This hand was played mid-November. Experts practice as often as they can to hone their systems and to stay in shape, especially as an NABC in Las Vegas was nearing. In physical sports, one exercises their body and in mental sports, one exercises their mind. To this end, the Nickell team gets together in varying partnerships several times a week on Real-Bridge where they can see and hear one another on the screen. It makes for great team chemistry and keeps everyone in a bridge frame of mind. This is an interesting hand from their Las Vegas preparation.

Different actions could and would have dramatically changed the result!

First, Weinstein could have avoided a minus 980 score by simply passing out 4S. However, his hand clearly dictates a reopening and his decision to do so could have been a big winner had Levin miraculously found the lead of a club ... Reopening with double was the only route to an East/West plus score!

As such, Weinstein reopened with double and Nickell redoubled to show the high end of his 4S call. Levin hoped to slow things down with a "psychic" 4NT bid. Muddying the waters seemed like a good idea with his one-count.

Katz was not fooled. He reevaluated his first and second round controls as well as his massive fit for partner's suit and jumped to the slam.

Poor Levin!! While a club lead would clearly defeat the slam, his partner opened 1H. He had no way to know that partner

held AKQ of clubs. The heart lead was inevitable. Levin led the H5. Nickell played dummy's ace and claimed 12 tricks!

It is interesting to see how many different scenarios could occur on any single hand. A pass instead of a double would have saved 500 points East/West ... a club instead of a heart would have cost North/South dearly. There are no magic formulas in these situations. You do what you think right and hope for the best result.

The good news is that when you practice on line against your teammates, it's a team victory either way!







International Olympic Committee

47th World National Teams Championships

The World Bridge Federation is pleased to announce that we have reached in-principle agreement to hold the 2025 World National Teams Championship (including the Bermuda Bowl, Venice Cup, D'Orsi Senior Trophy and Wuhan Cup) in Herning, Denmark between August 20 and August 31 with registration and the Opening Ceremony on August 19. The city of Herning, the Herning Bridge Club and the Danish Bridge Federation are generously offering to host their second major international bridge championship in 2 years.

Herning, with its small-town feel, was a popular venue for the European National Teams Championships this year, with a good playing venue, good restaurants, and easy access by road, rail and air (Billund International Airport is a 35-minute drive).

Play will commence on August 20 with a new "6+6" schedule. The qualifying round robins will be played over 6 days (4 matches per day except the 6th day). In parallel with the subsequent 6-day knockout rounds (2-day matches starting with Quarterfinals from the 26th) there will be a transnational teams event with 6 guaranteed days of play. The Finals will end on 31 August

The 2-day schedule reduction is a step in our efforts to ease the cost of participating in our Representative events; a wish expressed by many of our member NBOs.

Atlanta Restaurants Worth a Visit updated 12/1/2022

From Eater... Atlanta's newest restaurants worth a try... Updated December 1, 2022... (phone #'s included for verification purposes!)

É Ke Pizza

Pizza connoisseurs in Vinings are raving about this new pizzeria from the team behind Baraonda. Here, folks will find Neapolitan-style, wood-fired pies, including a traditional margherita, pizza topped with pesto, pancetta, and sun-dried tomatoes, and specialty pies like the meaty Diavolo topped with Italian salami, ham, Italian sausage, bacon, and Calabrese peppers. Look for three pagnotelle sandwiches at lunch as well as creamy gelato and other desserts like pistachio cannolis, carrot walnut cake, and tiramisu.

Serenidad

Deborah VanTrece (Twisted Soul Cookhouse and Pours) just opened her second restaurant in Cascade Heights, a Latin soul food spot called Serenidad. Located just steps from Oreatha's, which centers on

soulful homestyle dishes from around the globe, Serenidad channels the soulful cooking roots of the Caribbean and Latin America, including dishes styled after those found in countries like Mexico, Peru, Venezuela, and Brazil. Led in the kitchen by chef Whitney Thomas, expect dishes such as paella grits with mussels and head-on shrimp, duck fat tamales, and canoas de plantanos paired with cocktails made with tequila, mezcal, cachaça, and pisco. *Outdoor seating available*.

