




Board 33 from the Senior Semi-Finals on Friday had some interesting results. At both tables in Lall/Goodman, N/S, cold for 5D, sold out to West's heart preempt for a push.


Both tables in Wolfson/Tulin bid the game. In the Closed Room, Sontag, South, was doubled. Kamil, West led the CK followed by the D8. Sonty won the 9 and cashed 2 high spades. He played the HQ to his ace. The HJ was covered by the king 12 and Sonty pitched the S7 from dummy. The HT was ruffed by the DJ. Sonty ruffed a club:

In the other room of this match, Garner declared 5D. The play was the same for the first 2 tricks, but at trick 3 when Sonty cashed a spade, Garner played the DA, shortening his trumps. He played the H9 won by West's king and West played the C4 producing the same wish trick you see to your right. The HA was cashed and Garner led the S4. Look at that!! Wish trick #2 for this hand:

A rare low multicolored wish trick

Garner played the HJ and pitched dummy's C7, allowing East to ruff with the DT for the setting trick. 12 IMPs to Tulin







# From the NYT April 24, 2015 starring Michael Rosenberg

Michael Rosenberg wrote a noteworthy book, "Bridge, Zia ... and Me," which was reprinted by Master Point Press in 2011.

The diagramed deal is an example of Rosenberg's card-reading skill. During the 2004 world championship trial, that scientific auction left Rosenberg (South) in a precarious five no-trump. (In the auction, North showed a mild slam-try in clubs.)

West led the diamond nine, which showed zero or two higher cards. East won with his ace and in tempo returned the diamond eight. How did Rosenberg continue?

If the clubs were running, there would be no problems, but declarer wondered about a bad club split. After winning the second trick with the diamond king, South took his four spade tricks. West discarded a heart and a diamond. Declarer cashed his club queen and continued with his second club. Then he paused to assess the situation.

Rosenberg thought that hearts were 2-5, both from East's double and West's decision to lead from a broken diamond suit. It also seemed that West had five diamonds; if so, his hand distribution was 2-2-5-4. It was just possible that West had 2-2-6-3 shape with three low clubs, but then East, with only a doubleton diamond, might have considered shifting at Trick 2.

Rosenberg finessed dummy's club ten and made his contract.

That was one of many accurate analyses in Rosenberg's glittering — and continuing — career.



### Upon further review, something was missing...

It should have been pointed out on Board 20, page 18, in Saturday's Bulletin, that Michael Rosenberg not only led 'A CLUB' against 6H, but he led the CLUB 5!!!

The C5 is the **ONLY** lead to defeat the slam.

According to Zia-Michael's System Summary, IF and WHEN they lead "low from a doubleton, it's a falsecard," clearly implying that their signaling is standard high/low from a doubleton.

Notice that Michael's lead was brilliant! As said above, it is the ONLY lead to crush 6H!


After finding out that trumps were 4-1, declarer played for both diamond honors and the CK onside... very logical under the circumstances.

Against any other lead, **ESPECIALLY the C9, which would have marked the club honors offside,** declarer's only chance would have been to play for the Kx of diamonds onside.


Kudos to Rosenberg for finding this play. He out-Zia-ed Zia on this one!!

Proofing was always Stan's job... just one more thing I miss about him!




In the Closed Room, Becker passed 2S. When Lall balanced with a double, Milner jumped to the NT game. Becker led the SQ. Milner won the king. He played the DK, and a diamond to the ACE, hoping for the 2-2 split. In a vacuum, the 2-2 split may be slightly favored, however, after the preempt, it was a leap of faith! Becker cashed his high spades, played a club to Kamil's ace. Kamil cashed out the spade suit, played a club to Becker's king and it was over. Down 3!!



Open Room:

Feldman Schireson Cooper Baker



2S=no ace or king of spades

In the Open Room, Feldman passed in first seat with her six spades and her 8 HCP. When Baker opened in 4th seat, Feldman overcalled 1S. Schireson showed values when she doubled and Cooper raised spades denying both the ace and king. Cooper bid 3D; Feldman bid 3S and Schireson bid 3NT.

The SQ was led. Schireson ducked and spades were continued. Schireson won her king. She cashed her king and queen of hearts. She played the DK and finessed against the DQ. She had one spade, three hearts, and five diamonds for nine! Well done, Olivia.

When Baker opened in 4th seat, she didn't expect her passed hand partner to bid a game. Olivia was a double hero on the hand... she not only bid the game but she made it! Note: Olivia is a Junior taking a year off before college to play bridge. She has a lot of confidence and is a great role model for young players... for everyone really! WTG Olivia!

#### Closed Room:

Sanborn Pollack Meyers Bjerkan




2D=multi 2S=Pass or Correct Pass confirms spades Meyers, like the others, led the SQ. Pollack won her king, cashed the HK and HQ followed by the DK. She played a second diamond and like Milner in the Seniors, paid no heed to the preempt. She rose with the DA and was out of luck!


Like Milner's opponents, Pollack's opponents cashed out for down 3!


14 IMPs to Baker
