen. Anyone can type chat into the chat window.

Above the chat window are two dropdowns for video commentary. If you want to hear someone who is commenting, select their name from one of the dropdowns. If two people are commenting **one from each dropdown**. The option "BROADCAST MY VIDEO" is for commentators - if you select this, your commentary will be available to anyone who wants to listen to you.

KO KIBITZING ON LOVEBRIDGE

You can follow the USBC on the <https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/> website. The stream is delayed; go to the schedule (Page 6) for starting times for each segment.

Popcorn time! Do you want to listen to commentary? Search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentary. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.

Nail biting! Do you want to be deeply involved? Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into four small screens – two of them showing the two tables of match you choose, the other two having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can also personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together! When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do and see whether your chosen player agrees.

More Information: Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner the arrow takes you the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons: while surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is also a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

Replay: After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board then the same buttons move you through list. Push every button and enjoy!

- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour

- Six 1/2-inch-thick slices of day-old sourdough bread
- Sliced bananas, for serving

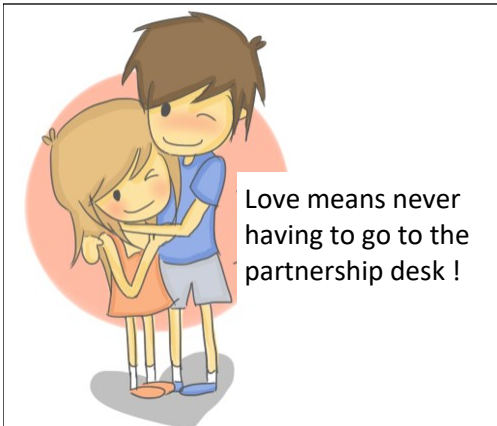
Vegan French Toast

Directions

Instructions Checklist

- **Step 1**
In a medium bowl, whisk the almond creamer with the flour, ground flax, brown sugar, vanilla, cinnamon, salt and the 1 tablespoon of maple syrup until a thick batter forms. Let stand at room temperature for 10 minutes.
- **Step 2**
In a large nonstick skillet, heat 1 tablespoon of the oil over moderate heat. Dip 2 slices of the bread in the batter, coating both sides and letting some of the excess batter drip off. Add to the skillet and cook, turning once, until golden brown, 5 to 6 minutes per side. Transfer the French toast to a platter and keep warm. Repeat with the remaining bread, batter and oil. Serve with maple syrup and sliced bananas.

Boursin Omelet

Ingredients

Ingredient Checklist

- 2 tablespoons plus 1 teaspoon unsalted butter, divided
- 1 cup finely chopped yellow onion
- 2 tablespoons water
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt, divided, plus more to taste
- 2 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon heavy cream
- 1 tablespoon garlic-and-herb spreadable cheese (such as Boursin), at room temperature
- 1/2 teaspoon thinly sliced fresh chives



Directions

Instructions Checklist

- **Step 1**
Heat 1 tablespoon butter in an 8 1/2-inch nonstick skillet over medium-high. Add onion, and spread in an even layer. Cook, undisturbed, until onions begin to brown, about 4 minutes. Add 2 tablespoons water and 1/8 teaspoon salt; cook, stirring constantly, until onions are golden brown and softened, 8 to 10 minutes. Transfer onions to a bowl. Wipe skillet clean.
- **Step 2**
Using a fork, stir together eggs, cream, and remaining 1/8 teaspoon salt in a medium bowl until well combined, being careful not to incorporate too much air.
- **Step 3**
Heat same skillet over medium-high. Add 1 tablespoon butter (it should melt almost immediately); swirl to evenly coat bottom of skillet. Just as butter stops foaming but before it begins to brown, add egg mixture all at once. Cook, stirring constantly with a heatproof rubber spatula, until mixture thickens slightly into very soft scrambled eggs with thin ribbons of set curd running throughout, 10 to 20 seconds. Gently shake skillet to form an even sheet of eggs on bottom of skillet.
- **Step 4**
Reduce heat to low. Crumble cheese over eggs. Sprinkle 1 tablespoon caramelized onions in a straight line separating the upper third from the bottom two-thirds of omelet. (Reserve remaining onion for another use.) Cook omelet, undisturbed, until filling heats and cheese melts, about 1 minute. Using spatula and starting with upper third side, gently fold omelet over, just covering filling. Starting at top of folded side, roll up entire omelet. Turn off heat, and let stand 10 seconds. Transfer to a warm plate, and rub hot omelet with remaining 1 teaspoon butter. Sprinkle with chives, and add salt to taste. Serve immediately.