Omakase Table

Omakase Table began life as a pop-up at Silom Thai and Sushi prior to the pandemic, eventually moving to Brush Sushi Izakaya (now Cuddlefish), where founder chef Leonard Yu offered a six-seat omakase of up to 20 courses. Now open as a restaurant at Seven88 complex, Yu brings his intimate pop-up to life on a grander scale, offering two seatings per night for up to 12 people. An omakase here includes course after course of otsumami (small bites), fresh nigiri, dishes like atsuyaki tamago castella (multi-layered omelette), temaki (hand roll), and dessert. Jeff Banks joins Omakase Table as bar manager. He previously worked behind the bars at Brush Sushi, C. Ellet's Steakhouse, and Southbound. At Brush, Banks was known for crafting refined cocktails using sake, Japanese whisky, and soju. Expect similar cocktails and non-alcoholic drinks at Omakase Table, along with wine and sake meant for pairing. Look for a takeout option to launch in 2023. *Reservations required*.

Westside Motor Lounge

Located on the corner of Northside Drive and Donald Lee Hollowell Parkway, Westside Motor Lounge takes over two former automotive shops, four shipping containers, and a 1982 Mercedes Wagon on the property, transforming the site into three dining, drinking, and entertainment spaces. The restaurant here serves a menu of Southern dishes and snacks, including mac and cheese mixed with bechamel sauce and a four-cheese blend topped with a jalapeno combread crust, a grilled pimento and bacon sandwich, and meat-and-three plates. Weekend brunch features biscuits and gravy. West Bar, a cocktail lounge and listening room on the western side of the property, includes a game room. A beer garden completes the entertainment complex, with a serving station and draft system located in a converted shipping container. *Multiple outdoor seating options available*.

Corner Slice

Owned by a former partner in Comet Pub and Lanes, Ben Horgan, Corner Slice recently took over the former Avellino's space on West College Avenue, in the same complex as Tortuga y Chango. For folks who love to thick-crust pan pizzas, Corner Slice is serving up Detroit-style pies topped with everything from Calabrian peppers and Italian sausage to bacon, red onions, and jalapenos. Look for batches of saucy wings, fried mozzarella sticks, and sandwiches like meatball parmesan and a meaty hero served on fresh sesame seed focaccia bread on the menu, too.

Cuddlefish

After closing Brush Sushi on October 9 ahead of its relocation to Buckhead in 2023, chef Jason Liang and John Chen opened their latest venture together in the space just two weeks later. They didn't skip a beat with Cuddlefish, billed as a casual omakase restaurant where people choose between four, seven, nine, and 12 courses, with the latter offering sea urchin and dessert from Momonoki pastry chef ChingYao Wang. Look for hand rolls and a la carte nigiri, too. Unlike Brush, Cuddlefish doesn't include a sushi bar, but instead serves its omakases via table service and at the restaurant's full bar. Reservations highly encouraged.


The Bite of Korea

Korean street food restaurant the Bite of Korea (BOK), owned by Gavin Lee and Chloe Jung, recently opened at the Hugh Howell Marketplace in Tucker. Like the pop-up, BOK serves a similar menu that includes its popular bulgogi quesadillas, soy garlic Korean fried chicken, doenjang-jjigae stew, so-dduk skewers, and japchae noodles. Look for a lunch box special (or dosirak), Tuesday through Friday, featuring a choice of meat (bulgogi, jeyuk pork, or Korean fried chicken), fried or white rice, soup and salad, batter-fried vegetables, and mandu (dumplings). *Outdoor seating available*.

Facts You Might Not Know About Atlanta...

- 1. Atlanta was originally named Terminus and Marthasville (the latter for Governor Wilson Lumpkin's daughter.)
- **2.** The city got its current name from railroad engineer J. Edgar Thompson. It's thought to be a shortened version of "Atlantica-Pacifica."
- **3.** Your GPS might be confused if you punch in "Peachtree" as your destination. There are over 55 streets with the name.
- **4.** And it's possible none of them are named for an actual peach tree. Historians suggest they're named after the Native American village of "Standing Pitch Tree." The pronunciation corrupted over the years.
- **5.** Atlanta was the only city in North American destroyed as an act of war. (General Sherman burnt it to the ground.)
- 6. Only 400 buildings survived.





