

2024 USBCs Kibitzing - There will be delayed kibitzing for all of the 2024 USBCs on LoveBridge

You can follow the USBC on the https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/ website. If you get to the voice commentary and there is no sound, you need to "unmute." When you first get to the page, there is a small icon of a speaker in the middle of your screen with an x on it. Click there to unmute. If you miss that icon, move your cursor to the bottom left of the screen and you should see a something like this:



Click on the speaker to unmute.

Vugraph is delayed for 30 minutes or until all tables have completed play on a board, whichever is later. Kibitzing Schedule (EDT)

For all KO days of the 2024 USBCs, kibitzing times will be :

Segment 1: 11:30 am EDT; Segment 2: 1:45 pm EDT

BREAK

Segment 3: 5:00 pm EDT; Segment 4: 7:15 pm EDT

For Round Robin days, each kibitzing segment will start 30 minutes after play starts. No voice for RR's. To listen to commentary, search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentators. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.

Deep Involvement: Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into 4 small screens – 2 of them showing the 2 tables of the match you choose, the other 2 having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do.

More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner, the arrow takes you to the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were. Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board, the same buttons move you through the list.

2024 USBCs Hospitality

We are returning to our pre-pandemic hospitality, with the hospitality suite (room 2321) open most of the day for socializing, Vugraph, and snacks. We will be providing breakfast and lunch each **day of play**. Marie-France Benoit will be our lead hostess, with help from Jacob Morgan and Julie Arbit, who makes the best guacamole. If you're at the tournament and can volunteer to help with hospitality (pick up items at Costco or nearby stores or restaurants, preparing food) please let Jan or Marie-France know.

Breakfast: From 8-10 am. There will be the usual breakfast food: cereal, bagels, toast, salmon, fruit, juice, coffee and tea. For those who prefer Keurig coffee, that will be available. So long as the suite doesn't become too crowded, you are welcome to eat there. No masking requirement.

Lunch: On the first four days of each event we will be serving a buffet lunch in a hotel banquet room, usually the Slate and Cyan rooms at the front of the hotel; we will have signs in the Player Break Room and Hospitality Suite with daily location. The hotel will be supplying what they do best: salads and chips. We will be bringing in 2 or 3 hot dishes from a local restaurant each day. There should be enough room for you to eat in the hotel banquet room, but you are welcome to take food from there to an outside table or to your hotel room. Lunch will be served from about half an hour before the morning session is supposed to end until about half an hour after the afternoon session starts.

After the first 4 days of each event, lunch will be available in the hospitality suite at the break. There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, main dish salads, pizza) as well as tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit, berries, cookies or other desserts. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators. As with breakfast, you are welcome to eat in the hospitality suite unless it is too crowded.

Let us know if you have specific needs. Our hosts will do their very best to accommodate you.

Playing Rooms & Player's Break Room

We will have bottled water in the playing rooms and if there is a refrigerator in a playing room we'll stock it with soft drinks.

We will have bottled water in the Player's Break Room (1321), as well as soft drinks, Nespresso, some packaged snacks, and some fruit. Please keep your voices down in the Break Room where we are working.

Masks will be required in playing rooms **only if your screenmate asks you to wear one**. You do not have to put on a mask when you summon a director or ask for coffee, water or an escort outside to smoke.

The World Bridge Federation was formed **on 18th August 1958 in Oslo**, Norway, by delegates from **Europe, USA and South America.**

Baron Robert de Nexon, from France, an inspiring figure in bridge, was elected as first President. **Charles J. Solomon**, from USA (1964-1968) succeeded him as President, followed by **Count Carl Bonde**, from Sweden (1968-1970). With the election of **Julius Rosenblum** in 1970, the WBF started to assume the mantle of a real **World Organization**. Rosenblum strongly believed that bridge needed to have a visible central organisation with a global reach rather than conducting its affairs on a local or continental basis. When in 1976 Rosenblum decided to retire for health reasons, **Jaime Ortiz-Patiño** from Switzerland, was elected President.