Instructions Checklist

- **Step 1**
Preheat the oven to 200°. In a medium bowl, combine the flour, cornstarch, salt, baking powder and baking soda. In a glass measuring cup, blend the buttermilk, vegetable oil and milk. Beat in the egg yolk.
- **Step 2**
In a medium bowl, beat the egg white to soft peaks. Add the sugar and beat until firm and glossy. Beat in the vanilla.
- **Step 3**
Pour the liquid ingredients into the dry ingredients and whisk until just blended. Using a rubber spatula, gently fold in the beaten egg white until just incorporated.
- **Step 4**
Preheat an 8-inch square waffle iron and oil it lightly. Pour about 1 1/2 cups of the waffle batter into the preheated waffle iron and gently smooth the surface with a spatula. Bake for 4 minutes, or until browned and crisp. Transfer the waffles to the oven rack to keep warm and repeat with the remaining batter. Serve at once with maple syrup.

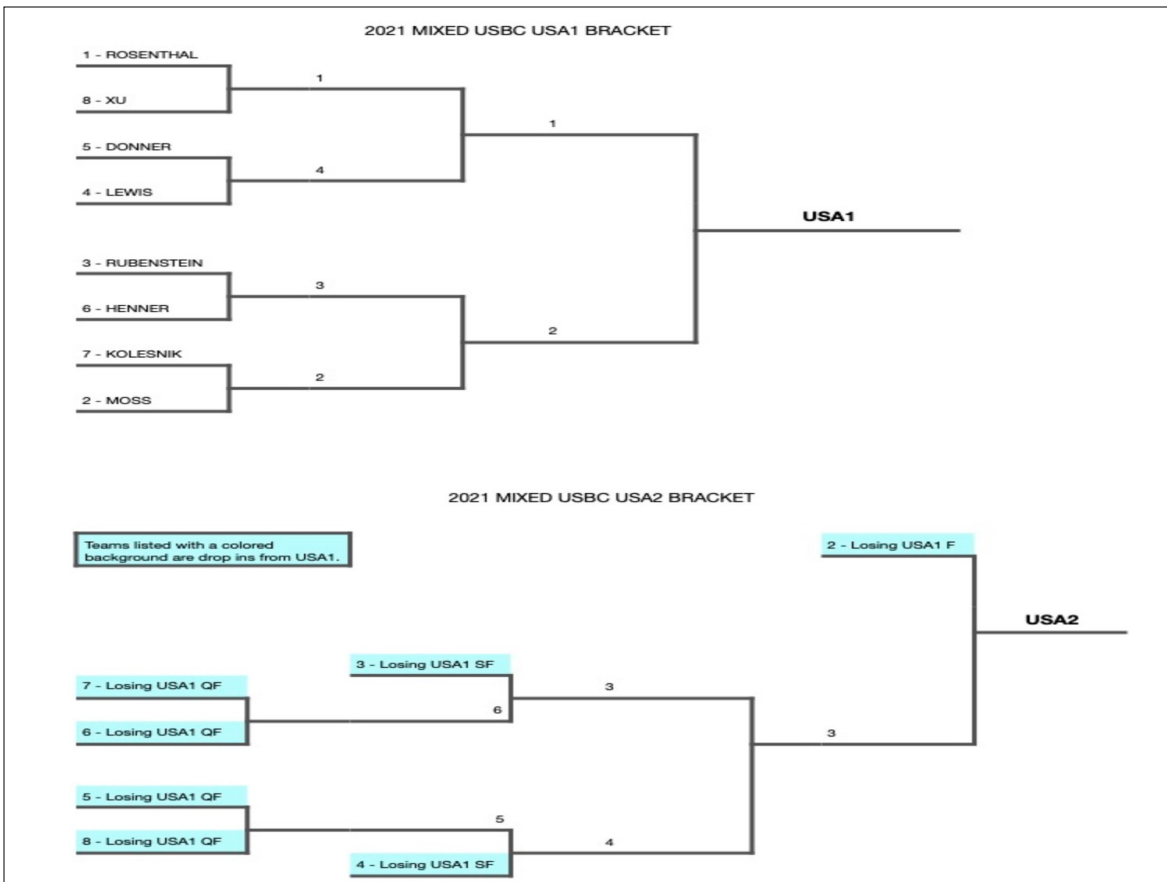
Paul and Linda Lewis were the only pair to reach slam on Board 59. Linda's 3C jump shift showed a variety of hands. 3D asked and 3NT showed 20+ balanced.

Onsgard led the DT and Hammond overtook with the DJ. If the spade suit split, Paul had eleven winners. Missing all the spots in the diamond suit, his twelfth winner would likely have to come from hearts or clubs.

