
About Atlanta...

Atlanta is the capital of the U.S. state of Georgia. It played an important part in both the Civil War and the 1960s Civil Rights Movement. Atlanta History Center chronicles the city's past, and the Martin Luther King Jr. National Historic Site is dedicated to the African-American leader's life and times. Downtown, Centennial Olympic Park, built for the 1996 Olympics, encompasses the massive Georgia Aquarium.

Atlanta remains the financial and commercial capital of the Southeast and is its most important distribution center. Printing and publishing, high-technology industries, telecommunications, airline services, military and government services, and banking and insurance are supplemented by industries producing aircraft, beverages, automobiles, electronics and electrical equipment, chemicals, processed foods, and paper products. Major companies with headquarters in Atlanta include <u>UPS</u>, <u>the Coca-Cola Company</u>, and <u>Delta Air Lines</u>; <u>Home Depot</u> is based near the city. The television news network <u>CNN</u> is also located in Atlanta.

The 2024 Inaugural Online Women's Teams Competition was "national" rather than transnational. It was very successful with more than 60 teams representing their countries. To make the event more "world-friendly" and to encourage players to team up with others they met in the 2024 event, the WBF Women's Committee changed the Conditions of Contest to make the 2025 competition "transnational," allowing teams to be comprised of players from one or more countries.

Impressively, the 2025 event, for which the entries are now closed, has **75 teams** registered with **450 players** over the age of 15 (a requirement) from **40 different countries**.

Just click on it to unmute.

If you miss that icon, you can still unmute - move your cursor to the bottom left of the screen and you should see a similar icon:




Click on the speaker. It should unmute your machine. Vugraph is delayed for 30 minutes or until all tables have completed play on a board, whichever is later.

For Round Robin days, each kibitzing segment will start 30 minutes after play starts. There will not be voice commentary during the Round Robins.

More information

Do you want to listen to commentary? Search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentary. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.

Nail biting!

Do you want to be deeply involved? Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into four small screens – two of them showing the two tables of the match you choose, the other two having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can also personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do and see the result.

More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner the arrow takes you to the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is also a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board then the same buttons move you through the list. Push every button and enjoy!


do want to aid our events, a **Supporting Membership** can be the perfect way for you to be involved.

What is the oldest card game?

Juniors, Westerveld and Sandergoor from the Netherlands, playing against juniors, Tabata and Fragola from France, bid aggressively on Board 23 of the Junior Channel Trophy tournament, U26, round 6, to score up a close vulnerable game to win 11 IMPs. Their decision to bid game was based on the strength of their 9-card club fit.

Westerveld opened a 15-17 NT. Sandergoor bid 2S showing clubs. Westerveld bid 2NT indicating a "like" for clubs and Sandergoor drove to the game on their combined 21 HCP.

Bidding close vulnerable games has long been a successful strategy in IMPs.

Had the clubs split differently or had the hand been played from South where West could successfully lead a spade, the contract would have failed. As it was, however, it was smooth sailing when Tabata led a 4th best heart; Westerveld played dummy's king, and Fragola followed low. Westerveld quickly played on clubs and was rewarded with the 2-2 split. He happily took 6 clubs, 1 heart, and 3 diamonds for 10 cashers and a score of +630.

At the other table, with the auction starting the same, West muddied the waters with a double of 2S, showing spades and strongly suggesting a spade lead. When the auction passed back to South, he looked at his S87, and chose the safer route to 3C instead of chancing the game. North could correct to 3NT with a sure spade stopper. Q42 was anything but sure.

3C made 4 for +130 but it failed in the comparison. These teams may be among your competition in the main event next year. It is helpful to see how they play. 16