Under his guidance the WBF started a new era and in **August 1977** was incorporated under the Laws of the State of New York as an **"NFP"** organization. The Federation cast off the mantle of a paternalistic organization and was re-structured as an **International Federation** devoted to offering its National Bridge Organizations (NBOs) best service. The stimulation given by Ortiz-Patiño to building the organizational and administrative structure, to developing discipline and its image, to introducing new rules and a rigid code of ethics is still effective today. When he left the WBF in 1986 he was elected President Emeritus by acclamation for his exceptional service to bridge.

Denis Howard, from Australia, succeeded Jamie from 1986 to 1990. Re-elected for a 2nd term, Howard resigned in January 1991 following a crisis within the world of bridge. **Ernesto d'Orsi**, from Brazil, who had distinguished himself as a leading bridge administrator succeeded him in 1991 and 1992 and successfully steered the WBF through this difficult and delicate situation. In August 1992 he left the chair to **Bobby Wolff**, USA, one of the most successful players in the history of bridge, who completed the task started by d'Orsi. In August 1994, **José Damiani**, France, was elected President. José Damiani changed the way forward, both for the WBF and Bridge itself. Under his leadership, following its initial recognition as an International Organization in 1995 pursuant to Article 29 of the Olympic Charter, the WBF **was recognized by the International Olympic Committee** as an International Sports Federation in 1999. **In October 2000 in Monaco**, the World Bridge Federation was admitted as a **member of the GAISF (General Association of Internationals Sports Federations – Olympic and non-Olympic). GAISF later became SportAccord, but has now reverted to its origins as GAISF.**

The WBF became a member of **ARISF (Association of Recognized International Sport Federations)** and in **October 2002** moved its headquarters to Lausanne (Switzerland), where it is incorporated under Swiss Law. The WBF is one of the **founder members of IMSA (International Mind Sports Association)** which was formed on April 19, 2005. The WBF is recognized by **FISU** (International University Sport Federation), which organizes the World University Bridge Championship every two years and **UNESCO** and is Code Signatory of **WADA** (World Anti-Doping Agency).

José Damiani left the chair in November 2010 after 16 years as President. He achieved tremendous success in the development of bridge. He introduced new concepts of communication and information, which attracted media, sponsors and supporters; improving technological systems to manage and run the Championships, new events in which players of all categories could participate, and developing youth bridge, constantly supporting and improving the teaching of bridge and creating the opportunity for school children to be taught bridge from an early age. When he left, he was elected WBF Chairman Emeritus by acclamation and following the death of Ortiz-Patiño in 2013, elected President Emeritus. Gianarrigo Rona, from Italy, former First Vice-President and EBL President (1999-2010) was elected WBF President in São Paulo in September 2009 and took the chair in Philadelphia in November 2010. In Nusa Dua, Bali, November 2013, Rona was re-elected unopposed and again in Lyon, August 2017 for a third four-year term.

Under the Rona Presidency, the WBF Headquarters was settled in Lausanne, Switzerland, employing personnel and finalizing requirements for incorporation under Swiss Law. The structure and the legal status of the WBF were clearly defined.

Jan Kamras assumed the Presidency following Rona and is working hard to modernize the update the Competitions format and the governing documents.

The Disciplinary Code, the Eligibility Code, the Code of Ethics, the Dress Code, the Players Commitment Form, the Reviewer, substituting the Appeal Committee, the Antibetting Regulations, the WBF Sentencing Guidelines, the HLPC Express Line were adopted as well as the Tournament Directors Official Register and Rules & Regulations. Afterwards the Sport Integrity Declaration and the IOC Code of Prevention were introduced.

The **Constitution** and the **By-Laws** were updated in conformity with the **Olympic Charter** and the **IOC Principles**, respecting the fundamental principles of democracy, transparency and separation of powers. **Disciplinary Organs** consisting of a **Disciplinary Panel**, an **Antidoping Hearing Panel** and the **WBF Tribunal** were instituted with autonomous competence and jurisdiction on juridical and disciplinary matters.

