2024 USBCs Kibitzing - There will be delayed kibitzing for all of the 2024 USBCs on LoveBridge

You can follow the USBC on the <https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/> website. If you get to the voice commentary and there is no sound, you need to "unmute." When you first get to the page, there is a small icon of a speaker in the middle of your screen with an x on it. Click there to unmute. If you miss that icon, move your cursor to the bottom left of the screen and you should see a something like this:



Click on the speaker to unmute.

Vugraph is delayed for 30 minutes or until all tables have completed play on a board, whichever is later.

Kibitzing Schedule (EDT)

For all KO days of the 2024 USBCs, kibitzing times will be :

Segment 1: 11:30 am EDT; Segment 2: 1:45 pm EDT

BREAK

Segment 3: 5:00 pm EDT; Segment 4: 7:15 pm EDT

For Round Robin days, each kibitzing segment will start 30 minutes after play starts. No voice for RR's.

To listen to commentary, search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentators. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.

Deep Involvement: Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into 4 small screens – 2 of them showing the 2 tables of the match you choose, the other 2 having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do.

More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner, the arrow takes you to the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board, the same buttons move you through the list.

2024 USBCs Hospitality

We are returning to our pre-pandemic hospitality, with the hospitality suite (room 2321) open most of the day for socializing, Vugraph, and snacks. We will be providing breakfast and lunch each **day of play**. Marie-France Benoit will be our lead hostess, with help from Jacob Morgan and Julie Arbit, who makes the best guacamole. If you're at the tournament and can volunteer to help with hospitality (pick up items at Costco or nearby stores or restaurants, preparing food) please let Jan or Marie-France know.

Breakfast: 8:30-10:30 There will be the usual breakfast food: cereal, bagels, toast, salmon, fruit, juice, coffee and tea. For those who prefer Keurig coffee, that will be available. So long as the suite doesn't become too crowded, you are welcome to eat there. No masking requirement.

Lunch: On the first four days of each event we will be serving a buffet lunch in a hotel banquet room, usually the Slate and Cyan rooms at the front of the hotel; we will have signs in the Player Break Room and Hospitality Suite with daily location. The hotel will be supplying what they do best: salads and chips. We will be bringing in 2 or 3 hot dishes from a local restaurant each day. There should be enough room for you to eat in the hotel banquet room, but you are welcome to take food from there to an outside table or to your hotel room. Lunch will be served from about half an hour before the morning session is supposed to end until about half an hour after the afternoon session starts. After the first 4 days of each event, lunch will be available in the hospitality suite at the break. There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, main dish salads, pizza) as well as tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit, berries, cookies or other desserts. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators. As with breakfast, you are welcome to eat in the hospitality suite unless it is too crowded.

Let us know if you have specific needs. Our hosts will do their very best to accommodate you.

Playing Rooms & Player's Break Room

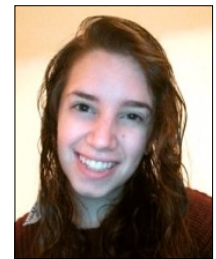
We will have bottled water in the playing rooms and if there is a refrigerator in a playing room we'll stock it with soft drinks.

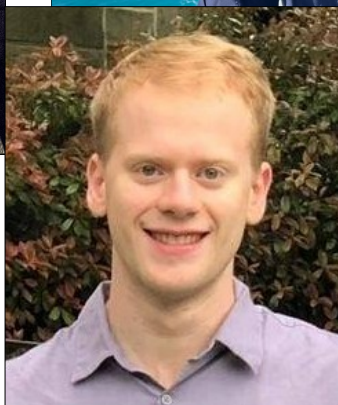

Following Louisville ... an update to yesterday's story... The leaders between Louisville and Cali!

As predicted, the three Tour events at the NABC in Louisville altered the standings quite dramatically. Giovanni Donati & Giacomo Percario leapt directly into first place thanks to winning the Jacoby Swiss Teams and making it to the semifinals in the Vanderbilt. They take the outright lead in spite of playing with the same teammates in both events, by virtue of having played enough boards in both events to qualify for the full TRP awards.

They are followed very closely by Sabine Auken & Roy Welland after coming in second in the Jacoby and reaching the quarterfinals in the Vanderbilt. They were teammates in both with father and son Jerome & Leo Rombaut, now in sixth place, but had scored good TRPs also earlier this year in Reykjavik.

Sharing third place is Eric Greco & Geoff Hampson and Bobby Levin & Steve Weinstein thanks to their win in the Vanderbilt.

Rounding out the top six are Simon de Wijs & Bauke Muller in fifth place and, as mentioned above, the Rombauts in sixth.

Overall, the top of the rankings already looks like a "who's who" of international bridge, with only 8 of the Tour's 29 events being played.

This should have preceded the news about Cali but it was unavailable at the time... therefore, we update you today and include the missing piece!

Tough Decisions on RealBridge

Practicing against his teammates before this USBC, Levin faced a difficult decision on Board 32.

Weinstein led the CJ against 4H. Katz ducked in dummy ... to win or not to win the ace... that is the question. Unfortunately for him, the lead of the club honor gave Levin no count on the suit.

He knew he'd collect a trick in spades, a trick in diamonds and a trick in clubs, but where was the 4th trick he needed to defeat the game.

