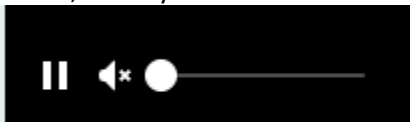

2024 USBCs Kibitzing - There will be delayed kibitzing for all of the 2024 USBCs on LoveBridge

You can follow the USBC on the <https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/> website. If you get to the voice commentary and there is no sound, you need to "unmute." When you first get to the page, there is a small icon of a speaker in the middle of your screen with an x on it. Click there to unmute. If you miss that icon, move your cursor to the bottom left of the screen and you should see a something like this:



Click on the speaker to unmute.

Vugraph is delayed for 30 minutes or until all tables have completed play on a board, whichever is later.

Kibitzing Schedule (EDT)

For all KO days of the 2024 USBCs, kibitzing times will be :

Segment 1: 11:30 am EDT; Segment 2: 1:45 pm EDT

BREAK

Segment 3: 5:00 pm EDT; Segment 4: 7:15 pm EDT

For Round Robin days, each kibitzing segment will start 30 minutes after play starts. No voice for RR's.

To listen to commentary, search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentators. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.

Deep Involvement: Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into 4 small screens – 2 of them showing the 2 tables of the match you choose, the other 2 having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do.

More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner, the arrow takes you to the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board, the same buttons move you through the list.

2024 USBCs Hospitality

We are returning to our pre-pandemic hospitality, with the hospitality suite (room 2321) open most of the day for socializing, Vugraph, and snacks. We will be providing breakfast and lunch each **day of play**. Marie-France Benoit will be our lead hostess, with help from Jacob Morgan and Julie Arbit, who makes the best guacamole. If you're at the tournament and can volunteer to help with hospitality (pick up items at Costco or nearby stores or restaurants, preparing food) please let Jan or Marie-France know.

Breakfast: From 8-10 am. There will be the usual breakfast food: cereal, bagels, toast, salmon, fruit, juice, coffee and tea. For those who prefer Keurig coffee, that will be available. So long as the suite doesn't become too crowded, you are welcome to eat there. No masking requirement.

Lunch: On the first four days of each event we will be serving a buffet lunch in a hotel banquet room, usually the Slate and Cyan rooms at the front of the hotel; we will have signs in the Player Break Room and Hospitality Suite with daily location. The hotel will be supplying what they do best: salads and chips. We will be bringing in 2 or 3 hot dishes from a local restaurant each day. There should be enough room for you to eat in the hotel banquet room, but you are welcome to take food from there to an outside table or to your hotel room. Lunch will be served from about half an hour before the morning session is supposed to end until about half an hour after the afternoon session starts.

After the first 4 days of each event, lunch will be available in the hospitality suite at the break. There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, main dish salads, pizza) as well as tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit, berries, cookies or other desserts. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators. As with breakfast, you are welcome to eat in the hospitality suite unless it is too crowded.

Let us know if you have specific needs. Our hosts will do their very best to accommodate you.

Playing Rooms & Player's Break Room

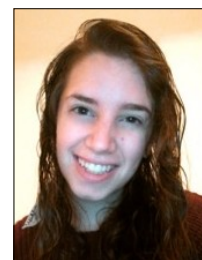
We will have bottled water in the playing rooms and if there is a refrigerator in a playing room we'll stock it with soft drinks.

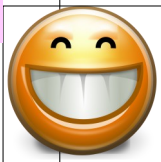

The semi-final matches

In the 64-board semi-finals, WBRIDGE5 narrowly defeated SHARK BRIDGE, 140.6 – 131, and MICRO BRIDGE narrowly defeated BRIDGE BARON 144 – 138.

An expertly played deal by WBRIDGE5 early in the semi-final match, produced the margin of victory, see Figure 2. Opening lead ♣Q: with West long in hearts, without the club king, therefore the spade ace, a heart-spade squeeze without the count, is the marked play. For success diamonds must be 2-2 or 3-1 with a stiff honor with West as declarer needs two entries to hand, one to take one heart finesse and one to run the diamonds. Diamond queen overtaken with the ace caters to both possibilities. The play proceeds: club ace; diamond queen overtaken with the ace; heart finesse, diamond finesse (restricted choice); running diamonds and on the last diamond, West had no safe discard.

From Figure 2b, at the table, West discarded the ♠Q, declarer led a spade to West's stiff ace and West had to return a heart, +1370 and 15 Imps as Shark Bridge was in 3♦ for +150.

In the MICRO BRIDGE versus BRIDGE BARON match, BRIDGE BARON was in 3♦ +130 and WBRIDGE5 was in 5♦ +620, and 10 Imps to MICRO BRIDGE. The opening lead against 5♦ was a low heart, finessed, and on the run of diamonds West was similarly squeezed.