The format of the World Bridge Games was modified with the introduction of the **National Pairs Championship**, following the **National Teams Championship**, as well as the format of the **World Bridge Series with Mixed, Open, Women and Seniors** events both for teams and in addition **World National Teams Championship** was expanded with the introduction of the **National Mixed Teams** and an increase in the number of the qualified teams. In the **Youth Championship** new categories of **Girls** (up to 25) and **Kids** (up to 15) were added to the already existing **Juniors** (up to 25) and **Youngsters** (up to 20). In Orlando in 2018 the E.C. decided to rename the youth categories in **Under 26 Open, Under 26 Women, Under 21 and Under 16... and most recently, the Open Under 31.**

The World Youth Online Bridge Teams Championship was launched as well the WBF Online Robot Tournaments and periodical Zonal Seminars for Officers and Zonal Courses for Tournament Directors. "Bridge is a Sport and, as such, its place is here like other Sports" declared the IOC President Juan Antonio Samaranch on 7 September 1998 at the Opening of the 1st IOC Grand Prix for Bridge at the Olympic Museum in Lausanne, on realizing that he was watching a true competition.

In August 2018 Bridge had the great privilege and honor, thanks to the of **Michael Bambang Hartono**, Chairman of the Indonesian Bridge Federation and **Esther Chodchoy Sophonpanich**, APBF President. to be included and compete in the **Asian Olympic Games in Jakarta, Indonesia.**

In Orlando on 27th September 2018 the Congress approved new **WBF Statutes** and endorsed the new **WBF By-Laws**, provided by the Executive Council, not only in conformity with the Olympic Charter and the IOC Principles, but also respecting the fundamental principles of democracy, transparency and separation of the powers.

For purposes of administration and furtherance of its objectives and to comply with the International Olympic Committee's principles of the five IOC rings, the WBF structure is divided into **five geographical Continental Conferences** identical to the IOC's five rings. For organizational reasons the WBF established zones within each of the five Continents which shall be entitled to have at least one member on the Executive and berths at the WBF Championships. Each zone has its own Zonal Conference which organizes, manages, and administers its activity and conducts its own zonal competitions and those delegated to it by the WBF. The eight Zonal Conferences are:

- Zone 1 Europe European Bridge League EBL
- Zone 2 North America North American Bridge Federation NABF
- Zone 3 South America Confederacion Sudamericana de Bridge CSB
- Zone 4 Asia and the Middle East Bridge Federation of Asia & Middle East BFAME
- Zone 5 Central America and Caribbean Central American & Caribbean Bridge Federation CACBF
- Zone 6 Asia Pacific Pacific Asia Bridge Federation PABF
- Zone 7 Oceania South Pacific Bridge Federation SPBF
- Zone 8 Africa African Bridge Federation ABF

Neil is playing in this USBC as a member of the Hamman squad.



He lived in California for several years early in his bridge career, learning much from the many great West Coast players of that era. He returned to Dallas when he became the sixth member of Ira Corn's Dallas Aces, and has lived there ever since. Most observers consider Bob to be the consummate bridge player, with a remarkable ability to focus only on the deal being played, irrespective of the circumstances. He is particularly noted for his tenacity and his never-give-up attitude.

Unlike many of the top American players, Bob has a job and a business away from bridge - he is the President of SCA Promotions, Inc, a prize promotion company in Dallas, Texas. Everyone around Bob plays bridge.

His ex-wife, Petra, has won North American titles and was a member of the winning USA women's team in Maastricht, while his son, Chris, played years ago and showed real talent for the game. In addition, Bob's step daughter, Stefani, is an excellent bridge teacher and a great promoter of the game. Stefani plays and attends most NABC's. Her son hasn't started playing yet but it wouldn't be surprising if he joins in the legacy.

Remarkably, Bob finds time for a few hobbies outside of bridge and work - all games, sports and playing backgammon.

Bob might be considered the high priest of the four-card major, but he also believes in limited openings and the power of a strong club system. His partnership with Paul Soloway provided an opportunity for Bob to indulge his creative side, and he never stopped tinkering with the system, which currently runs to nearly 200 pages. Soloway, who had more free time than Bob, learned the system well and mastered its more arcane sections even better than The Great One himself, and it is possible that they did well despite the system rather than because of it.







The start of the second day of the Semi-Finals was pretty quiet.