My journey in bridge by Jonathan Yue August 17, 2023 BridgeWinners

I did my elementary schooling in China, where I also learned to play bridge. I was instantly hooked. I would think about all the possible opening-response-rebid sequences and see if I can assign meanings to each of them. I would deal and play all 4 hands by myself, seeing if I could bid to the optimal contract (which inevitably ends up with me swapping the cards so that all the finesses are onside). My parents do not play the game, but supported me throughout.



Meet the Players: Jonathan Yue

I moved to California in my 7th grade. The first order of business was to check out a bunch of bridge books from the public library. Even with a language barrier, I knew that those books were probably outdated. I wasn't satisfied. I did a quick Google search and found out about the Palo Alto Bridge Center. Little did I know, that was likely one of the most important Google searches in my life.

Dropped off at where Google Maps told us 432 Stierlin Rd was, I nervously knocked on the door. Someone answered, and after parsing through my nervous and broken English, told me that the bridge club is to the left. Embarrassed, I ran away, leaving my parents to apologize. I knocked on the correct door this time, and was greeted by the tournament director there. He explained that there is this organization called SiVY that I might be interested in. I left my email address and walked away full of excitement.

A few days later, I received an email from Debbie Rosenberg (the 4th item in my inbox!) saying that she has a partner for me for the upcoming Non-LM sectional. I happily obliged. That Saturday, I showed up at the right door and met my partner. We discussed conventions for a bit (mostly me trying translate words that he said into convention names in Chinese) and played. I didn't know that when my partner called for "play" from my dummy, that implied the smallest card. This kind of mishap happened a few times, but we did well (55.25% to be exact), especially considering that I thought we were playing 16-18 1NT instead of 15-17. I was told that we earned 0.42 masterpoints. They explained to me what masterpoints are, and about the ACBL. They told me that if I became a member that day, my precious 0.42 would be added to my tally. That was more than enough convincing. From that day on, I became a tournament bridge player.

Jonathan is on U26 Team Chen!

I was paired up with another youth player, David. "David and Jonathan, very fitting names", many of our opponents commented. Then they would tell us how they tried and (mostly) failed to get their grandchildren into bridge. That left a lasting impression on me.

A YNABC and a team trial later, I had the privilege to represent the US in the under-16 event at the World Youth Teams Championships held in Wujiang, China. We finished 1st in the RR stage, but fell to France in a close semi-final match. A tense win against Sweden won us a bronze. I don't quite remember how I felt back then, but it was certainly not an overwhelming sense of joy.

School got busy for me. I played less tournament bridge. We didn't do so well at the 2019 junior trials. Covid happened. The World Championships were pushed back to 2021, then to 2022, then to 2023. My motivation for personal bridge improvement fell to an all-time low. I wasn't sure whether I really liked the game or that it was just sunk cost. Being a college student gave me unprecedented freedom. I could spend my time focusing on my academics and career, socialize and have fun, or any number of other things. Even though I always use playing bridge as a fun fact at orientation, bridge wasn't that high on my priority list. I did not attend a single bridge club meeting my first semester (partly since I wasn't aware of one).

The calendar flipped to 2022. A number of bridge events were happening. I helped my university earn a spot at the collegiates. As the junior trial in December closed in, there was a growing spirit of competitiveness in me. We got the old band that played in China in 2018 together (Michael-Arthur, Rory-me) and practiced. We were in bad shape. Some of them experienced a similar dip in interest in bridge as I did. On the other hand, the under-21 field was more competitive. In the end, we secured a spot as USA2. We lost badly to the USA1 team, but for the first time in years, I **enjoyed bridge**. I didn't realize that I missed the thrill of making a close slam or pulling off the perfect application of a convention. My hands were tingling, not with nervousness, but excitement.

Us 4 resolved that, together with whichever pair we add, we will practice our hardest and, hopefully, do something at the worlds the year after that. And the rest is history. 19

Everything You Ever Wanted to Know About LoveBridge and more...

An Introduction to the Software... LoveBridge has become more popular than ever. The USBF pioneered its use in the USBC's and since, it is being used in various forms (face2face and online) around the world. At the recent Buenos Aires World Bridge Games, 41 countries' top bridge players showcased their skills in Open, Women, Senior and Mixed categories for the ultimate title... and LoveBridge was live in the mix!