Note that the play must be the same to make 5♦ or 6♦. This deal was played in the quarter-finals of the human team championships (Open, Women's, Senior, Mixed). Of the 32 times the deal was played by humans, the contracts were 3NT by South (16) making; 3NT by North, down (3); 3♦ (7); 3♠ by East (2); 5♦, down (2), making with an overtrick (1); and 6♦ (1) making. The declarers that made 5♦ and 6♦ received the spade ace lead, so their play was not tested. The two other declarers in 5♦ received less friendly leads and did not find the best play. In the 4 times 5♦ and 6♦ were played, the robots defended and declared better than the humans.

With two boards to play, and both semi-final matches almost even, the drop of a singleton king offside decided both matches.

Opening lead ♠5, see Figure 3. West won the opening lead with the ♠Q, cashed the ♠A and led the ♠7 for East to ruff. East returned a club, West playing the King. With West a passed hand, East was marked for the heart king, and likely 1-2-5-5, so WBRIDGE5 got it right and dropped the stiff ♥K. No blood as 4♥ was also made by SHARK BRIDGE, but a needed play by WBRIDGE5 to win the match.

In the other semifinal match, at one table BRIDGE BARON reached 4♥ with no opposing bidding. The ♠5 was led, and after the ♠Q, ♠A and ruff by East, a diamond was returned. BRIDGE BARON, not locating the ♣K, ruffed the third diamond and took the heart finesse for down one. At the other table, MICRO BRIDGE was in a safer 3NT contract, making 4, picking up 10 Imps and the victory.

Meet the Players

Eric Victor Rodwell (born May 1, 1957) is an American professional bridge player. He has won the Bermuda Bowl representing the United States five times and is one of ten players who have won the triple crown of bridge: the Bermuda Bowl, the World Open Pairs and the World Team Olympiad.

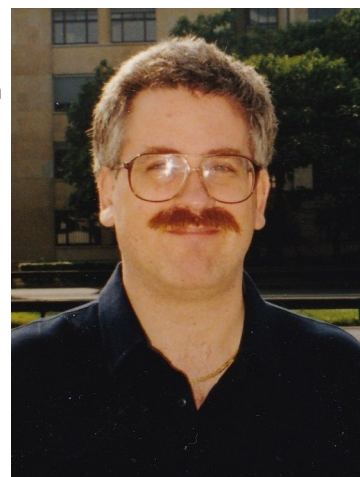
Personal life

Rodwell was born in San Francisco, California and his family moved to West Lafayette, Indiana in 1965 where his father was a professor of biochemistry at Purdue University. He started playing bridge at the age of eleven by reading books and playing with his parents. Rodwell graduated from West Lafayette High School in 1974 and attended Purdue, graduating with a master's degree in finance in 1981. Rodwell is currently a full-time bridge professional and lives in Clearwater Beach, Florida with his wife Donna; each has two children from previous marriages, his being twins Jeffrey and Sara (b. 1984).

Bridge career

For decades Rodwell has been in a regular partnership with Jeff Meckstroth, and "Meckwell", for their surnames, is one of the most successful pairs of all time. They are well known for playing an aggressive and very detailed system called RM Precision (for Rodwell-Meckstroth), of which Rodwell is the principal theorist and author. Although he first learned basic Precision at the age of 14, he didn't get serious about developing his own version until 1982 after he and Meckstroth were already winning. Most of RM Precision was developed subsequently in the early '80s with adaptations following more slowly thereafter. As a bidding theorist, Rodwell has created several conventions and methods including the support double, conventional transfers in many situations, the pass-double inversion and the serious three notrump. Although the Unusual Major Jumps Over One Diamond Opening convention (UMJODOO) is often credited to him, he denies inventing it. Although he has not actively pursued masterpoints as a goal, he is one of the all-time top masterpoint holders in the American Contract Bridge League, and won the *Barry Crane Trophy* for winning the most masterpoints in a year in 2004. Possibly his most remarkable achievement was at the ACBL's 2008 fall championships, where with four major events available to be contested, he won three (Open Board-A-Match Teams, Blue Ribbon Pairs, Reisinger Teams) and finished second in the fourth (Life Master Open Pairs). The three wins were with Jeff Meckstroth, and the second place with John Diamond.

As of 2022, Rodwell was inactive in face-to-face bridge. North American Bridge Championships required all participants to be vaccinated against COVID19 and Rodwell refused. Vaccinations are no longer required and we are happy Eric is back.

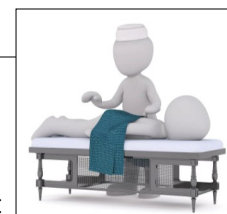

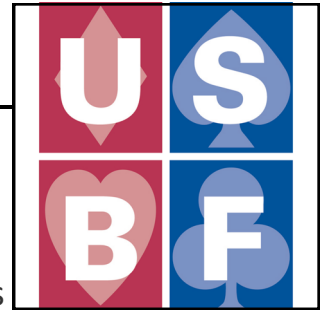

Looking at the frequency chart above, it is evident that both 4H for N/S and 4S for E/W are possible results.

Indeed, at the table, Nickell scored up the double game swing, badly needed after Tuesday night's brutal final segment.

Unusually, there were no alerts at either table.