Paul ducked the first trick to rectify the count. Hammond switched to the C9, won by the ace in dummy. Lewis ran five rounds of spades to produce this position:

Paul cashed the HA and led a diamond to dummy. Onsgard discarded the C7. Lewis cashed the DK and Onsgard was squeezed. Onsgard discarded the H8. Lewis cashed the CK and led a heart to his king and nine, taking twelve tricks. At the other table Chang/Gettleman stopped in 4S. 11 IMPs to Lewis

Two other declarers, Kit Woolsey and Lilly Justman, played in 3NT and took twelve tricks on the same squeeze line of play. Each of these declarers won 1 IMP for their skillful play.

Because of Covid, we won't be able to provide the full, wonderful hospitality we have in the past, but we will do what we can.

Hosts Evvie Gilbert and Maya Alela for the Open and Women's and Julie Arbit and Christian Jolly for the Mixed and Seniors will be in our usual hospitality suite (Room 2321). They will provide grab and go breakfast and lunch each day, starting on Tuesday, Oct. 5th.

Breakfast: From 8-10 am. There will be individually packaged cereal, fruit, hard boiled eggs, bagels, and some hot options. Also individual butter, jam, peanut butter, and cream cheese, as well as condiment packages. They will be making coffee and will have individual packages of sugar, sweetener, and dairy & non-dairy creamers. For those of you who prefer Keurig coffee, that will also be available in the hospitality suite. We are limiting access to 6 players at any one time, so we ask that you come to the suite, pick up a large to go container and put the smaller packages in that to take with you as quickly as you can, and then go someplace else to eat. **Masks that cover your nose & mouth must be always worn in the Hospitality Suite.** There will be a hand sanitizer station near the door and we encourage you to sanitize your hands before choosing what to take.

Lunch: From 2-4 pm (the first half of play each day ends at 2:35; we encourage those of you who are sitting out the 2nd quarter to go early). There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, main dish salads, pizza) as well as individually packaged tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit, and berries. Also all the individual packages of add-ons we have for breakfast. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators.

Let us know what you want: If there is a menu for a future day's lunch hanging on the wall outside the Hospitality Suite, please mark what you want, so we have a better idea of what to order.

Playing Rooms & Player's Break Room

We will have bottled water in the playing rooms and if there is a refrigerator in a playing room, we'll stock it with soft drinks.

We will also have bottled water in the Player's Break Room (1321), as well as soft drinks, Nespresso, some packaged snacks, and some fruit.

Masks that cover your nose & mouth must be always worn in the Player's Break Room, so you may not eat and drink in the room.

COVID-19 Waiver of Claims

Fully understanding the risks, I have freely and voluntarily elected to play in the Trials, and **I fully assume all risks** of such participation.

Therefore, to the maximum extent permitted by law, **I waive and release all claims** or potential claims of any kind against any and all Released Parties (defined below) that arise out of or relate in any way to contracting any illness or infectious disease, including but not limited to COVID, due to traveling to/from or participating in the 2021 Trials. In Sunday's Bulletin on page 21, there is a write-up of Board 19 (see hand diagram on the left). This is the hand where the Woolseys took the theoretically-good advanced sacrifice against their opponents' vulnerable 6H slam.

The defense was accurate and 5DX was set five tricks for -1100.

As described in the article, this result produced an unfortunate 9 IMP loss for the Kolesnik team when the Woolsey's teammates stopped in 4H at the other table.

It's almost playoff time in baseball... and who better to quote than the always memorable Casey Stengel?

" It's DÉJÀ VU All Over Again."

In the last round of the event yesterday, Kit and Sally's teammates, sitting North/South, Mandala and Inn, did exactly the same thing the Woolseys did on Board 19 above, taking an advanced sacrifice in 5DX against Molson/Wooldridge's 6H slam on Board 89.

Mandala opened 1D with the North hand. Wooldridge doubled and Inn preempted 3D. Molson bid 3H and Mandala jumped to 5D, blocking E/W from scientifically bidding 6H. Wooldridge doubled.

Wooldridge led the HK and Molson followed with the HQ. Wooldridge led the H9 to Molson's HJ. Molson played the S3 through Mandala's king to Wooldridge's ace.

Wooldridge cashed the SQ and played a third spade trumped by dummy's DT and overruffed with Molson's DJ. Molson returned the C5. Declarer won the CA and later conceded the DA and a club trick. +1100 for the defense.

At the other table the Woolseys stopped in 4H making 680.

Once again, the Kolesnik squad was a 9 IMP loser... this time to Rubenstein.