After the first six days of round-robin qualifications, the play-offs began on LoveBridge Bid+Score. The live results showing all the auctions could be followed both on LoveBridge vugraph and the championships' microsite.

On the Lovebridge vugraph, it is possible to follow a match live in each session. Live text is an option. In the two-day final of the Senior Competition, the online kibitzers followed the gold medal match in the Senior category, where the USA and India competed. Our own Zia M, was among the contestants.

The USBF has embraced the LoveBridge software and has used it for years. We are gratified to see its becoming more universal at bridge tournaments around the world.





Is there a way to show played cards when watching vugraph?

You can change to diagram view in the upper left corner of the screen. In that view, you will see the already played cards as well.

How can I see my statistics?

Once you complete your first LoveBridge tournament, the statistics profiles will be generated automatically. Afterwards, you can request your account details by sending an email to info@lovebridge.com. You can then access your account by logging in at https://stats.lovebridge.com/login.

Can I enlarge the card and numbers on the tablets in the settings?

Unfortunately, we do not have a solution for that. If you have poor eyesight and are planning to participate in a LoveBridge tournament, we recommend that you contact the organizers to ensure that you are provided with a device that has a large screen. It is up to them to make accommodations for players with poor vision.

Is it possible to have a short practice on the platform before we have to use it in a LoveBridge tournament?

LoveBridge was designed to be played at face-to-face tournaments and bridge clubs, this way playing is only possible at venues that have been equipped for it. We do not have an online platform where players can play against each other.

In our experience, players who have prior experience with any digital platforms will have no difficulty using our tablets Most players adapt very quickly to LoveBridge and will find that it is a very similar experience to playing at a regular tournament with cards.

If you are concerned about adapting to the interface, we suggest trying it out during the practice sessions at the venue of the tournament. Typically, there is at least one practice session available.





***One of the changes LoveBridge made for us for this year is a sub-menu that appears when you press the 'Director" button so you can specify what the call is for:






2. Favorite explanations

Playing With a Full Deck... About CARDS

Who invented playing cards and what is the origin of 'Hearts', 'Diamonds', 'Clubs' and 'Spades'?

PLAYING cards were invented by the Chinese before AD1000. They reached Europe around 1360, not directly from China but from the Mameluke empire of Egypt. The history of suit marks demonstrates a fascinating interplay between words, shapes and concepts. The Mameluke suits were goblets, gold coins, swords, and polo-sticks. Polo, being then unknown in Europe, these were transformed into batons or staves, which, together with swords, cups and coins, are still the traditional suit marks of Italian and Spanish cards. Fifteenth-century German card-makers experimented with suits vaguely based on Italian ones, eventually settling for acorns, leaves, hearts and bells (hawk-bells), which still remain in use. Around 1480 the French started producing playing-cards by means of stencils, and simplified the German shapes into trefle (clover), pique (pike-heads), coeur (hearts), and carreau (paving tiles). English card-makers used these shapes but varied the names. Spade (pique) may reflect the earlier use of Spanish suitmarks, from espadas meaning swords, and clubs are what the Spanish suit of staves actually look like. Diamond is not only the shape of the paving tile, but may perpetuate connotations of wealth from the older suit of coins.

Why are they 52 cards in a deck?

Short answer for a much longer answer; **52 cards represent 52 weeks in a year**, four suits represent the four seasons, the jokers are wild cards to add variety.

What was the original use for playing cards?

William Henry Wilkinson suggests that the first cards may have been actual **paper currency** which doubled as both the tools of gaming and the stakes being played for, similar to trading card games. Using paper money was inconvenient and risky so they were substituted by play money known as "money cards".

A true greeting card!

What is the oldest deck of cards ever found?

Known alternately as the Flemish Hunting Deck, the Hofjager Hunting Pack, or the Cloisters Pack (it is held in the Metropolitan Museum of Art's Cloisters location), this set of cards now recognized as the oldest in the world was originally thought to be just "kinda-historic".

Do you want to listen to commentary? Search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentary. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.

Nail biting!

Do you want to be deeply involved? Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into four small screens – two of them showing the two tables of the match you choose, the other two having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can also personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do and see the result.

More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner the arrow takes you to the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is also a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board then the same buttons move you through the list. Push every button and enjoy!