In the Open Room where Hampson declared 4H, Hurd led the C9 to the jack, and Bathurst's king. Kevin played the S5 to Hurd's queen and Hurd continued with his attack on clubs. Hampson ruffed and pulled trump, felling Hurd's queen on the second round. Geoff claimed his 10 tricks.

In the Closed Room where Weinstein declared 4S, Grue led the HK followed by the HA.

He played the D4 and Weinstein won the king with his ace. He pulled three rounds of trump ending with the

queen in dummy.

He floated the CT. Moss covered the C9 with queen, Weinstein winning his king.

Weinstein claimed 10 tricks. 13 IMPs for Nickell scoring up two non-vulnerable games on the same board!!

Up to this point, there had been lots of flat boards and small swings back and forth. The Nickell team needs to pick up an 80 IMP deficit from the first day's play...

Still lots of boards to play but the pressure is on and it's always harder to play under pressure... and flat boards don't help when you need swings!

In the Open Room, Hampson won the second spade with his king, played a heart to the ace and took the diamond finesse. He cashed the DA and DK and finessed the HJ. Bathurst won his queen. He cashed the DQ and led a club to Hurd who took all the rest of the tricks.

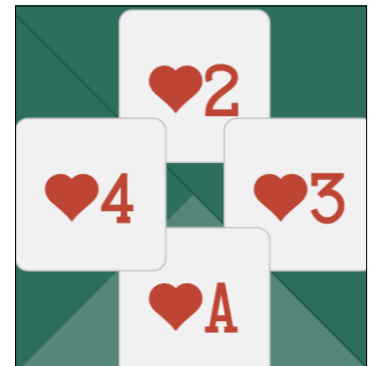
Contract down 4!!!

In the Closed Room, Fleisher ducked the second spade and Katz continued spades with the deuce, making certain Nick knew his entry was in clubs. Fleisher led his H2 to the ace producing this wish trick:

Play continued with no variance between rooms and the result was a push!

Hampson picked an opportune moment to open a weak two in spades on an especially anemic suit.

Hurd's 2NT overcall could have been as little as 15. Bathurst had no reason to do anything but pass. Hurd took 9 tricks for +150.

In the other room, Fleisher passed the North hand Katz opened 1♣. Martel overcalled 1♥; Nickell passed and showed his "better than a 15-17 NT" by bidding 1NT opposite his passed hand partner.

Nick is really good at hand evaluation ... or maybe it's just good table feel... either way he bid the vulnerable game.

Katz collected three spades, one heart, four diamonds and a club for +600 and 12 IMPs.

On the next three boards, Fleisher scored 2, 1, 3 IMPs... “nick”ing away at Nickell’s pickups.

On Board 24, Nickell picked up another 10 IMPs when a 3NT game made in the Closed Room and failed in the Open Room.

In the Open Room, Greco led the ST (Rusinow) to the 2, Q, 8. (Ed. Note: Had Hurd not played the S2 from dummy, he would have made a wish trick at trick 2... just sayin...

Hampson continued spades. Hurd won the ace in hand and played the HJ which held. He played the D8 and ducked in dummy!! to Hampson’s ten. Hurd needed to win the ace to succeed.

Alas, he ducked. Hampson won the ten and played the DQ. Hurd won his king and played a heart to the king in dummy. A heart to the queen and ace followed. Greco continued spades, Hurd winning the king in dummy. He cashed the DA and left dummy with a small club. Hampson ducked Hurd played the king. He could cash the good heart but now he was endplayed in clubs! Contract down one! The end position:



In the Closed Room, the auction was quite different. West, most reasonably, passed and East opened 1NT. South showed one major and West jumped to 3NT.

Martel led the ST. Fleisher won the queen and continued spades. Katz won the ace and played the H4 to the king in dummy. He played a club to the king and the HJ which Martel won with his ace. Martel played the S9 to the king, Fleisher and Katz both pitching diamonds. Katz played a club and cashed his

two good hearts. He had 7 tricks in the bag. He cashed the ace and king of diamonds for 9 tricks and 10 IMPs.

Board 27 produced another 10 IMP swing for Nickell.

Both tables bid the cold heart game.

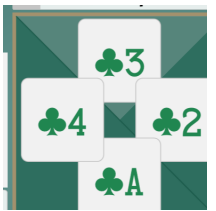

He played a diamond to the 9 and king. Hurd continued diamonds, Greco tossing a club on the queen. Greco cashed the SA and played the C3 creating this wish trick: → Greco played the SJ to Hurd's queen and claimed ten tricks.



In the other room, Nick led the S3 and Martel won dummy's ace. He played the HA ... Wish trick: → He cashed two more high hearts and played the SJ to Katz's queen... Katz continued spades to dummy's king. Martel slipped! He needed to play the H7 off dummy, putting Katz in trouble but instead he played the C3 creating a wish trick but putting himself in trouble. Martel played the C9 and Nick won his queen. Nick played a diamond through dummy to Katz's queen and the defense had three tricks! Katz cashed the CK for the setting trick! Katz exited with a diamond and declarer claimed down one! 10 more IMPs to Nickell