It was possible for Katz to hold the singleton CQ in which case, Levin's club trick could evaporate if he ducked. Fearing the position, he rose with the ace.

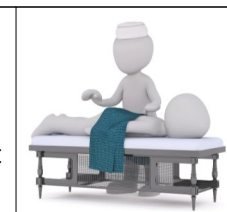

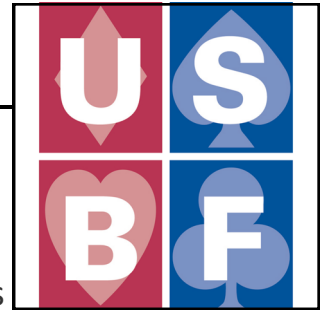

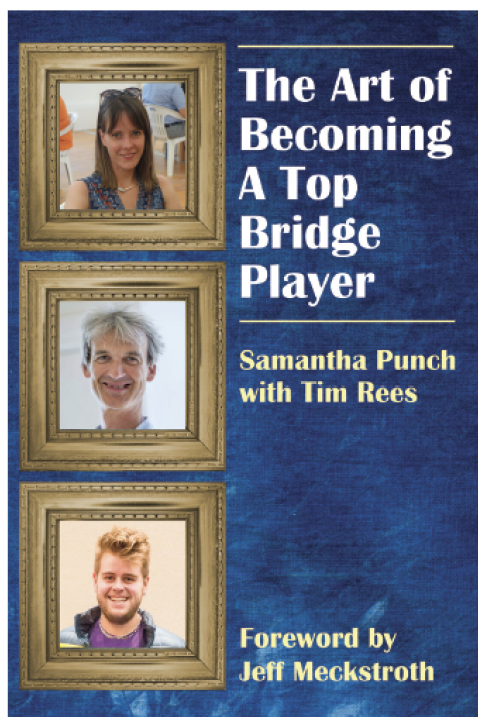

At both tables, South led the C2 through the KJ3. In the Open Room, North won the queen, cashed the ace and cleared the clubs. A diamond was ducked to the king followed by a small diamond to the ten and ace. North cashed 2 clubs and declarer claimed down one!

In the Closed Room, North won the CQ and played the C4 to the king. A diamond went to the ace and the clubs were

cashed. A heart was led and again, declarer claimed down one!

Where 3NT was played by West, North led either the C7 or C8 into the KJ3. In Lebowitz/Han, Zhang won the CJ, played a diamond to the king, a diamond to the ten, and a third diamond on which A Grossack took his ace. Adam played a heart to the J, K, A. Zhang led the ST to the king, continued with the S6 to the queen and ace followed by a small heart to the queen. The diamonds were cashed and declarer claimed 9 tricks. It was similarly played at the other 5 tables in this contract from this side.

In an outlier in the Robinson/Bailey match, Bailey/Donn found the moysian spade game and went light 3 tricks for an 11 IMP swing to Robinson when the other table played 3NT scoring it up from West.

In Juster/Gu, Passell/Goodman played in the making 3NT from West while Dwyer/Huang found 3CX. The auction:

Dwyer didn't know how lucky he was that his opponents hadn't reached their NT game or he might have passed out 2S... He'd have won IMPs by passing but he won more by bidding! Kevin balanced with 3C. Alex K doubled.

Smith led a spade to Alex's ace and the C3 was won by the 7. The H6 went to the 2, K, A; a diamond to the ace and a spade to Smith's king; HQ ruffed; diamond ruffed; heart ruffed; diamond ruffed; club to the jack and queen; CA felling the CK; spade to the queen and Smith took last with the HJ. +670 ... 14 IMPs to Juster

Board 6 looks like a not-too-tough to bid 6S and 9 out of the 14 tables bid it and made it. One table found 6H on the 5-2 fit and with the hearts 3-3, that was successful even with the HK offside. Two tables disdained slam creating 13 IMP swings for Hamman and Gu. And two tables got frisky and bid grands... one in spades and one in NT creating 17 IMP swings for Fleisher and Bramley. In both of those matches, the side bidding the grand was down a lot in the match and taking an aggressive shot for a big gain could have paid off... Had diamonds split 3-3, the gamble would have worked.

This was an amusing segment, pitting Debbie Rosenberg ,of the Schireson team, against her son, Kevin, of the Bramley team. Playing against one's children is never easy. There is one good thing, though: Debbie can be proud whichever way it works out in the end!

Board 49 from the 4th segment of play produced some strange results. According to the DoubleDummy analysis, 1NT by North fares the same as 1NT by East or West... it should always go down 2! However, in practice, looking at the above, it scored anywhere between and including making 4 to down 4!

When Petrov played it from North, Grue led the S6 and his side came to 4 spades, 1 heart, and 5 diamonds. Moss won the 1st spade and continued the suit. Petrov won in hand and led a heart. Moss won the ace and cashed 3 rounds of spades followed by a diamond through the KT to Grue who cashed five rounds of diamonds. Down 4!!

In Rosenthal/Belleisen, when Demuy played it from North, Wang led the DQ. Vince won and played a heart to the king and Qian's ace. Qian shifted to the SJ. Demuy won the SQ and cashed four rounds of hearts. He played a club to the ace and a club to the king and cashed two more clubs... He conceded the rest. Contract making +3!

No one did anything unreasonable... Just an example of how much opening leads matter!