On Board 7, three of the tables reached their spade game. Only Kranyak/Demuy missed the mark. At two tables, the auction went 1D by South; 1S by North; 2C by South... and North jumped to 3S on the strength of their 6-card suit.

At one table, in Fleisher/Simson, South opened 1NT (14-16); North transferred to spades; East doubled the 2H call with his AQT98; South passed showing fewer than three spades; West cued 2S indicating a good hand in support of hearts; North jumped to game!


At the lone table where game was disdained,

Demuy chose to respond 2S over his partner's 2C, hoping the low road was right.

Kranyak has no aces and only a doubleton spade. He has no reason to bid more.

There was nothing to the play. Declarer loses three aces and it's proof!

Even the tricky lead of the HQ (as we saw a few days ago) would not likely have worked to defeat this hand.





last diamond. He played a heart to the king and a heart to the ace stripping North and South of red cards.



This is the 6-card end position.

Levin led the S7 and Wolpert won the king. Gavin exited a club. Levin put in the 9.

Poor Willenken! Chris can win his CJ but he must leave his hand with either a heart or a diamond, yielding a ruff and sluff to declarer to get rid of one of their club losers, or lead a club from his Kx into dummy's AQ.

 At the other table in this match, Greco put declarer's feet to the fire by leading the C6! Hampson won the CJ and led the D6 to dummy's ace. Declarer continued diamonds to Geoff's queen and trumped the diamond return. Declarer cashed the ace and king of hearts and led the SJ to his ace. He continued spades. Greco won his king and continued the attack on clubs. Declarer finessed and the defense had four tricks!

Spot-on defense and thoughtful declarer play! 10 IMPs to Nickell!

In Simson/Fleisher, at both tables, the game was successful with help from the opponenets! When the H2 was led and declarer took the losing spade finesse, East won the king and could play any card in his hand EXCEPT the D4! Both Easts fell from grace and played THAT card! This set up an analogous situation to the one in the Nickell match, allowing declarer to recover and succeed.

Weinstein led the CJ to Levin's ace. Levin continued clubs, ruffed in dummy. The SK lost to the ace and the S6 was continued, dummy winning the jack. Wolpert played dummy's last spade to his queen and pitched hearts on the two high clubs.

Wolpert made a key play at this point: he played the HJ from his hand and when the queen did not appear on his left, he guessed correctly to play dummy's king. Levin won the heart continuation with the queen and declarer claimed 10 tricks.






Board 13 is very tough to play in the heart game on a club lead. At the three tables where the contract was played from North, a club was led and at all three tables fell short a trick.


The play was the same at all three tables: East led the club. North won it. North played the HK and it was over. The defense took two spades, the HQ and a ruff! Had any of the declarers played the heart suit differently at trick two, it would have been different... West would be left ruffing with their good queen of hearts.

In the Open room of

Nickell/Rosenthal, where the contract was played from South, Willenken led the tricky S4 and Steve Weinstein brought home the game. Weinstein ducked the spade to Wolpert's jack. Wolpert played a spade to Willenken's ace and Willenken continued spades. Weinstein ruffed. He could have finessed the HQ but it wouldn't have helped him. He didn't need it! He played a heart to the king and ran dummy's HJ to Chris's Q. In total, Weinstein lost two spades and a heart. His diamond loser going away on Dummy's long club.




12 IMPs to Nickell



Years ago, a wise person told me there were three kinds of redoubles: one that said we're making; one that said we're in trouble and maybe they'll run; and one that said run partner now! Whatever Wolpert meant with his redouble on this hand, Willenken sat it.

With Nick's 6-card diamond holding, Chris was lucky to fall only 3 tricks short of making. It was 17 IMPs to Nickell when Hampson went down one at the other table in 4S, disdaining the diamond finesse at trick 2, playing instead, a diamond to the king and losing to South's ace. South could have given partner a club ruff but instead, he continued diamonds. The contract was again cold... But only IF Hampson overruffs the third diamond. Alas, he pitched his losing heart. South played his ST which Hampson won in dummy. Hampson played the



CJ from dummy and North scored the setting trick, ruffing with the S6!
